Statement 1:

To Disconnect:

- 1. Turn everything OFF.
- 2. First, remove power cords from outlet.
- 3. Remove signal cables from connectors.
- 4. Remove all cables from devices.

Statement 2:



CAUTION:

When replacing the lithium battery, use only IBM Part Number 33F8354 or an equivalent type battery recommended by the manufacturer. If the system has a module containing a lithium battery, replace it only with the same module type made by the same manufacturer. The battery contains lithium and can explode if not properly used, handled, or disposed of.

Do not:

- · Throw or immerse into water
- Heat to more than 100°C (212°F)
- Repair or disassemble

Chapter 1. Introduction

This *Option Installation Guide* contains instructions for installing, removing, and connecting optional devices that your server supports.

Related documentation

In addition to this *Option Installation Guide*, the following documentation comes with the server:

· User's Guide

This document is in Portable Document Format (PDF) on the IBM *xSeries*[®] *Documentation* CD. It contains general information about the server, including information about features, how to configure the server, and how to get help.

· Installation Guide

This printed document contains instructions for setting up the server and basic instructions for installing some options.

Safety Information

This document is in PDF on the IBM *xSeries Documentation* CD. It contains translated caution and danger statements. Each caution and danger statement that appears in the documentation has a number that you can use to locate the corresponding statement in your language in the *Safety Information* document.

· Rack Installation Instructions

This printed document contains instructions for installing the server in a rack.

Hardware Maintenance Manual and Troubleshooting Guide

This document is in PDF on the IBM *xSeries Documentation* CD. It contains information to help you solve problems yourself, and it contains information for service technicians.



Major components of the xSeries 336 Type 8837 server

Blue on a component indicates touch points, where you can grip the component to remove it from or install it in the server, open or close a latch, and so on.


Orange on a component or an orange label on or near a component indicates that the component can be hot-swapped, which means that if the server and operating system support hot-swap capability, you can remove or install the component while the server is running. (Orange can also indicate touch points on hot-swap components.) See the instructions for removing or installing a specific hot-swap component for any additional procedures that you might have to perform before you remove or install the component.

The following illustration shows the major components in the server. This illustration shows a SCSI hot-swap hard disk drive model. A SATA non-hot-swap (simple swap) hard disk drive model is also available. The illustrations in this document might differ slightly from the hardware.




System-board internal cable connectors

The following illustration shows the jumpers on the system board.




Notes:

- 2. Any system-board switch or jumper blocks that are not shown in the illustrations in this document are reserved.


System-board external connectors

The following illustration shows the external input/output connectors on the system board.




System-board LEDs

The following illustration shows the light-emitting diodes (LEDs) on the system board.




System-board option connectors

The following illustration shows the connectors on the system board for user-installable options.




System-board cable channels

Light Path diagnostics panel

The following illustration shows the controls and LEDs on the Light Path diagnostics panel.



Use the Light Path diagnostics panel to diagnose system errors. The Light Path diagnostics panel is on the top of the operator information panel. To access the Light Path diagnostics panel, press the release latch to the left, on the front of the operator information panel; then, slide out the operator information panel.

For more information about Light Path diagnostics, see the *Hardware Maintenance Manual and Troubleshooting Guide* on the IBM *xSeries Documentation* CD.

The following table lists the LEDs on the Light Path diagnostics panel, the problems that they indicate, and actions to solve the problems. The actions in the table refer to two different error logs; the event error log and the POST error log.

- If a Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option is installed in the server, use the system event error log.
- If a Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option is not installed in the server, use the POST error log

Note: The Intelligent Platform Management Interface (IPMI) baseboard management controller (BMC) obtains system error information and lights up the appropriate Light Path LED.

The two error logs are in the Configuration/Setup Utility in the Event/Error logs option. For more information, see the *User's Guide*.

LED	Problem	Action
None	An error has occurred and cannot be diagnosed, or the ASM processor has failed. The error is not represented by a Light Path diagnostics LED.	Check the system error log for information about the error.
OVER SPEC	The power supplies are using more power than their maximum rating.	Replace the failing power supply, or remove optional devices from the server.
PS 1	When the LED is lit, the power supply in bay 1 has failed. When the LED flashes, an invalid power-supply configuration has occurred.	If the power supply has failed, call for service. If a configuration error has occurred, make sure that the power supply is installed correctly.

