



Chapter 1. Introduction

The IBM® BladeCenter $^{\text{\tiny TM}}$ JS20 Type 8842, also known as the blade server, is based on the IBM POWER $^{\text{\tiny TM}}$ architecture technologies.

Your blade-model server is one of up to 14 blade servers that can be installed in the IBM @server® BladeCenter™ Type 8677 (the BladeCenter unit). This high-performance blade server is well-suited for networking environments that require outstanding microprocessor performance, efficient memory management, flexibility, and reliable data storage.

Notes:

- The maximum number of blade servers that the BladeCenter unit supports varies
 by the wattage of the power supplies that are installed in the BladeCenter unit.
 For more information about determining the power requirements for your blade
 server, see the IBM @server BladeCenter Power Module Upgrade Guidelines
 Technical Update on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- Two power modules are required to support the blade servers in blade bays 1 through 6 in the BladeCenter unit. If you install blade servers in these blade bays, you must install power modules in power-module bays 1 and 2 in the BladeCenter unit.
- Four power modules are required to support the blade servers in blade bays 7 through 14 in the BladeCenter unit. If you install blade servers in these blade bays, you must install power modules in power-module bays 1 through 4 in the BladeCenter unit.

- · Set up your blade server
- · Start and configure your blade server
- · Install options
- Install your operating system
- Perform basic troubleshooting of your blade server



What your IBM BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 offers

Your blade server is designed to take advantage of advancements in memory management and data storage. Your blade server includes:

IBM PowerPC[®] 970 microarchitecture

IBM PowerPC 970 microarchitecture technology leverages proven innovative IBM technologies to build powerful, scalable, reliable IBM-processor-based servers. PowerPC 970 microarchitecture technology includes features such as light path diagnostics. Predictive Failure Analysis (PFA), and Advanced System Management.1

Impressive performance using the latest microprocessor technology

Your blade server supports two IBM PowerPC 970 microprocessors and comes with two microprocessors installed. Together, these two microprocessors enhance performance. With two microprocessors, your blade server can operate as a symmetric multiprocessing (SMP) server. With SMP, certain operating systems and application programs can distribute the processing load between the microprocessors. To use SMP, obtain an SMP-capable operating system. Integrated network environment support

Your blade server comes with one integrated dual-port Gigabit Ethernet controller. Each Ethernet controller port has an interface for connecting to 10/100/1000-Mbps networks through an Ethernet-compatible switch module on the BladeCenter unit. The blade server automatically selects between 10BASE-T and 100/1000BASE-TX environments. Each controller port provides full-duplex (FDX) capability, which enables simultaneous transmission and reception of data on the Ethernet local area network (LAN). The controller supports Wake on LAN® technology.

I/O expansion

Your blade server comes with two connectors on the system board for an optional I/O expansion card for adding more network communication capabilities to the blade server.

Large system memory

The memory bus in your blade server supports up to 4 GB of system memory. The memory controller provides support for up to four industry-standard 2.5 V. 184-pin, double-data-rate (DDR), PC2700, registered synchronous dynamic random-access memory (SDRAM) with error correcting code (ECC) dual inline memory modules (DIMMs). Light path diagnostics

Light path diagnostics provides light-emitting diodes (LEDs) to assist in isolating problems with the blade server. An LED on the blade-server control panel is lit if an unusual condition or a problem occurs. If this happens, you can look at the LEDs on the system board to locate the source of the problem. For more information, see "Light path diagnostics overview" on page 92.

Serial Over LAN

Your blade server supports Serial Over LAN (SOL) technology, which provides advanced remote management capability. It provides the ability to redirect server serial data over a LAN without the use of serial concentrators. It also eliminates the need for serial cabling by internally rerouting serial packets over the LAN.

