- Rack-mounted devices are not to be used as shelves or work spaces. Do not place objects on top of rack-mounted devices.



- Each rack cabinet might have more than one power cord. Be sure to disconnect all power cords in the rack cabinet when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
- Connect all devices installed in a rack cabinet to power devices installed in the same rack cabinet. Do not plug a power cord from a device installed in one rack cabinet into a power device installed in a different rack cabinet.

 - Remove all devices in the 32U position and above.
 - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
 - Ensure that there are no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U level.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- · Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).
- Ensure that all devices, shelves, drawers, doors, and cables are secure.
- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.
- Do not use a ramp inclined at more than 10 degrees.
- When the rack cabinet is in the new location, complete the following steps:
 - Lower the four leveling pads.
 - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
 - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.

Installing the ED/R1 PCle storage enclosure

Use this overview as a guide to the tasks required for installing the ED/R1 PCI Express (PCIe) storage enclosure (EXP30 Ultra SSD I/O Drawer) into a rack and cabling it to a server.

Procedure

You can use the following table to read about and complete the high-level tasks for installing the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure.

Installing the ED/R1 PCle storage enclosure: Details

The detailed installation procedure includes information from online references that are specified in the overview. You can use the expanded instructions in this procedure to install your PCIe storage enclosure into a rack and to cable it to a server.

Before you begin

- This information is provided in printed form as a list of basic tasks for installing the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure. For the most current version, use the online information: Installing the EDR1 PCIe storage enclosure.
- This procedure supports the following installation scenarios:
 - Your ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure was delivered already mounted in a rack, and you need to complete the installation.
 - Your ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure was delivered separately from a rack, and you need to mount the enclosure in an existing rack and complete the installation.

Note: If the rack is not yet installed, you must first complete the procedure for Installing the rack.

· Before installing the PCIe storage enclosure into a rack, read the Rack safety notices.

About this task

To install the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure, complete the following tasks:

- 1. Choose the type of installation you are performing:
 - To complete the installation of a ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure that was delivered already mounted in a rack, go to step 2.
 - To complete the installation of a ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure that was delivered separately from a rack, go to step 3 on page 7.
- 2. Remove the shipping bracket attached at the rear of the PCIe storage enclosure as follows:
 - a. At the rear of the rack, find the rear panel of the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure. Observe that the enclosure contains a power supply on each side of the unit behind the shipping bracket. Each power supply handle (A) is attached to a tab (B) of the rear shipping bracket (C) using an orange releasable Panduit tie wrap (D), as shown in the following figure.




Figure 1. Power supply attachment to the rear shipping bracket

- b. To remove a Panduit tie wrap (**D**), use one hand to hold the tie wrap head (**E**) between two fingers, and use your other hand to hold the loose end (**F**) of the tie wrap, as shown in the preceding figure. Then, while using your thumb nail to catch and pull the release (**G**) in the tie wrap head, push the loose end through the head to expand the tie wrap loop. When the loose end is fed completely through, remove the tie wrap. Then remove the other Panduit tie wrap.
- c. Using a screwdriver, remove the two screws (A) that attach the rear shipping bracket (B) to the left and right flanges of the rack frame, as shown in the following figure. Use the screwdriver provided in the installation kit to remove the six screws (C) that attach the rear shipping bracket (B) to the rear of the PCIe storage enclosure. Lift the bracket away from the rack frame.

Tip: Save all of the brackets and screws that you have removed for any future reinstallation and for shipping of the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure that might be required.




Figure 2. Removing the rear shipping bracket

d. Dock one of the power supplies by gently sliding it into the enclosure until the orange release tab latches, as shown in the following figure. Then dock the other power supply.




Figure 3. Docking the power supply

e. At the front of the rack, find the front panel of the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure. Hold the service card (A) with its handle away from the enclosure and facing upward, as shown in the

following figure. Align the other end of the service card with the bottom of the last bank of solid-state drives (SSDs) on the right of the enclosure (B). Gently slide the service card into the space between the bottom SSD slot and the sheet metal of the chassis (C).




Figure 4. Inserting the service card

f. Install the six SSD EMC bezels (A) to cover the slots that contain the SSDs, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 5. Installing the SSD EMC bezels

Go to step 8 on page 16.