LED	Problem	Action
PS 2	When the LED is lit, the power supply in bay 2 has failed. When the LED flashes, an invalid power-supply configuration has occurred.	If the power supply has failed, call for service. If a configuration error has occurred, make sure that the power supply is installed correctly.
CPU	When the LED is lit, a microprocessor has failed. When the LED flashes, an invalid microprocessor configuration has occurred.	If a lit LED on the system board indicates a problem with a microprocessor, make sure that the microprocessor is installed correctly. See "Installing an additional microprocessor" on page 33 for information about installing a microprocessor.
		If the problem remains, call for service.
		If a configuration error has occurred, make sure that the microprocessors have the same cache size and type, and the same clock speed. Microprocessor internal and external clock frequencies must be identical.
VRM	When the LED is lit, an error occurred	Replace the VRM. If the problem remains, call for service.
	on the microprocessor voltage regulator module (VRM). When the LED flashes, an invalid VRM configuration has occurred.	If a configuration error has occurred, make sure that the VRM is installed correctly. If the problem remains, replace the VRM.
CNFG	When the LED flashes, a hardware configuration error has occurred.	Check the system error log for information about the error. The Light Path diagnostic LED for the component that is causing the configuration error also flashes.
MEM	When the LED is on, a memory error has occurred. When the LED flashes, an invalid DIMM configuration has occurred.	Replace the failing DIMM, which is indicated by the lit LED on the system board. If a configuration error has occurred, make sure the DIMMs are installed correctly.
NMI	A machine check error has occurred.	Check the system error log for information about the error.
S ERR	A soft error has occurred.	Check the system error log for information about the error.
SP	The service processor has failed.	Remove ac power from the server; then, reconnect the server to ac power and restart the server.
		If the problem remains, call for service.
DASD	A hard disk drive error has occurred.	Check the LEDs on the hard disk drives and replace the indicated drive.
FAN	When the LED is lit, a fan has failed or is operating too slowly. A failing fan can also cause the TEMP LED to be lit.	Replace the failing fan, which is indicated by the lit LED. If a configuration error has occurred, make sure that the fans are installed correctly.
	When the LED flashes, an invalid fan configuration has occurred.	
TEMP	The system temperature has exceeded a threshold level.	 Determine whether a fan has failed. If it has, replace it. Make sure that the air vents are not blocked. Make sure that the room temperature is not too high. See "Features and Specifications" in the <i>Installation Guide</i> or the <i>User's Guide</i> on the IBM <i>xSeries Documentation</i> CD for temperature information.
		If the problem remains, call for service.
BRD	An error has occurred on the system board or there is a battery fault.	 Check the LEDs on the system board to identify the component that is causing the error. Check the system error log for information about the error. Check the battery and replace it if it is defective.

LED	Problem	Action
PCI-A	An error has occurred on PCI bus A.	Check the PCI-Express Adapter in slot 2 for an error or there might be a general system board malfunction.
PCI-B	An error has occurred on PCI bus B.	Check the following items for errors:
		PCI/PCI-X Adapter in Slots 1 or 2.
		On-board SCSI.
		The system board might have a malfunction.
PCI-C	An error has occurred on PCI bus C.	Check the on-board Ethernet controllers or check for a general system board malfunction.

Chapter 2. Installing options

This chapter provides detailed instructions for installing hardware options in the server.

Installation guidelines

Before you begin installing options, read the following information:

- Read the safety information beginning on page v, "Working inside the server with the power on" on page 14, and "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 14.
 This information will help you work safely with the server and options.
- Make sure that you have an adequate number of properly grounded electrical outlets for the server, monitor, and other devices.
- · Back up all important data before you make changes to disk drives.
- You do not have to turn off the server to install or replace hot-swap power supplies or hot-swap fans.
- Blue on a component indicates touch points, where you can grip the component to remove it from or install it in the server, open or close a latch, and so on.
- Orange on a component or an orange label on or near a component indicates
 that the component can be hot-swapped, which means that if the server and
 operating system support hot-swap capability, you can remove or install the
 component while the server is running. (Orange can also indicate touch points on
 hot-swap components.) See the instructions for removing or installing a specific
 hot-swap component for any additional procedures that you might have to
 perform before you remove or install the component.
- For a list of supported options for the server, go to http://www.ibm.com/pc/compat/.

System reliability guidelines

To help make sure that the server has proper cooling and system reliability, make sure that you perform the following actions:

- Each of the drive bays has a drive or a filler panel and electromagnetic compatibility (EMC) shield installed in it.
- If the server has redundant power, each of the power-supply bays has a power supply installed in it.
- There is adequate space around the server to allow the server cooling system to
 work properly. Leave approximately 50 mm (2.0 in.) of open space around the
 front and rear of the server. Do not place objects in front of the fans. For proper
 cooling and airflow, replace the server cover before turning on the server.
 Operating the server for extended periods of time (more than 30 minutes) with
 the server cover removed might damage server components.
- · You have followed the cabling instructions that come with optional adapters.
- You have replaced a failed fan within 48 hours.
- When replacing a hot-swap fan, you have 5 minutes to install the new fan or the server will shutdown.
- You have replaced a hot-swap drive within 2 minutes of removal.