The SOL feature is accessed through the management-module command-line interface. The SOL feature does not require any special client software because it is designed to work with existing standard Telnet consoles. Reliability, availability, and serviceability features

Three important features in server design are reliability, availability, and serviceability (RAS). These RAS features are designed to help you protect the integrity of the data stored on your blade server; help ensure that your blade server is available when you want to use it; and, in the event of a failure, help you easily diagnose and repair the failure with minimal inconvenience.

The following is a list of some of the RAS features that your blade server supports:


- · Automatic error retry or recovery
- · Automatic server restart
- · Built-in monitoring for temperature, voltage, and hard disk drives
- · Customer-upgradeable system firmware code
- Customer support center 24 hours per day, 5 days a week (Monday through Friday)²
- · Diagnostic support of Ethernet controller ports
- · Error codes and messages
- Error correcting code (ECC) protection on the Level 2 (L2) cache
- ECC memory
- · Light path diagnostics
- Power-on self-test (POST)
- · Predictive Failure Analysis (PFA) alerts
- Service processor that communicates with the BladeCenter management module to enable remote blade server management
- SDRAM with serial presence detect (SPD) and vital product data (VPD)
- System error logging
- VPD (includes information stored in nonvolatile memory for easier remote viewing)
- Wake on LAN capability

System-board internal and option connectors

Note: The illustrations in this document might differ slightly from your hardware.




System-board LEDs

The following illustration shows the location of the LEDs on the system board. You might need to refer to this illustration when solving problems with the blade server. You must remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit, open the cover, and press the light path diagnostics button (SW1) to light any error LEDs that were turned on during processing.

Notes:

- Power is available to relight the light path diagnostics LEDs for a short period of time after the blade server is removed from the BladeCenter unit. During that period of time, you can relight the light path diagnostics LEDs for a maximum of 25 seconds (or less, depending on the number of LEDs that are lit and the length of time the blade server is removed from the BladeCenter unit) by pressing the light path diagnostics button (SW1).
- · Error LED CR29 is not used.



Preinstallation requirements

Before you install components or perform configuration tasks, make sure that:

- · You have read the safety information beginning on page vii and the information in "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- You have reviewed the documentation that comes with each device and any applicable information in the "Related documentation" on page 3.
- You have correctly configured the rack in which you will install the BladeCenter unit.
- You have installed the BladeCenter unit in a rack according to the @server BladeCenter Type 8677 Rack Installation Instructions on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- The BladeCenter unit is correctly configured according to the instructions in "Configuring the BladeCenter unit for the Serial Over LAN (SOL) feature" on page 42.

Note: For the latest updates about power modules, see the *IBM* @server BladeCenter Power Module Upgrade Guidelines Technical Update on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

- You have installed and configured the management module in the BladeCenter unit according to the instructions in:
 - "Management-module configuration" on page 46.
 - The BladeCenter Management Module Installation Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- · You have installed and configured the Ethernet switch modules in the BladeCenter unit according to the instructions in the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter Installation and User's Guide or Nortel Networks Laver 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM BladeCenter Installation Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

Note: If the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter is installed in your BladeCenter unit and you must replace the CD-ROM media tray in your BladeCenter unit, you must also update the microcode in the Ethernet switch module.

 You have installed and configured a second Ethernet switch module in I/O bay 2 of the BladeCenter unit, if you plan to install the operating system through the Ethernet network.

Note: This Ethernet switch module must be of the same type that you installed in I/O bay 1 of the BladeCenter unit.

Your BladeCenter unit has the correct CD-ROM media tray as described in "Checking the status of the CD-ROM media tray" on page 12.

Checking the status of the CD-ROM media tray

If your BladeCenter unit was shipped to you before June 2003, the CD-ROM media tray might require an update for correct CD-ROM operation with the blade server. From the management-module Web-based management and configuration program main menu, you can select settings that you want to view or change. The navigation pane (on the left side of the management module window) contains navigational links that you use to manage your BladeCenter unit and check the status of the components (modules and blade servers).