- **3**. Unpack the PCIe storage enclosure as follows:
 - a. Refer to the kitting list provided with the rack installation kit, and complete a parts inventory.
 - b. Locate the rack-mounting hardware kit and the system rail assemblies that were included with your PCIe storage enclosure.
 - The rails are front-to-back and left-to-right side dependent.
- 4. Determine where to install the PCIe storage enclosure into the rack as follows:
 - a. Determine where in the rack to place the PCIe storage enclosure in relation to other system hardware. As you plan, keep the following steps in mind:
 - 1) Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
 - 2) Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
 - 3) Record the EIA locations in your plan.

Note: The PCIe storage enclosure is one Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) unit high. An EIA unit is 44.50 mm (1.75 in.) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This enclosure, therefore, is 44.50 mm (1.75 in.) high and covers 3 mounting holes in the rack.

b. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the PCIe storage enclosure.




Figure 6. Removing the filler panels

- c. If necessary, remove the front and rear rack doors.
- d. Mark the rack location where you will install the PCIe storage enclosure. Choose one of the following options:
 - 1) If you have a rack-mounting template, use it to mark the location.
 - 2) If you do not have a rack-mounting template, complete the following steps:
 - a) Face the front of the rack and work from the left side. Make a note of the EIA unit to be used for the PCIe storage enclosure. Use tape, a marker, or a pencil to mark the middle mounting hole (A) of the EIA unit. Place another mark beside the bottom mounting hole (B). Mark the rack so that these marks can also be seen from the rear of the rack.




Figure 7. Marking the installation locations

- b) Repeat the last step to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the front-right side of the rack.
- c) Go to the rear of the rack. On the left side, find the EIA unit to be used for the PCIe storage enclosure.
- d) Mark the middle mounting hole (C) of this EIA unit. Place another mark beside the bottom mounting hole (D).
- e) Repeat the last step to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the rear-right side of the rack.
- 5. Install the rail assembly into the rack as follows:

Important: To complete this procedure, use two people to attach the rail assembly to the rack. Position one person in front of the rack and one person at the rear of the rack.

CAUTION:

Installing the rails in the rack is a complex procedure. To install the rails correctly, you must perform each task in the following order. Failure to do so might cause rail failure and potential danger to yourself and the system unit.

a. Facing the front of the rack, locate the two marks made previously on the Electronic Industries Alliances (EIA) strips.

Notes:

- The rail installation can be completed by one person. However, the installation is easier if one person is positioned at the front of the rack and one person is positioned at the rear of the rack.
- In order to install the rails in the limited rack space for this enclosure model, ensure that you have open work space either directly above or directly below the EIA location that you have marked. If the rack spaces directly above and below the EIA location currently contain hardware, choose one of the following options to increase the work space:
 - If the hardware unit directly above or below the EIA location can be slid into a service position, do so now to provide more work space.
 - Remove the hardware unit either directly above or below the EIA location to provide more work space, and reinstall it following the rails installation.
- b. Select a rail. Identify the side of the rack where the rail must be mounted by holding the rail inside of the open space of the rack as follows:
 - The rail points from front to rear.




Figure 8. Mounting the rail to the front of the rack

 - The tension clip (A) points toward the front of the rack and aligns with the bottom EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 8 on page 10.
 - The rail shaft is aligned with the inside edge of the front rack flange with its open side facing inward.

c. Bend the tension clip (A) up and insert it into the bottom EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 8. Ensure that the lip of the clip is brought fully through the hole and clasped against the bottom of the hole. Seat the alignment screw (B) in the middle EIA hole that you marked previously.

Note: There are two sizes of alignment screws (B). If your rack has round mounting holes, use the smaller alignment screw for each rail. If your rack has square mounting holes, use the larger alignment screw for each rail. Alignment screws are provided with the rack installation kit.




Figure 9. Expanding the rail to the rear of the rack

d. At the rear of the rack, locate the two marks that you made previously on the EIA strips. Compress the rail (C) as shown in Figure 9, and then expand the rail carefully toward the marks until the rail end meets the rear rack flange.




Figure 10. Mounting the rail to the rear of the rack

e. Seat the alignment screw **(D)** of the rail into the middle EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 10.

- f. Repeat step 5c on page 10 through step 5e for the other rail.




Figure 11. Mounting the cable management bracket

- g. At the rear of the rack, hold the cable management bracket up to the rear rack flanges, aligning the bracket mounting holes to the top holes of the EIA that contains the enclosure, as shown in Figure 11 on page 12. Apply the M5 screws (E) through the mounting holes of the bracket and into the top EIA holes on the rack flanges.

CAUTION:

To provide for the secure attachment of the rails, the M5 screws (E) must be applied at the specified EIA locations even if you do not mount the cable management bracket.