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Working inside the server with the power on

The server supports hot-swap devices and is designed to operate safely while it is turned on and the access doors are open. Follow these guidelines when you work inside a server that is turned on:

- Avoid wearing loose-fitting clothing on your forearms. Button long-sleeved shirts before working inside the server; do not wear cuff links while you are working inside the server.
- · Do not allow your necktie or scarf to hang inside the server.
- Remove jewelry, such as bracelets, necklaces, rings, and loose-fitting wrist watches.
- Remove items from your shirt pocket, such as pens and pencils, that could fall into the server as you lean over it.
- Avoid dropping any metallic objects, such as paper clips, hairpins, and screws, into the server.

Handling static-sensitive devices

Attention: Static electricity can damage the server and other electronic devices. To avoid damage, keep static-sensitive devices in their static-protective packages until you are ready to install them.

To reduce the possibility of damage from electrostatic discharge, observe the following precautions:

- Limit your movement. Movement can cause static electricity to build up around you.
- · Wear an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap, if one is available.
- Handle the device carefully, holding it by its edges or its frame.
- Do not touch solder joints, pins, or exposed circuitry.
- · Do not leave the device where others can handle and damage it.
- While the device is still in its static-protective package, touch it to an unpainted metal part of the server for at least 2 seconds. This drains static electricity from the package and from your body.
- Remove the device from its package and install it directly into the server without setting down the device. If it is necessary to set down the device, put it back into its static-protective package. Do not place the device on the server cover or on a metal surface.
- Take additional care when handling devices during cold weather. Heating reduces indoor humidity and increases static electricity.

Server power features

When the server is connected to an ac power source but is not turned on, the operating system does not run, and all core logic except for the BMC is shut down; however, the server can respond to requests from the service processor, such as a remote request to turn on the server. The power-on LED flashes to indicate that the server is connected to ac power but is not turned on.

Turning on the server

When you connect the server to ac power, the power supply fans turn on immediately. Pressing the power-control button lets you turn on the server and start the operating system.

The server can also be turned on in any of the following ways:

- If a power failure occurs while the server is turned on, the server will restart automatically when power is restored.
- If your operating system supports the system-management software for the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option, the system-management software can turn on the server.
- If your operating system supports the Wake on LAN[®] feature, the Wake on LAN feature can turn on the server.

Turning off the server

When you turn off the server and leave it connected to ac power, the power supply fans continue to run and the server can respond to requests from the service processor, such as a remote request to turn on the server. To remove all power from the server, you must disconnect it from the power source.

Some operating systems require an orderly shutdown before you turn off the server. See your operating-system documentation for information about shutting down the operating system.


Statement 5:

The power control button on the device and the power switch on the power supply do not turn off the electrical current supplied to the device. The device also might have more than one power cord. To remove all electrical current from the device, ensure that all power cords are disconnected from the power source.



The server can be turned off in any of the following ways:


 You can turn off the server from the operating system, if your operating system supports this feature. After an orderly shutdown of the operating system, the server will be turned off automatically.

- · You can press the power-control button to start an orderly shutdown of the operating system and turn off the server, if your operating system supports this feature.
- · If the operating system stops functioning, you can press and hold the power-control button for more than 4 seconds to turn off the server.
- · If you installed the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option in the server, the server can be turned off from the Remote Supervisor Adapter II user interface.
- · If the Wake on LAN feature turned on the server, the Wake on LAN feature can turn off the server.
- The baseboard management controller can turn off the server as an automatic response to a critical system failure.
- You can turn off the server through a request from the service processor.

Removing the server cover

Complete the following steps to remove the server cover:

Attention: Before removing the server cover, remove the server from the rack and open the two fan doors. See the following illustration.



- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Remove the server from the rack:
 - a. Disconnect the cables and pull the server out of the rack, about a third of the way, until it stops. The cables should be left routed in the cable management arm.
 - b. Slide both side release latches toward the front of the server. Make sure that rail-lock pins are in a vertical position and pull the server out and remove it from the rack.
- 3. Open both fan doors, fan door A and fan door B. To open fan door A, slide the slide latch to the left, and lift the door panel up. To open fan door B, slide the two slide latches to the right, and lift the door panel up.
- 4. Remove the server cover:
 - a. Lift up the cover release latch and slide the cover to the rear of the server.
 - b. Make sure that the server cover slides away from the insets that are on the front, rear, and sides of the server cover.
 - c. Lift the cover off the server and set the cover aside.

Attention: For proper cooling and airflow, replace the server cover before turning on the server. Operating the server for extended periods of time (more than 30 minutes) with the server cover removed might damage server components.

Installing an adapter


The following notes describe the types of adapters the server supports and other information you must consider when installing an adapter:

Locate the documentation that comes with the adapter and follow those
instructions in addition to the instructions in this section. If you need to change
the switch setting or jumper settings on the adapter, follow the instructions that
come with the adapter.