Complete the following steps to determine whether the media tray requires replacement:

- 1. In the navigation pane, select Hardware VPD.
- 2. In the management module window (on the right side), go to the "BladeCenter Hardware VPD" table. Look for "Media Tray" in the "Module Name" column. If the part number is not 49P2522, then you have a down level component that must be replaced with part number 49P2522.

If the media tray requires replacement, call the IBM Support Center (1-800-IBM-SERV) to report the down level component as a failed part and request a replacement media tray that can be used with your blade server. Before you can install and use the blade server in the BladeCenter unit, the media tray must be replaced in the BladeCenter unit as described in the @server BladeCenter Type 8677 Hardware Maintenance Manual and Troubleshooting Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

Chapter 2. Blade server power, controls, and indicators

This chapter describes the power features, how to turn on and turn off the blade server, and what the controls and indicators mean.

Turning on the blade server

Important: To generate faster blade-server startups from the network, connect the dynamic host configuration protocol (DHCP) server to the Ethernet switch module in I/O bay 2 in the BladeCenter unit. The system firmware code in the blade server detects this Ethernet controller first. The Ethernet controller in each blade server is then associated with the switch module in I/O bay 2.

Notes:

- After you connect the power cords of your BladeCenter unit to the electrical
 outlets, wait until the power-on LED on the blade server flashes slowly before
 pressing the blade server power-control button. Before the LED flashes, the
 service processor in the BladeCenter management module is initializing, and the
 power-control button on the blade server will not respond.
- While the blade server is powering up, the power-on LED on the front of the server is lit. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for the power-on LED states.
- After an orderly shutdown of the operating system occurs, the Wake on LAN feature is permanently enabled in the blade server system firmware code. Therefore, Enabled is the default setting. The Wake on LAN setting for each blade server is stored in the management-module nonvolatile random-access memory (NVRAM). To disable the Wake on LAN feature for one or more blade servers, use the BladeCenter management-module Web interface. For more information about the BladeCenter management-module Web interface, see the BladeCenter Management Module User's Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- Throughout this document, the management-module Web-based user interface is also known as the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.

After you connect the BladeCenter unit to power, the blade server can start in any of the following ways:

- You can press the power-control button on the front of the blade server (behind the control panel door) to start the server.
- If a power failure occurs, the BladeCenter unit and then the blade server can start automatically when power is restored (if the blade server is configured through the BladeCenter management module to do so).
- You can turn on the blade server remotely by means of the service processor in the BladeCenter management module.
- If your operating system supports the Wake on LAN feature and it has not been disabled through the BladeCenter management-module Web interface, the blade server power-on LED is flashing slowly, and the Wake on LAN feature can turn on the blade server.

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Turning off the blade server

When you turn off the blade server, it is still connected to power through the BladeCenter unit. The blade server can respond to requests from the service processor, such as a remote request to turn on the blade server.

To avoid loss of data, shut down your operating system before you turn off the blade server. See your operating-system documentation for information about shutting down the operating system.

If the blade server has not been turned off, the blade server can be turned off in any of the following ways:

· You can press the power-control button on the blade server (behind the control panel door). This starts an orderly shutdown of the operating system, if this feature is supported by your operating system.

Note: After turning off the blade server, wait at least 5 seconds before you press the power-control button to turn on the blade server again.

- If the operating system stops functioning, you can press and hold the power-control button for more than 4 seconds to turn off the blade server.
- The BladeCenter management-module Web interface can turn off the blade server.


Note: After turning off the blade server, wait at least 30 seconds for the hard disk drives to stop spinning before you remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit.

Blade server controls and LEDs

This section describes the controls and LEDs on your blade server.


Power-control button: This button is behind the control panel door. Press this button to manually turn the blade server on or off.

Note: The power-control button has effect only if local power control is enabled for the blade server. Local power control is enabled and disabled through the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.



Notes:

- The control panel door is shown in the closed (normal) position in this illustration.
- · The blade-error LED, information LED, and location LED can be turned off through the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.
- For additional information about errors, see Chapter 8, "Solving problems," on page 63.



