With 6,400 students and a nearly one-to-one PC to student ratio, Muskogee Public Schools in Oklahoma takes pride in being able to offer learning tools to students and faculty via the Internet and special software applications.

But like many public school systems, Muskogee has to make the most out of limited resources. That is especially true for the technology department, which consists of only four technicians, including Director of Technology Ronnie Chandler.

Chandler and his team recently began to deploy over 1,200 new desktop PCs in the school system, and they needed a reliable server solution to manage the network.