- There are several different types of adapters you can install, depending on which slots are available. The following information and illustration identify which types of adapters you can install in PCI slots 1 and 2 and where these slots are located on the system board:
 - Slot 1: You can install only a PCI-X low-profile adapter into slot 1.
 - Slot 2: You can install any PCI-X or PCI-Express adapter into slot 2.

Note: For the PCI-Express adapter, you must install an optional riser card on the system board.

The following illustration shows the location of, and access to, the riser card retention latches for the slot 1 and 2 riser cards.



- When the server starts (boots), it starts the system devices in the following order, if you have not changed the default boot precedence:
 - Integrated Ethernet controllers
 - Integrated SCSI controller
 - PCI-X slot 1
 - PCI-X or PCI-Express slot 2

Complete the following steps to install an adapter:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Turn off the server and peripheral devices, and disconnect the power cords and all external cables. Remove the server cover (see "Removing the server cover" on page 17).
- 3. Follow the cabling instructions, if any come with the adapter. Route the adapter cables before you install the adapter. See "System-board cable channels" on page 9 for cable routing information.

Installing a low-profile adapter into adapter slot 1

Complete the following steps to install the low-profile adapter:


- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Remove the expansion-slot cover from adapter slot 1. From the rear of the server, push the slot 1 expansion cover to the left and then toward the inside of the server. Remove the slot 1 expansion cover and store it in a safe place.

Note: You might have to use a coin or screwdriver to slide the expansion-slot cover to the left.

- 3. Remove the adapter from the static-protective package and set any jumpers or switches on the adapter as directed by the adapter manufacturer.
- 4. Slide the I/O connector portion of the adapter through the slot 1 opening.

Attention: When you install an adapter, make sure that the adapter is correctly seated in the connector before you turn on the server. An improperly seated adapter might cause damage to the system board, the riser card, or the adapter.

- 5. As you start inserting the adapter through the slot 1 opening, align the edge connector, on the low-profile adapter, with the connector on the riser card. Press the edge connector *firmly* into the riser-card connector. Make sure that the adapter snaps into the riser card securely and that the adapter is lying on top of the low-profile adapter support.
- 6. Push the adapter past the tab, so that the adapter snaps into place on the support.



- 7. Check the retention latches on the riser card and make sure that they are still securely in place.
- 8. Connect any internal cables to the adapter. See the instructions that come with the adapter for details.

Attention: Make sure that the cables do not block the flow of air from the fans. For cable routing areas on the system board, see "System-board cable channels" on page 9.

- 9. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now.
- 10. Go to "Completing the installation" on page 44.


Installing an adapter into adapter slot 2

Complete the following steps to install an adapter into adapter slot 2:


- Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Open the retention latches on both sides of the slot 2 riser card. Push the clips down, away from the riser card, until the latches are no longer attached to the riser card.

Note: Insert your finger into the access hole on the slot 2 adapter cover to open the retention latch at the rear of the server.

The following illustration shows the location of the slot 2 riser-card connector and riser-card retention latches.



- 3. Lift up and remove the slot 2 adapter cover. The slot 2 riser card is attached to the adapter cover, and is removed along with the adapter cover. The following illustration identifies the components that are referred to in this procedure.
- 4. Remove the expansion-slot cover from the adapter cover:
 - a. Turn the adapter cover so that the expansion-slot cover is facing you.
 - b. Slide the expansion-slot cover to the left. (You might need to use a coin or screwdriver to slide the expansion-slot cover.)
 - c. Push the expansion-slot cover in toward the inside of the adapter cover.
 - d. Remove the expansion slot 2 cover. Store the cover in a safe place.




Note: If you are installing a PCI-Express type adapter, you need an optional riser card to plug the adapter into the system board.

- 5. Prior to installing a full-length adapter, rotate the PCI-adapter retainer bracket 90° away from the adapter cover, to allow insertion of the adapter.
- 6. Slide the I/O connector portion of the adapter through the connector slot opening.
- 7. As you insert the adapter through the slot opening, align the adapter edge connector with the riser-card connector and press the adapter *firmly* into the connector. Make sure that the adapter snaps into place and is securely in the riser-card connector.

Attention: When you install an adapter, make sure that you seat the adapter correctly in the riser-card connector before you turn on the server. An improperly seated adapter might cause damage to the system board, the riser card, or the adapter.

- 8. If you installed a full-length adapter, return the PCI-adapter retainer bracket back to its original position by rotating the PCI-adapter retainer bracket back 90° toward the adapter cover. Place the adapter between the upper and lower guides of the PCI-adapter retainer bracket.
- 9. Make sure that the PCI-adapter retainer bracket is flush against the adapter cover.