Blade-error LED: When this amber LED is lit, it indicates that a system error has occurred in the blade server.

Information LED: When this amber LED is lit, it indicates that information about a system error for this blade server has been placed in the BladeCenter system error log. The error might not require immediate service.

Location LED: When this blue LED is lit, it has been turned on remotely by the system administrator to aid in visually locating the blade server. The location LED on the BladeCenter unit will be lit also.


Activity LED: When this green LED is lit, it indicates that there is hard disk drive or network activity.

Power-on LED: This green LED indicates the power status of the blade server in the following manner:

- Flashing rapidly The service processor on the blade server is communicating with the BladeCenter management module.
- Flashing slowly The blade server has ac power but is not turned on.
- Lit continuously (steady) The blade server has ac power and is turned on.

Chapter 3. Installing the blade server in the BladeCenter unit

If you have options to install in your blade server, go to Chapter 4, "Installing and removing options and customer-replaceable units," on page 21 for instructions; then, return here. Otherwise, continue with the instructions in this chapter.



Notes:

- The maximum number of blade servers that the BladeCenter unit supports varies by the wattage of the power supplies that are installed in the BladeCenter unit. For more information about determining the power requirements for your blade server, see the IBM @server BladeCenter Power Module Upgrade Guidelines Technical Update on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- Two power modules are required to support the blade servers in blade bays 1 through 6 in the BladeCenter unit. If you install blade servers in these blade bays, you must install power modules in power-module bays 1 and 2 in the BladeCenter unit.
- Four power modules are required to support the blade servers in blade bays 7 through 14 in the BladeCenter unit. If you install blade servers in these blade bays, you must install power modules in power-module bays 1 through 4 in the BladeCenter unit.
- To help ensure proper cooling, performance, and system reliability, do not operate the BladeCenter unit for more than 1 minute without a blade server or filler blade installed in each blade bay.
- When you remove a filler blade from a blade bay in the BladeCenter unit so that
 you can install a blade server, do not discard the filler blade. You will need the
 filler blade if you ever remove the blade server. For future use, store the filler
 blade in a static-protective environment, such as the static-protective package
 that comes with the blade server.

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Complete the following steps to install a blade server into the BladeCenter unit:

Statement 21:






CAUTION:

Hazardous energy is present when the blade server is connected to the power source. Always replace the blade cover before installing the blade server.

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If you have not done so already, install any options needed, such as disk drives or memory, in the blade server.
- 3. Select the bay for the blade server.
- 4. Remove the filler blade from the bay that you selected. For future use, store the filler blade in a static-protective environment.
- 5. Make sure that the release levers on the blade server are in the open position (perpendicular to the blade server).
- 6. Slide the blade server into the bay until it stops. The spring-loaded doors further back in the bay that cover the bay opening move out of the way as you insert the blade server.
- 7. Push the release levers on the front of the blade server closed.
- 8. Turn on the blade server. See "Turning on the blade server" on page 13 for instructions.
- 9. The power-on LED on the blade control panel first flashes rapidly and then slowly. Make sure that the power-on LED is lit continuously (steady), indicating that the blade server is receiving power and is turned on.
- 10. (Optional) A set of user labels comes with the blade server. Write identifying information on one of the user labels for the blade server; then, place the label on the BladeCenter unit bezel just below the blade server, as shown in the following illustration.



Important: Do not place the label on the blade server or in any way block the ventilation holes on the blade server.

11. If you have other blade servers to install, do so now.

Attention: If you reinstall a blade server that you removed, you must install it in the same bay from which you removed it. Some blade server configuration information and update options are established according to bay number. Reinstalling a blade server into a different bay than the one from which it was removed could have unintended consequences, such as incorrectly reconfiguring the blade server.

If this is the initial installation for a blade server in the BladeCenter unit, you must configure the BladeCenter unit for this blade server as described in Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41. Then, install the operating system. See Chapter 7, "Installing the operating system," on page 61 for more information.