- 6. Install the PCIe storage enclosure onto the rails as follows:




Figure 12. Reviewing the enclosure attachment to the rails

 - a. Before attempting to mount the PCIe storage enclosure to the rails, review Figure 12 to observe how the chassis bracket guide (A) on the side of the enclosure fits and slides into the rail sheath (B) that matches its shape.

Note: In Figure 12, the right rail **(B)** is portrayed at an angle to show the location of the rail sheath. The actual rail is mounted in an upright position in the rack.




Figure 13. Fitting the enclosure into the rail sheath

Attention: Due to the precision required to align and connect these parts, you must use two people to move the enclosure. Using fewer than two people can result in damage to the enclosure.

b. Position one person on each side of the PCIe storage enclosure and lift the enclosure. At the front of the rack, position the rear of the enclosure in front of the rails.

c. On one side of the enclosure, insert the chassis bracket guide **(A)** into the rail sheath **(B)** opening, as shown in Figure 13. Repeat this operation on the other side.




Figure 14. Sliding the disk drive enclosure into the rack

d. When the chassis bracket guides are firmly seated on both sides of the enclosure, slide the enclosure gently into the rack cabinet, as shown in Figure 14.

CAUTION:

Ensure that no one's fingers are located between the enclosure and the cable management bracket when you slide the enclosure into the rack cabinet.




Figure 15. Securing the front of the enclosure to the rack

e. Secure the front of the enclosure to the rack flanges by applying the securing screws **(A)** through the top open holes in each bracket and into the top EIA holes, as shown in Figure 15 on page 14.




Figure 16. Inserting the service card

f. At the front panel of the enclosure, hold the service card (A) with its handle away from the enclosure and facing upward, as shown in Figure 16. Align the other end of the service card with the bottom of the last bank of solid-state drives (SSDs) on the right of the enclosure (B). Gently slide the service card into the space between the bottom SSD slot and the sheet metal of the chassis (C).




Figure 17. Installing the SSD EMC bezels

g. Install the six SSD EMC bezels (A) to cover the slots that contain the SSDs, as shown in Figure 17 on page 15.




Figure 18. Installing the power cords

h. At the rear of the rack, install the power cables **(A)**, as shown in Figure 18. Use Velcro ties to secure the power cords to the cable management bracket.




Figure 19. Example of a server that has one PCIe GX++ adapter connected to a single storage enclosure




Figure 20. Example of a server that has two PCIe GX++ adapters connected to two storage enclosures




Figure 21. Example of a server that has two PCIe GX++ adapters connected to a single storage enclosure




Figure 22. Example of a server that has two PCIe GX++ adapters connected to two storage enclosures for high availability




Figure 23. Example of two servers, each with a PCIe GX++ adapter, connected to a single storage enclosure for high availability




Figure 24. Example of two processor drawers, each with a PCIe GX++ adapter, connected to a single storage enclosure for high availability

- 9. Cable the PCIe storage enclosure to the system as follows:
 - a. Complete all applicable prerequisites for installing your PCIe storage enclosure. For detailed procedures related to preparing to connect your PCIe storage enclosure, see Preparing to connect your PCIe storage enclosures.

- b. Add the PCIe storage enclosure to the system by choosing one of the following options:
 - To add the PCIe storage enclosure to the system with the system powered on (concurrently), complete the following steps:
 - 1) Record the current date and time for use later in the procedure when checking for serviceable events.
 - 2) Verify the existing PCIe hardware topology by completing the steps in Verifying the PCIe hardware topology (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/ p7ham/p7ham_pcistor_conntopverify.htm). All PCIe hardware topology problems that are discovered in this step must be corrected before continuing with this procedure.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system.

3) If the system has a rear cover, remove or open it.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system.

4) Locate the PCIe GX++ adapter or adapters to which the PCIe storage enclosure will be connected.

Note: This procedure assumes that the PCIe GX++ adapters are already installed. If the adapters are not installed, stop now and follow the instructions that came with the adapters to install them. After the PCIe GX++ adapters are installed, continue with the steps in this procedure to connect the PCI storage enclosure.

5) Using PCIe cables, connect the PCIe storage enclosure to the GX adapters that were identified in step 9b4.

Note: If you are connecting a PCIe cable to an unused PCIe connector that is covered with a plastic or metal clip, remove the clip before installing the PCIe cable.

6) Identify the PCIe link information that is associated with the connections to the PCIe storage enclosure by completing the following steps.

Note: Two PCIe links connect a PCIe storage enclosure.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system. Each system will host one of the PCIe links that connect the PCIe storage enclosure.