- 10. Insert the riser card into the riser-card connector on the system board. Grasp the top of the adapter cover and align the riser card with the guides for the riser-card connector. Press the riser card edge connector *firmly* into the slot 2 riser-card connector on the system board.
- 11. Make sure that the retention latches snap into place to secure the slot 2 riser card into the slot 2 riser-card connector.
- 12. Connect any internal cables to the adapter. See the instructions that come with the adapter for details.

Attention: Make sure that the cables do not block the flow of air from the fans. See "System-board cable channels" on page 9 for cable routing information.




The xSeries 336 server supports the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine. The Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine does not use a PCI slot in the xSeries 336. The Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option connects directly to the system board.

Complete the following steps to install the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine:

- 3. Install the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine cover:
 - a. Hook the four cover snaps on the right side of the cover to the adapter (the side closest to the power-supply bay).
 - b. Rotate the adapter toward the cover and hook the left cover snaps to the adapter.



- 4. The server comes with mounting brackets on the system board. There are front and rear mounting brackets that hold the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine in place. Align the locating pin on the adapter to the alignment hole on the rear mounting bracket; then, slide the rear of the adapter underneath the flanges of the rear mounting bracket.
- 5. Push the front of the adapter down onto the front mounting bracket. Push the adapter down, until it snaps into place.


- The server supports the following three configurations:
 - Configuration 1
 - Four 2.5-inch hot-swap SCSI hard disk drives
 - Configuration 2
 - Two 3.5-inch slim hot-swap SCSI hard disk drives
 - One 9.5-mm-high DVD-ROM drive (optional)
 - Configuration 3
 - Two 3.5-inch non-hot-swap (simple swap) Serial ATA (SATA) hard disk drives
 - One 9.5-mm-high DVD-ROM drive (optional)
- Both SCSI configuration models of the server come with a hot-swap SCSI backplane.
- The SCSI server models support low voltage differential (LVD) hot-swap drives.
 Each hot-swap drive is in a tray, which has a green activity LED and an amber status LED in the upper-right corner. These LEDs are lit if the drive is active and, in some cases, if the drive fails.
- Each hot-swap drive has a single-connector-attached (SCA) connector, which
 connects directly to the hot-swap SCSI backplane. The backplane attaches to
 connector J-35 on the system board and controls the SCSI IDs for the hot-swap
 drives.
- A simple swap hard disk drive does not have a backplane, and it does not have indicator LEDs. Simple swap hard disk drives have a simple swap connection design. The simple swap design has a panel-mount connection at the rear of the hard disk drive cage, which enables the simple swap hard disk drives to easily connect to both the signal and power connections.
- Before you install any type of hard disk drive, read the following information:
 - Inspect the drive tray for signs of damage before inserting the hard disk drive.
 - Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- If you are installing a hot-swap drive, continue with "Installing a hot-swap hard disk drive" on page 25. If you are installing a simple swap drive, go to "Installing a simple swap hard disk drive" on page 26.

Installing a hot-swap hard disk drive

If you are installing a 2.5-inch hot-swap drive, continue with "Installing a 2.5-inch hot-swap hard disk drive." If you are installing a 3.5-inch hot-swap drive, go to "Installing a 3.5-inch hot-swap hard disk drive" on page 26.





- 3. Insert the simple swap hard disk drive into the drive tray assembly.
- 4. Slide the drive into the bay until the rear of the drive snaps into place with the rear panel-mount connector. This simple swap connector contains the signal and power connections that are needed by the SATA drive.
- 5. Install the filler panel for the drive.
- 6. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now.
- 7. Go to "Completing the installation" on page 44.

Removing and installing an internal DVD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM blank bezel

The following notes describe the type of DVD-ROM drive the server supports and other information that you must consider when installing a DVD-ROM drive:

- The server supports the installation of an optional DVD-ROM drive only when you are using a 3.5-inch hard disk drive configuration.
- The DVD-ROM drive must be a slim 9.5 mm drive and you install it underneath the 3.5-inch hard disk drive, on the left side.





Installing a memory module

The following notes describe the types of dual inline memory modules (DIMMs) that the server supports and contains other information that you must consider when installing DIMMs:

- The server supports up to eight PC3200 DDR II ECC Registered SDRAM DIMMs. The server supports a minimum of 512 MB and a maximum of 16 GB of installed memory.
- The server uses interleaved DIMMs; you must add, remove, or replace DIMMs in pairs. Each pair must be of the same type, capacity, and speed.
- The server supports 256 MB, 512 MB, 1 GB, and 2 GB DIMMs. See the ServerProven[®] list at http://www.ibm.com/pc/compat/ for a list of memory modules that the server supports.
- The server comes with one pair of DIMMs installed in DIMM slots 1 and 2 on the system board. The server comes with a minimum of 512 MB (two 256 MB DIMMs).
- You can increase the amount of memory in the server by replacing them with higher-capacity DIMMs or by installing an additional pair of DIMMs into the remaining available slots. The following illustration shows the memory slots on the system board.