Chapter 4. Installing and removing options and customer-replaceable units

This chapter provides instructions for adding options or customer-replaceable units (CRUs) to your blade server. CRUs are customer-replaceable components, such as memory modules, hard disk drives, and I/O expansion cards. (Some removal instructions are provided in case you need to remove one option or CRU to install another.)

Installation guidelines

Before you begin, read the following information:

- Read the safety information beginning on page vii and the guidelines in "Handling static-sensitive devices." This information will help you work safely with your blade server and options.
- Read the information in "Preinstallation requirements" on page 11.
- · Back up all important data before you make changes to disk drives.
- For a list of supported options for your blade server, go to http://www.ibm.com/pc/us/compat/.
- Before you remove a hot-swap blade server from the BladeCenter unit, you must shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. You do not have to shut down the BladeCenter unit itself.

System reliability guidelines

To help ensure proper cooling and system reliability, make sure that:

- The ventilation holes on the blade server are not blocked.
- Each of the blade bays on the front of the BladeCenter unit has a blade server or filler blade installed. Do not operate the BladeCenter unit for more than 1 minute without a blade server or filler blade installed in each blade bay.
- You have followed the reliability guidelines in the documentation that comes with the BladeCenter unit.
- You have not installed any small computer system interface (SCSI) devices. The blade server does not support SCSI devices. If you attach SCSI devices to the blade server, these devices will not be recognized or configured, and they will not operate.

Handling static-sensitive devices

Attention: Static electricity can damage electronic devices and your system. To avoid damage, keep static-sensitive devices in their static-protective packages until you are ready to install them.

To reduce the possibility of electrostatic discharge, observe the following precautions:


- Limit your movement. Movement can cause static electricity to build up around you.
- Handle the device carefully, holding it by its edges or its frame.
- · Do not touch solder joints, pins, or exposed printed circuitry.

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- · Do not leave the device where others can handle and damage it.
- · While the device is still in its static-protective package, touch it to an unpainted metal part of the BladeCenter unit for at least 2 seconds. This drains static electricity from the package and from your body.
- · Remove the device from its package and install it directly into the blade server or BladeCenter unit without setting the device down. If it is necessary to set down the device, put it back into its static-protective package. Do not place the device on your blade server cover or on a metal surface.
- · Take additional care when handling devices during cold weather. Heating reduces indoor humidity and increases static electricity.
- · Wear an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap, if one is available.

Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit

The following illustration shows how to remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit.



Attention:

- To maintain proper system cooling, do not operate the BladeCenter unit for more than 1 minute without a blade server or filler blade installed in each blade bay.
- Note the number of the bay that contains the blade server that you will remove.
 Reinstalling a blade server into a different bay from the one from which it was
 removed could have unintended consequences. Some configuration information
 and update options are established according to bay number; if you reinstall the
 blade server into a different bay, you might have to reconfigure the blade server.

Complete the following steps to remove the blade server:


- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If the blade server is operating, the power-on LED is lit continuously (steady). Shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.

Attention: Wait at least 30 seconds for the hard disk drives to stop spinning, before proceeding to the next step.

- 3. Open the two release levers as shown in the illustration. The blade server moves out of the bay approximately 0.6 cm (0.25 inch).
- 4. Pull the blade server out of the bay.
- 5. Place either a filler blade or a new blade server in the bay within 1 minute.

Opening the blade server cover

The following illustration shows how to open the cover on the blade server.



Complete the following steps to open the blade server cover:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. Carefully place the blade server on a flat, static-protective surface, with the cover side up.
- 3. Press the blue blade-cover release on each side of the blade server and lift the cover open, as shown in the illustration.
- 4. Lift the cover from the blade server and set it aside.




CAUTION:

Hazardous energy is present when the blade server is connected to the power source. Always replace the blade cover before installing the blade server.