- a) Determine the location codes of the PCIe connectors on the system to which you connected the PCIe storage enclosure.
- b) Choose one of the following options:
 - If your system is managed by a Hardware Management Console (HMC), complete the following steps:
 - i. From the navigation bar, expand **Systems Management**.
 - ii. Click Servers.
 - iii. Select the server you are working with.
 - iv. In the Tasks area, expand Hardware Information.
 - v. Click PCIe Hardware Topology.
 - If your system is not managed by an HMC, complete the following steps:
 - i. Access the Advanced System Management Interface (ASMI) by using an authority level of administrator or authorized service provider. For details about using the ASMI, see Managing the Advanced System Management Interface (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7hby/ asmi.htm).

- ii. In the ASMI navigation area, expand **System Configuration**.
- iii. Click **PCIe Hardware Topology**.
- c) Scan the PCIe Hardware Topology data for entries with Host Port column values that match the location codes of the PCIe GX++ adapter connectors that you connected PCIe cables to in step 9b5 on page 19. For each match, complete the following steps:
 - i. Select the entry and click **Identify Indicators**.
 - ii. On the Identify Indicators display, select the entry with a Location column value that matches the Host Port column value from the PCIe Hardware Topology entry that you selected in step 9b6ci.
 - iii. Click Activate LED.
 - iv. Record the link identifier and the I/O slot identifier string for the PCIe link entry that you identified in step 9b6cii. The link identifier is in the Link ID column, and the I/O slot identifier string is in the I/O Slots column.
- d) Visually inspect the identify indicators for the PCIe connectors to which you connected the PCIe storage enclosure to verify that they are active.
- e) For each identify indicator that you recorded in step 9b6civ that is active, complete the following steps:
 - i. On the Identify Indicators display, select the entry with a Location column value that matches the Host Port column value from the PCIe Hardware Topology entry or entries that you selected in step 9b6ci.
 - ii. Click **Deactivate LED**.
- f) For each identify indicator that you recorded in step 9b6civ that is not active, complete the following steps.

Note: Identify indicators are not active if the PCIe cables are connected to the wrong PCIe connectors or the PCIe connector location codes were calculated incorrectly.

- i. On the Identify Indicators display, select the entry with a Location column value that matches the Host Port column value from the PCIe Hardware Topology entry or entries that you selected in step 9b6ci.
- ii. Click Deactivate LED.
- iii. Restart the procedure beginning at step 9b4 on page 19. If the problem persists with the entry or entries that you selected in step 9b6ci, contact your next level of support for assistance.
- 7) If the system has a rear cover, close it.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system.

- 8) If the power cords for the PCIe storage enclosure are not connected to the power source, connect them now. Then connect the power cords to the power supplies on the PCIe storage enclosure.
- 9) During the time that the PCIe storage enclosure is powering on and initializing, complete the following steps:
 - a) Verify that the green chassis power light-emitting diode (LED) comes on solid. This LED is located on the front of the enclosure, and it has an overlay with a lightning bolt symbol.
 - b) Verify that the green AC good LED and DC good LED on each of the two power supplies come on solid. These LEDs are located on the power supplies near the connectors for the power cords, and are clearly labeled AC and DC.
 - c) Verify that the amber fault LED on each power supply is off. This LED is labeled with an exclamation point (!).

Important: The PCIe storage enclosure usually requires no more than 5 minutes to power on and initialize. If any of the LED states previously described cannot be verified after 5 minutes have elapsed, there could be problems with the PCIe storage enclosure. Verify that the power cords are securely connected to the power supplies and the power source. If the problem persists, contact your next level of support for assistance.

10) For each of the two input/output (I/O) slots that you recorded in step 9b6civ on page 20, power on the I/O slot by choosing one of the following options.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system. Each system will host one of the I/O slots that connect the PCIe storage enclosure.

 If the I/O slot is assigned to a partition that is powered on, choose one of the following options.

Note: If your system is not managed by an HMC and is powered on to the firmware running state, choose one of the following options. The system is in firmware running state if there are active partitions.

- If the I/O slot is assigned to a partition that is powered on and running the Virtual I/O Server (VIOS) or AIX[®] operating system, continue with step 9b11.
- If the I/O slot is assigned to a partition that is powered on and running the operating system, continue with step 9b12 on page 22.
- If the I/O slot is assigned to a partition that is powered on and running the Linux operating system, continue with step 9b13 on page 22.
- If the I/O slot is not assigned to a partition that is powered on, continue with step 9b14 on page 23.