Note: When installing additional DIMMs, always install them in pairs starting with slots 1 and 2

The server supports Chipkill[™] memory technology, which enables the server to function with one bad chip on a DIMM. The bad memory module must be on a x4 DIMM. The 256 MB and 512 MB x8 DIMMs do not support Chipkill memory. See the following table for the supported Chipkill memory configurations.

 The server also supports memory sparing; however, memory sparing and memory mirroring cannot be used at the same time. The sparing feature disables the failed memory from the system configuration and activates a memory sparing pair of DIMMs to replace the failed active DIMM pair.

Before you can enable the memory sparing feature, you must install one additional pair of DIMMs. The memory sparing DIMM pair must be the same speed, type, and the same size as or larger than the active DIMM pair.

To enable memory mirroring or sparing through the Configuration/Setup Utility program, select **Advanced Setup** from the main menu, and select **Memory Configuration**. For more information about using the Configuration/Setup Utility program, see the *Users Guide*. See the following table for memory-sparing DIMM connector assignments.


 When you restart the server after adding or removing a DIMM, the server displays a message that the memory configuration has changed.

Complete the following steps to install a DIMM:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Turn off the server and peripheral devices and disconnect all power cords and external cables (see "Turning off the server" on page 15); then, remove the cover (see "Removing the server cover" on page 17).

Attention:

- Avoid touching the components and gold-edge connectors on the DIMMs.
 Make sure that the DIMMs are completely and correctly seated in the slots.
 Incomplete insertion might cause damage to the system board or to the DIMMs.
- When you handle static-sensitive devices, take precautions to avoid damage from static electricity. For information about handling these devices, see "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 14.
- To avoid breaking the retaining clips or damaging the DIMM slots, open and close the clips gently. Do not force the DIMM into the slot.
- 3. Open the retaining clip on each end of the DIMM connector.
- 4. Touch the static-protective package containing the DIMM to any unpainted metal surface on the server; then, remove the DIMM from the package.



- 5. Turn the DIMM so that the DIMM keys align correctly with the slot.
- 6. Install the DIMM in the slot. Firmly press the DIMM straight down into the connector by applying pressure on both ends of the DIMM simultaneously. The retaining clips snap into the locked position when the DIMM is firmly seated in the connector. If there is a gap between the DIMM and the retaining clips, the DIMM has not been correctly inserted; open the retaining clips, remove the DIMM, and then reinsert it.


Installing an additional microprocessor

The following notes describe the type of microprocessor that the server supports and other information that you must consider when installing a microprocessor:

 The server supports up to two microprocessors (two-way support); the IBM xSeries 336 server comes with one Xeon microprocessor installed. With two microprocessors, the server can operate as a symmetric multiprocessing (SMP) server.

With SMP, application programs can distribute the processing load between the microprocessors. This enhances performance for database and point-of-sale applications, integrated manufacturing solutions, and other applications.

• The following illustration shows the microprocessor sockets and the voltage regulator module (VRM) slots on the system board.



 If you install a second microprocessor in the server, microprocessor 1 is installed in microprocessor socket 1 (U16), and microprocessor 2 is installed in socket 2 (U32).

You must also install the following items that come with the second microprocessor:

- A voltage regulator module (VRM) that plugs into VRM connector J25
- A cooling fan that plugs into fan position 4

Notes:

- Read the documentation that comes with the microprocessor to determine whether you must update the basic input/output system (BIOS) code. The most current level of BIOS code for the server is available at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.
- 2. A new microprocessor comes in a kit with a VRM, a cooling fan, and a heat sink.
- 3. To use SMP, obtain an SMP-capable operating system (optional). For a list of supported operating systems, go to http://www.ibm.com/pc/us/compat/.

Attention: To avoid damage and to help ensure proper server operation, review the following information before you install a microprocessor:


- Make sure that the microprocessors are the same type, have the same cache size, and have the same clock speed.
- Make sure that the microprocessor internal and external clock frequencies are identical.
- See the ServerProven list at http://www.ibm.com/pc/compat/ for a list of microprocessors that the server supports.

Complete the following steps to install a microprocessor:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Turn off the server and peripheral devices, and disconnect the power cords and all external cables.
- 3. Remove the server cover.

Attention: When you handle static-sensitive devices, take precautions to avoid damage from static electricity. For details about handling these devices, see "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 14.

- 4. If you are installing a microprocessor in the microprocessor 2 socket, *first* install a VRM in the microprocessor 2 VRM slot (J-25) and remove the protective cover, if supplied, from the microprocessor 2 socket.
- 5. Install the microprocessor:
 - a. Touch the static-protective package that contains the new microprocessor to any *unpainted* metal surface on the server; then, remove the microprocessor from the package.