Removing the blade-server bezel assembly

Before you can replace a defective system board or blade-server bezel assembly, you must first remove the blade-server bezel assembly. The following illustration shows how to remove the bezel assembly from a blade server.




Complete the following steps to remove the blade-server bezel assembly:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. Open the blade server cover.
- 3. Press the bezel-assembly release and pull the bezel assembly away from the blade server approximately 1.2 cm (0.5 inch).
- 4. Disconnect the control-panel cable from the control-panel connector.
- 5. Pull the bezel assembly away from the blade server.
- 6. Store the bezel assembly in a safe place.

Installing IDE hard disk drives

Your blade server has two connectors on the system board for installing optional 2.5-inch integrated drive electronics (IDE) hard disk drives. Each IDE connector is on a separate channel. Some models come with at least one IDE hard disk drive already installed.

Attention: To maintain proper system cooling, do not operate the BladeCenter unit for more than 1 minute without a blade server or filler blade installed in each blade bay.



Attention:

- Drives must be installed in the following order: IDE connector 1 (J1) first, then IDE connector 2 (J2).
- · Do not install a hard disk drive in IDE connector 2 if you intend to also install an optional I/O expansion card. The I/O expansion card occupies the same area as the second IDE hard disk drive.
- Do not press on the top of the hard disk drive when installing it. Pressing the top could damage the hard disk drive.
- · IDE hard disk drives must be set to Master.

Complete the following steps to install a 2.5-inch IDE hard disk drive:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If the blade server is operating, shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.
- 3. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit. (See "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23 for instructions.) Carefully place the blade server on a flat, static-protective surface.
- 4. Open the blade server cover. See "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions.
- 5. Insert the riser card from the option kit into an IDE connector on the blade server system board.
- 6. Place the tray from the option kit over the riser card as shown in the preceding illustration, aligning the tray with the screws on the system board. Note the four screws that are under the four screw holes in the tray. Set the tray aside and remove the four screws.
- 7. Replace the tray and secure the tray to the system board with screws from the hardware kit.

- 8. Set any jumpers or switches on the hard disk drive, if this requirement is specified on the drive label or in the documentation that comes with the drive.
- Place the hard disk drive into the tray and, from the rear edge of the hard disk drive, push it into the connector on the riser card until the hard disk drive moves past the lever at the back of the tray. The hard disk drive clicks into place.
- 10. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now; otherwise, go to "Completing the installation" on page 38.


Installing memory modules

You can increase the amount of memory in your blade server by installing additional memory-module options. When you install memory, you must install a pair of matched dual inline memory modules (DIMMs).

Notes:

- The system board contains four DIMM connectors and supports two-way memory interleaving.
- The DIMM options available for your blade server are 256 MB, 512 MB, and 1 GB. Your blade server supports a minimum of 512 MB and a maximum of 4 GB of system memory.
- Both DIMMs in a pair must be the same size, speed, type, and technology. You can mix compatible DIMMs from various manufacturers.
- The second pair of DIMMs does not have to be the same size, speed, type, and technology as the first pair.
- The blade server does not support unregistered DIMMs. Install only 2.5 V, 184-pin, double-data-rate (DDR), PC2700, registered synchronous dynamic random-access memory (SDRAM) with error correcting code (ECC) DIMMs. These DIMMs must be compatible with the latest PC2700 SDRAM Registered DIMM specification, which is available from http://www.jedec.org/. For a list of supported options for your blade server, go to http://www.ibm.com/pc/us/compat/.
- PC2700 DIMMs are compatible with earlier specifications and work in the PC2100 and PC1600 DIMM connectors.
- Installing or removing DIMMs changes the configuration information for the blade server. After you install or remove a DIMM, the new configuration information is automatically saved in the blade server firmware code. You can verify the latest configuration information by viewing the blade server firmware code as described in "Updating the firmware code for your blade server and the service processor" on page 55.

The following illustration shows how to install DIMMs on the system board.



