## **DANGER**

- · Reduce the weight of the rack cabinet by removing equipment starting at the top of the rack cabinet. When possible, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. If this configuration is not known, you must observe the following precautions:
  - Remove all devices in the 32U position and above.
  - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
  - Ensure that there are no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U level.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- · Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).

- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.

  - Lower the four leveling pads.
  - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
  - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.

# Power and cabling information for NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) **GR-1089-CORE**

The following comments apply to the servers that have been designated as conforming to NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE:

The equipment is suitable for installation in the following:

- Network telecommunications facilities
- Locations where the NEC (National Electrical Code) applies

The intrabuilding ports of this equipment are suitable for connection to intrabuilding or unexposed wiring or cabling only. The intrabuilding ports of this equipment must not be metallically connected to the interfaces that connect to the OSP (outside plant) or its wiring. These interfaces are designed for use as intrabuilding interfaces only (Type 2 or Type 4 ports as described in GR-1089-CORE) and require isolation from the exposed OSP cabling. The addition of primary protectors is not sufficient protection to connect these interfaces metallically to OSP wiring.

# Installing the 58/02 and 58/77 expansion units

Use this overview as a guide to the tasks required for installing the 58/02 and 58/77 expansion units (12X I/O Drawer PCIe) into a rack and cabling it to a server.

# **Procedure**

You can use the following table to read about and complete the high-level tasks for installing the 58/02 and 58/77 expansion units.

# Installing the 58/02 and 58/77 expansion units: Details

The detailed installation procedure includes information from online references that are specified in the overview. You can use the expanded instructions in this procedure to install your expansion unit into a rack and to cable it to a server.

# Before you begin

- This information is provided in printed form as list of basic tasks for installing the 58/02 and 58/77 expansion units. For the most current version, use the online information: Installing the 5802 and 5877 expansion units.
- To ensure that server firmware has been updated to a level that supports this expansion unit, see the IBM Prerequisite (https://www-912.ibm.com/e\_dir/eserverprereq.nsf).
- This procedure assumes that you are installing the 58/02 or 58/77 expansion unit into an existing rack. If the rack is not yet installed, you must first complete the procedure for Installing the rack.
- Before installing the expansion unit into a rack, read the Rack safety notices.

# **About this task**

To install the 58/02 or 58/77 expansion unit, complete the following tasks:

- 1. Unpack the expansion unit as follows:
  - a. Refer to the kitting list provided with the rack installation kit, and complete a parts inventory.
  - b. Locate the rack-mounting hardware kit and the system rail assemblies that were included with your expansion unit.
- 2. Determine where to install the expansion unit into the rack as follows:
  - a. Determine where in the rack to place the expansion unit in relation to other system hardware. As you plan, keep the following steps in mind:
    - 1) Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
    - 2) Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
    - 3) Record the EIA locations in your plan.

**Note:** The expansion unit is four Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) units high. An EIA unit is 44.50 mm (1.75 in.) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This enclosure, therefore, is 177.8 mm (7 in.) high and covers 12 mounting holes in the rack.

b. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the expansion unit.




Figure 1. Removing the filler panels

- **c**. If necessary, remove the front and rear rack doors.
- d. Mark the rack location where you will install the expansion unit, using one of the following methods:
  - 1) If you have a rack-mounting template, use it to mark the location.
  - 2) If you do not have a rack-mounting template, complete the following steps:
    - a) Face the front of the rack and work from the left side. Make a note of both the lowest and highest EIA units to be used for the expansion unit. Use tape, a marker, or a pencil to mark the bottom mounting hole (A) of the highest EIA unit. Mark the rack so that the mark can also be seen from the rear of the rack.