 Rotate the locking lever on the microprocessor socket from its closed and locked position until it stops or clicks in the fully open position (approximately 135° angle).

Note: The microprocessor-release lever is on the side of the socket that faces the rear of the server.

Attention:


- 1) To avoid bending the pins on the microprocessor, do not use excessive force when pressing it into the socket.
- 2) Make sure the microprocessor is correctly positioned and aligned before closing the microprocessor-release lever.




- c. Position the microprocessor over the microprocessor socket; then, carefully press the microprocessor into the socket.
- 6. Close the microprocessor-release lever to secure the microprocessor.

Attention:

- Do not disturb or contaminate the thermal grease on the bottom of the new heat sink. Doing so damages its heat-conducting capability and exposes the new microprocessor to overheating.
- If you have to remove the heat sink after installing it, note that the thermal
 grease might have formed a strong bond between the heat sink and the
 microprocessor. Do not force the heat sink and microprocessor apart; doing
 so can damage the microprocessor pins. Loosen one captive screw fully
 before loosening the other captive screw to help break the bond between
 the components without damaging them.



7. Remove the heat sink from its package and remove the cover from the bottom of the heat sink. Make sure that the thermal grease is still on the bottom of the heat sink and position the heat sink on top of the microprocessor. Press firmly on the captive screws and tighten them, alternating between screws until they are tight. Do not overtighten the screws by using excessive force.



- 8. Install fan 4, in front of the second microprocessor. See "Replacing a hot-swap fan" on page 41 for instructions.
- 9. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now.

Installing and removing a hot-swap power supply

The server supports a maximum of two hot-swap power supplies.




Hazardous voltage, current, and energy levels are present inside any component that has this label attached. There are no serviceable parts inside these components. If you suspect a problem with one of these parts, contact a service technician.

The following notes describe the type of power supply that the server supports and other information that you must consider when installing a power supply:

- The server comes with one 585-watt hot-swap power supply as standard. The input voltage is 110 V ac or 220 V ac auto-sensing.
- You can install an optional 585-watt hot-swap power supply to use as a redundant power supply.
- These power supplies are designed for parallel operation. In the event of a power supply failure, the redundant power supply continues to power the system. Two power supplies are supported per server.
- See "Using Y power-cord connectors for power backup" on page 40 for information on how to properly connect Y power-cord connectors to backup power supplies.

The following illustration shows the power-supply connectors and their associated LEDs on the back of the server. The AC LED is the top LED and the DC LED is the bottom LED.







- 4. Connect the power cord for the new power supply to the power-cord connector on the power supply. If redundant power supplies are installed in the server, see "Using Y power-cord connectors for power backup" on page 40 for additional information.
- 5. Connect the power cord to a properly grounded electrical outlet.
- Make sure that the power-supply fan starts and the ac power LED (top) and dc power LED (bottom) on the power supply are lit, indicating that the power supply is operating correctly. The two green LEDs are to the left of the power-cord connector.

Removing a power supply

Before you replace an existing power supply, you must remove the old one. Complete the following steps to remove a hot-swap power supply:


- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Disconnect the power cords:
 - If the server has only one power supply installed in it, turn off the server and peripheral devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables (see "Turning off the server" on page 15).
 - If the server has redundant power supplies, disconnect the power cord from the power supply that is being replaced.

- 3. Push the power-supply handle to the left and then down to release the power supply.
- 4. Pull the power supply all the way out of the power-supply bay.
- Install a new power supply by following the instructions in "Installing a power supply" on page 38, or reinstall the blank cover to keep the server from overheating.

Using Y power-cord connectors for power backup

When you have multiple servers with redundant power supplies, use Y power-cords to provide connection to the backup power-supply (Back-UPS) units. The Back-UPS unit provides temporary power to the connected devices if there is a power outage in the network. The Back-UPS unit must be connected correctly to ensure optimum power backup to the servers.

Connect the Y power cord to two power supplies, in two different servers, then connect the other end of the Y power cord to a Back-UPS unit. The following illustration shows the proper connection between the servers with the Y power-cord.




This connection method provides the server with two different and independent backup power sources: one Back-UPS unit for power supply 1 on both servers and another Back-UPS unit for power supply 2 (redundant power supply) on both servers.



Replacing a hot-swap fan

The server comes with a maximum of seven hot-swap fans. If the server has one microprocessor, it has six fans. If you install a second microprocessor, the seventh fan, fan 4, comes with the optional second microprocessor.

Attention: To ensure proper server operation, if a fan fails, replace it as soon as possible.





Complete the following steps to replace a hot-swap-fan:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page v and "Installation guidelines" on page 13.
- 2. Open the fan door for the failing fan. The LED near the connector of the failing fan assembly is lit.