Note: If your system is powered on to firmware standby state, choose this option. The system is in firmware standby state if there are no active partitions.

- 11) Complete the following steps:
 - a) Log in to the operating system with admin or service level authority. If you need assistance, contact the system administrator.
 - b) Choose one of the following options:
 - If the partition is running the VIOS operating system, type diagmenu at the VIOS command prompt, and press Enter.
 - If the partition is running the AIX operating system, type diag at the AIX command prompt, and press Enter.
 - c) On the DIAGNOSTIC OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS display, press Enter to continue.
 - d) On the FUNCTION SELECTION display, use the arrow keys to select **Task Selection** (Diagnostics, Advanced Diagnostics, Service Aids, etc.), and press Enter.
 - e) On the TASKS SELECTION LIST display, use the arrow keys to select **Hot Plug Task**, and press Enter.
 - f) On the Hot Plug Task display, use the arrow keys to select **PCI Hot Plug Manager**, and press Enter.
 - g) On the PCI Hot Plug Manager display, use the arrow keys to select **Replace/Remove a PCI Hot Plug Adapter**, and press Enter.
 - h) On the Replace/Remove a PCI Hot Plug Adapter display, use the arrow keys to select the entry that has the identifier string of the I/O slot in the Slot column, and press Enter.
 - i) On the Replace/Remove a PCI Hot Plug Adapter display, use the Tab key to select the **Replace** operation, and press Enter.

Note: The **Replace** operation is the default selection.

- j) Follow the online instructions to complete the replace operation. However, do not perform the steps to physically remove and replace the adapter.
- k) If you have another I/O slot to power on, return to step 9b10 on page 21. Otherwise, continue with step 9b15 on page 23.
- 12) Complete the following steps:
 - a) Log in to the operating system with admin or service level authority. If you need assistance, contact the system administrator.
 - b) At the command prompt, type strsst and press Enter.
 - c) Type the service tools user ID and service tools password on the System Service Tools (SST) Sign On display, and press Enter.
 - d) Select the **Start a service tool** option, and press Enter.
 - e) Select the **Hardware service manager** option, and press Enter.
 - f) Select the Packaging hardware resources (systems, frames, cards) option, and press
 - g) On the Packaging Hardware Resources display, locate the entry that contains the I/O slot. To make this identification, scan the display for an entry that has a Description value of System Unit and a Unit ID that matches the U label portion of the I/O slot identifier string. The U label portion is the substring that begins with U and continues until the first dash (-) character.
 - h) Type 9 in the Opt column for the system unit entry that you located in step 9b12g, and press Enter.

Note: Specifying option 9 starts the Hardware contained within package view for the selected packaging hardware resource.

- i) On the Packaging Hardware Resources display, locate the entry for the I/O slot. To make this identification, scan the display for an entry that has a Location column value that, when appended to the Unit ID value in the upper right corner, forms the complete I/O slot identifier string.
- j) Type 3 in the Opt column for the entry that you located in step 9b12i, and press Enter.

Note: Specifying option 3 starts the Hardware Resource Concurrent Maintenance menu for the selected packaging hardware resource.

- k) On the Hardware Resource Concurrent Maintenance display, start the Power off domain function by pressing **F9**.
- I) Follow the online instructions to complete the power-off operation.
- m) On the Hardware Resource Concurrent Maintenance display, start the Power on domain function by pressing **F10**.
- n) Follow the online instructions to complete the power-on operation.
- o) If you have another I/O slot to power on, return to step 9b10 on page 21. Otherwise, continue with step 9b15 on page 23.
- 13) Complete the following steps:
 - a) Log in to the operating system with admin or service level authority. If you need assistance, contact the system administrator.
 - b) At the Linux command prompt, type drslot chrp pci -R -s io slot identifier (where *io_slot_identifier* is the identifier string of the I/O slot), and press Enter.
 - c) Follow the online instructions to complete the replace operation. However, do not perform the steps to physically remove and replace the adapter.
 - d) If you have another I/O slot to power on, return to step 9b10 on page 21. Otherwise, continue with step 9b15 on page 23.