Figure 2. Marking the installation locations

- b) Mark the top mounting hole of the lowest EIA unit. Count up two holes and place another mark beside that mounting hole. Mark the rack so that these marks can also be seen from the rear of the rack. You now have two (B) marks on the rack, with one mounting hole between the marks.
- c) Repeat the last two steps to place three marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the front-right side of the rack.
- d) Go to the rear of the rack. On the left side, find the EIA unit that corresponds to the lowest EIA unit marked on the front of the rack.
- e) Mark the top mounting hole of this EIA unit. Count up two holes and place another mark beside that mounting hole. You now have two (C) marks on the rack, with one mounting hole between the marks.
- f) Count up one mounting hole from where you placed your last mark, and place another mark next to that mounting hole. Then count up three holes and place another mark beside that mounting hole. You now have two **(D)** marks on the rack, with three mounting holes between the marks.
- g) Repeat the last two steps to place four marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the rear-right side of the rack.
- 3. Install the rail assembly into the rack as follows:

**Important:** To complete this procedure, use two people to attach the rail assembly to the rack. Position one person in front of the rack and one person at the rear of the rack.

## CAUTION:

Installing the rails in the rack is a complex procedure. To install the rails correctly, you must perform each task in the following order. Failure to do so might cause rail failure and potential danger to yourself and the system unit.

- a. Rotate down the front and back clamps (C) on the left and right rails, as shown in the following figure.
- b. On each rail, remove the tape holding the spring **(B)** to the rail. Hook the end of the spring around the circular standoff on the rail.
- c. Start at the front of the rack. Extend the right rail and insert the rail pins (D) into the two lowest mounting holes marked on the rack so that the rail is facing upward. Rotate up the front clamp (C) to secure the rail in place.

#### **Notes:**

• If your rack has the square mounting holes, remove the rail pins **(D)** from the rail. Install the larger rail pins provided with the rack installation kit.

• The rail installation can be completed by one person. However, the installation is easier if one person is positioned at the front of the rack and one person is positioned at the rear of the rack.




Figure 3. Installing the rails

- d. Extend the left rail and insert the rail pins (**D**) into the two lowest mounting holes marked on the rack. Rotate up the front clamp (**C**) to secure the rail in place.
- **e**. Move to the rear of the rack, extend the right rail, and insert the rail pins **(D)** into the two lowest mounting holes marked on the rack. Rotate up the back clamp **(C)** to secure the rail in place.
- f. Extend the left rail and insert the rail pins (D) into the two lowest mounting holes marked on the rack. Rotate up the back clamp (C) to secure the rail in place.
- g. At the rear of the rack, use two M5 screws (E), one below each rail pin (D), to secure the left rail to the back of the rack.
- h. Use two M5 screws (E), one below each rail pin (D), to secure the right rail to the back of the rack.
- i. Move to the front of the rack. Use one M5 screw (E) below the top rail pin to secure the left rail to the front of the rack.




Figure 4. Attaching the rails

- j. Use one M5 screw (E), below the top rail pin (D), to secure the right rail to the front of the rack. See the previous figure.
- k. Locate the remaining marks made previously on the front Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) strips of the rack cabinet. Each side contains one mark. Insert one nut clip **(F)** at the mark on the right side of the rack as shown in the following figure.
- I. Insert a nut clip (F) at the mark on the left side of the rack.
- m. From the back of the rack cabinet, locate the remaining marks made previously on the rear Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) strips. Each side contains two marks. Insert a nut clip **(F)** at each mark on the right side of the rack.




Figure 5. Installing the retention bracket

- n. Use two M5 screws (H) to attach the retention bracket (G) to the rack on the right side.
- o. Insert a nut clip (F) at each mark on the left side of the rack.
- p. Use two M5 screws (H) to attach the retention bracket (G) to the rack on the left side.
- 4. Install the expansion unit onto the rails as follows:
  - a. To remove the shipped cover from the rear of the expansion unit, remove the four thumb screws that are used to secure it. Pull off the cover.