Attention: To ensure proper system cooling, do not leave the fan doors open for more than 30 minutes during this procedure.

- 3. Disconnect the cable of the failing fan from the connector.
- 4. Pull up on the orange tab on the side of the failing fan; then, lift the fan out of the server.
- 5. Orient the new fan in the same position as the fan you removed. Make sure that the airflow indicator, on top of the fan, is pointing to the rear of the server.
- 6. Push the fan assembly down into the server until the blue grommets are correctly seated.
- 7. Connect the fan cable to the fan connector.
- 8. Close the fan door.
- 9. Go to "Completing the installation" on page 44.

Replacing the battery

The following notes describe information that you must consider when replacing the battery:





 - a. Use one finger to pull the retainer tab that secures the battery to its housing.
 - b. Use one finger to slide the battery up and out from its socket.
- 7. Insert the new battery:
 - a. Hold the battery so that the plus side of the battery is facing toward the center of the server, toward slots 1 and 2.
 - b. Pull the retainer tab out of the way so that you can slide the battery into its socket.
 - c. Slide the battery down until it snaps into place.
- 8. Reconnect the internal cables that you disconnected.
- 9. Reinstall the server cover, connect all cables and power cords, and set the required configuration parameters (see "Completing the installation" on page 44).



Installing the server cover

Complete the following steps to install the server cover:

1. Position the internal cables so that they do not interfere with the cover installation. See "System-board cable channels" on page 9 for information about cable routing.

Important: Before sliding the cover forward, make sure that all the tabs on both the front, rear, and side of the cover engage the chassis correctly. If all the tabs do not engage the chassis correctly, it will be very difficult to remove the cover later.



- 2. Position the cover on top of the server and slide it forward.
- 3. Press down on the cover release latch until the cover properly engages all the inset tabs on the server.
- 4. Close the fan doors.
- 5. Install the server in the rack. See the Rack Installation Instructions that come with the server for details.



Updating the server configuration

After you add or remove an internal option or external SCSI device, you might receive a message that the configuration has changed when you start the server for the first time. The Configuration/Setup Utility program starts automatically so that you can save the new configuration settings. For more information, see the section about configuring the server in the *User's Guide* on the IBM *xSeries Documentation* CD.

Some options have device drivers that you must install. See the documentation that comes with each option for information about installing device drivers.

The server comes with at least one microprocessor. If you install a second one, the server can operate as a symmetric multiprocessing (SMP) server. You might have to upgrade the operating system to support SMP. For more information, see the section about using the $ServerGuide^{TM}$ Setup and Installation CD in the User's Guide and the operating-system documentation.

If the server has an optional RAID adapter and you have installed or removed a hard disk drive, see the documentation that comes with the RAID adapter for information about reconfiguring the disk arrays.

If you have installed the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine option to manage the server remotely, see the *Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine User's Guide*, which comes with the adapter, for information about setting up, configuring, and using the adapter.




Rear view

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Auxiliary-device (pointing device) connector

Connect a Category 3, 4, or 5 unshielded twisted-pair cable to this connector. The 100BASE-TX and 1000BASE-T Fast Ethernet standards require Category 5 or higher cabling.

Notes:

- The server has three Ethernet connectors. Two of the Ethernet connectors are attached to the Ethernet controllers. See the IBM xSeries 336 Type 8837 User's Guide on the IBM xSeries Documentation CD for more information about the Ethernet controllers.
- 2. The third Ethernet connector is a dedicated connector that is active only when you install an optional Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine. This dedicated connector is the Remote Supervisor Adapter II SlimLine Ethernet connector.

Keyboard connector


Use this connector to connect a PS/2® (non-USB) keyboard to the server. The following illustration shows a keyboard connector.



If you attach a keyboard to this connector, USB ports and devices are disabled during POST.

Serial connector

Use a serial connector to connect a serial device. The following illustration shows a serial connector.



Universal Serial Bus connector

Use a Universal Serial Bus (USB) connector to connect a USB device. The USB ports support both USB 1.0, 1.1 and 2.0. The following table contains the speeds and cable lengths that USB 1.0, 1.1, and 2.0 support.

Using Plug and Play technology, USB devices are configured automatically and can interface with a maximum of 127 devices. The following illustration shows a USB connector.



Use a 4-pin cable to connect a device to a USB connector. If you need to connect more USB devices than the server has USB connectors for, use a USB hub to connect additional devices.

If you connect a PS/2 (non-USB) keyboard to the keyboard connector, the USB keyboard port is disabled during POST.

If you connect a USB keyboard that has a mouse port, the keyboard emulates a mouse, and you cannot disable the mouse settings in the Configuration/Setup Utility program.

Video connector

Use this connector to connect a monitor to the server. The connector is dark blue to help you identify it. The following illustration shows a video connector.