- 14) Complete the following steps:
 - a) Choose one of the following options:
 - If your system is managed by an HMC, complete the following steps:
 - i. From the navigation bar, expand Systems Management.
 - ii. Click Servers.
 - iii. Select the server you are working with.
 - iv. In the Tasks area, expand Hardware Information.
 - v. Click PCIe Hardware Topology.
 - If your system is not managed by an HMC, complete the following steps:
 - i. Access the ASMI by using an authority level of administrator or authorized service provider. For details about using the ASMI, see Managing the Advanced System Management Interface (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7hby/asmi.htm).
 - ii. In the ASMI navigation area, expand System Configuration.
 - iii. Click PCIe Hardware Topology.
 - b) Scan the PCIe Hardware Topology data for a value in the I/O Slots column that matches the identifier string of the I/O slot, and select the entry.
 - c) Click Probe Link.

Important: If the Probe Link function fails, verify that the I/O slot is not owned by a partition that is powered on. Then choose from the following options:

- If you determine that the I/O slot is owned by a partition that is powered on, return to step 9b10 on page 21 and choose the alternative option that supports an I/O slot assigned to a partition that is powered on.
- If you are certain the I/O slot is not owned by a partition that is powered on, contact your next level of support for assistance.
- d) If you have another I/O slot to power on, return to step 9b10 on page 21. Otherwise, continue with step 9b15.
- 15) Verify the PCIe hardware topology by completing the steps in Verifying the PCIe hardware topology (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7ham/p7ham_pcistor_conntopverify.htm).
 - While you are completing the verification steps of that procedure, confirm that the PCIe links that connect the PCIe storage enclosure being added have Link Status column values of Operational and valid I/O Enclosure Port column values. The I/O Enclosure Port column value looks similar to Uxxxx.001.yyyyyyy-P1-Cz-T3, where xxxx is the feature code of the PCIe storage enclosure connected by the PCIe link, yyyyyyy is the serial number of the PCIe storage enclosure connected by the PCIe link, and z is either 1 or 2. An example of an actual I/O Enclosure Port column value is UEDR1.001.6BAH004-P1-C1-T3.

Important: If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system.

Requirement: All PCIe hardware topology problems that are discovered in this step must be corrected before continuing with this procedure.

16) Check for and handle new serviceable events that were generated during the procedure by completing the steps in Checking for new serviceable events (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7ham/p7ham_genfile_checkevents.htm). Use the date and time information that you recorded in step 9b1 on page 19 as the start time for searching for new serviceable events.

- **Important:** If the PCIe storage enclosure is connected to two systems, complete this step for each system.
- 17) Verify the new configuration. For details, see Verifying that the new configuration is functioning (http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7ham/p7ham_pcistor_connverify.htm).
- 18) If the system is managed by an HMC, is not in the manufacturing default configuration, and the I/O slots associated with the connection to the PCIe storage enclosure are not assigned to logical partitions, you can now assign them. The ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure can hold up to 30 solid-state drives (SSDs). The SSDs are physically organized in a single device partition within the enclosure. The devices cannot be split into separate physical groups.

As shown in the following figure, the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure (A) supports the attachment of up to two optional 58/87 disk drive enclosures (B) by using EX cables (C) for increased storage capacity.




Figure 25. Connection of two 58/87 disk drive enclosures by using EX cables to a PCIe storage enclosure

The 58/87 disk drive enclosures must contain only hard disk drives (HDDs). The internal SSDs and any HDDs from attached 58/87 disk drive enclosures are controlled by the dual PCIe2 SAS RAID controllers contained within the PCIe storage enclosure. SSDs and HDDs cannot be mixed in the same RAID array.

The ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure is supported by the following operating systems:

- AIX
- Linux
- VIOS

Note: VIOS does not support the ED/R1 PCIe storage enclosure for an client.

To determine the level of software that you need to support the PCIe storage enclosure feature, see IBM Prerequisite.

Tip: If you are planning to configure RAID arrays, ensure that you have the minimum number of available disks for each RAID level:

RAID 0

Minimum of one drive per array

RAID 5

Minimum of three drives per array

RAID 6

Minimum of four drives per array

RAID 10

Minimum of two drives per array

Best performance is achieved when the access characteristics on each disk array have a balanced workload. This happens when the two controllers have an equal number of disk arrays with active paths to the disk units.




Figure 26. Model 02E/4C connections for expansion units, disk drive enclosures, and PCle storage enclosures




Figure 27. Model 05E/6C connections for expansion units, disk drive enclosures, and PCIe storage enclosures




Figure 28. Model 31E/1C connections for disk drive enclosures and PCIe storage enclosures




Figure 29. Model 31E/2C connections for expansion units and disk drive enclosures




Figure 30. Model 31E/2C connections for PCIe storage enclosures




Figure 31. Model ED/R1 connector locations




Figure 32. Model 58/87 connector locations