**Note:** There are two thumb screws at the top of the cover and one on each side.

- b. If the bezel is installed on the front of the system, remove it by completing the following steps:




Figure 6. Removing the service information holder and bezel

  - 1) Remove the two M5 securing screws (A) as shown in Figure 6 on page 9.
  - 2) Remove the service information holder from the slot in the bezel.
  - 3) Using the two blue touch points on each side of the expansion unit, pull the bezel straight out to remove the bezel from the front of the expansion unit.
  - 4) Remove the two nut clips that were used to secure the bezel to the expansion unit from the EIA flange.

**c**. Using three people, hold onto the four handles **(I)**, as shown in the following figure, to lift the expansion unit and position it over the front of the rails.

**Attention:** Three people are required to safely lift the expansion unit. Using fewer than three people to lift the expansion unit can result in injury.




Figure 7. Installing the expansion unit into a rack

- d. Slide the expansion unit into the rack.
- **e**. Install the two M5 securing screws **(J)** through the expansion unit and into the nut clips on the left and right rails. See the previous figure.
- f. Install the bezel (L) onto the expansion unit. Press the bezel into place and secure it with two M5 screws (M) on the left and right rails. See the following figure.
- g. Insert the service information holder (N) into the slot in the bezel.




Figure 8. Installing the bezel and service information holder

h. At the rear of the system, install the four securing screws **(K)** through the expansion unit and retention brackets on the left and right rails.




Figure 9. Installing four screws at the rear of the system

- 5. 58/02 only: Connect the SAS cables to the disk drive enclosure as follows:
  - a. Review the following information related to connecting this device:
    - 1) Review the connector locations.




Figure 10. Model 58/02 and 58/77 connector locations

- 2) Review the following information about configuring the disk drive subsystem:
  - a) The SAS disk subsystem in the 58/02 expansion unit can hold up to 18 disk drives. The disks in this subsystem can be organized in several different configurations depending on the operating system used, the type of SAS adapter, and the position of the hard-disk-drive partitions switch.

## **Notes:**

- The hard-disk-drive partitions switch is located at the rear of the 58/02 expansion unit, just below the SAS connectors.
- If the hard-disk-drive partitions switch position is changed, you must power the 58/02 expansion unit off and on in order for the 58/02 to sense the new position of the hard-disk-drive partitions switch.

The SAS disk subsystem in the 58/02 expansion unit is supported by the following operating systems:

- AIX<sup>®</sup>
- Linux
- VIOS

To determine the level of software you need to support the SAS disk subsystem in the 58/02 expansion unit, see IBM Prerequisite.




Figure 11. Physical cabling example: Two hard-disk-drive partitions with nine disks per hard-disk-drive partition, dual SAS adapters, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 2




Figure 12. Physical cabling example: One hard-disk-drive partition with 18 disks, a single SAS adapter, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 1




Figure 13. Physical cabling example: Two hard-disk-drive partitions with nine disks per hard-disk-drive partition, a single SAS adapter, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 2




Figure 14. Physical cabling example: Two hard-disk-drive partitions with nine disks per hard-disk-drive partition, two SAS adapters, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 2




Figure 15. Physical cabling example: Two hard-disk-drive partitions with nine disks per hard-disk-drive partition, four SAS adapters, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 2




Figure 16. Physical cabling example: One hard-disk-drive partition with 18 disks, dual SAS adapters, and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 1




Figure 17. Physical cabling example: Four hard-disk-drive partitions with four or five disks per hard-disk-drive partition and hard-disk-drive partitions switch position 4




Figure 18. Model 02E/4B connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 19. Model 02E/4B connector locations on a stand-alone model




Figure 20. Model 02E/4C connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 21. Model 05F/6B connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 22. Model 05F/6B connector locations on a stand-alone model




Figure 23. Model 05E/6C connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 24. Model 31E/1C or 31E/2C showing all 12X connector locations




Figure 25. Model 31E/1C or 31E/2C showing all PCIe connector locations




Figure 26. Model 33E/8B connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 27. Model 17M/MB or 79M/HB connector locations




Figure 28. Model 17M/MC or 79M/HC connector locations




Figure 29. Model 58/02 and 58/77 connector locations