Before you begin, read the documentation that comes with your option.

Complete the following steps to install a DIMM:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If the blade server is operating, shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.
- 3. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit. See "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23 for instructions.
- 4. Carefully place the blade server on a flat, static-protective surface.
- Open the blade server cover. See "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions.
- 6. Locate the DIMM connectors on the system board. Determine the connectors into which you will install the DIMMs.

Your blade server comes with two 256 MB DIMMs installed in the DIMM 3 (J32) and DIMM 4 (J40) memory connectors. When you install additional DIMMs, be sure to install them as a pair, in DIMM connectors 1 and 2 (J25 and J28). Install the DIMMs in the following order:

Pair	DIMM connectors
First	3 and 4 (J32 and J40)
Second	1 and 2 (J25 and J28)

7. Touch the static-protective package that contains the DIMM option to any *unpainted* metal surface on the BladeCenter chassis or any *unpainted* surface on any other grounded rack component. Then, remove the DIMM from the package.

- 8. To install the DIMMs, repeat the following steps for each DIMM that you install:
 - a. Turn the DIMM so that the DIMM keys align correctly with the connector on the system board.
 - **Attention:** To avoid breaking the retaining clips or damaging the DIMM connectors, handle the clips gently.
 - b. Insert the DIMM by pressing the DIMM along the guides into the connector. Make sure that the retaining clips snap into the closed positions.
 - **Important:** If there is a gap between the DIMM and the retaining clips, the DIMM has not been properly installed. In this case, open the retaining clips and remove the DIMM; then, reinsert the DIMM.
- 9. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now; otherwise, go to "Completing the installation" on page 38.

Installing an I/O expansion card

You can add an optional I/O expansion card (adapter) to your blade server to give the blade server additional network connections for communicating on a network.


When you add an I/O expansion card, you must make sure that the switch modules in I/O bays 3 and 4 on the BladeCenter unit both support the I/O expansion card network-interface type. For example, if you add an Ethernet expansion card to your blade server, the modules in I/O bays 3 and 4 on the BladeCenter unit must both be compatible with the Ethernet expansion card. All other I/O expansion cards installed on other blade servers in the BladeCenter unit must also be compatible with these switch modules. In this example, you could then install two Ethernet switch modules, two pass-thru modules, or one Ethernet switch module and one pass-thru module. Because pass-thru modules are compatible with a variety of I/O expansion cards, installing two pass-thru modules would allow use of several different types of compatible I/O expansion cards within the same BladeCenter unit.

Important:

- Installation of an I/O expansion card requires removal of the hard disk drive that
 is installed in IDE connector 2. The I/O expansion card occupies the same space
 as this hard disk drive and replaces it. You cannot install a hard disk drive in IDE
 connector 2 while an I/O expansion card is installed in the blade server.
- When you install a Myrinet Cluster Expansion Card for IBM @server BladeCenter into a BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842, you must connect the cable from the I/O expansion card to the J7 connector on the system board.

Attention: If the hard disk drive installed in IDE connector 2 contains any information that you want to keep, back it up to another storage device.

The following illustration shows how to install an I/O expansion card on the blade server. The card is installed near IDE connector 2.



Complete the following steps to install an I/O expansion card:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If the blade server is operating, shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.
- 3. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit (see "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23 for information).
- 4. Carefully place the blade server on a flat, static-protective surface.
- 5. Open the cover (see "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions).
- 6. Install the I/O expansion card tray:
 - If an IDE hard disk drive is in IDE connector 2, remove the hard disk drive and tray. Save the four long screws that secured the tray to the system board.
 - If there is no IDE hard disk drive in IDE connector 2, remove the four screws as shown in the previous illustration.

Secure the tray to the system board with the screws from the option kit, as shown in the previous illustration.

- 7. Install the I/O expansion card:
 - a. Orient the I/O expansion card as shown in the previous illustration.
 - b. Slide the notch in the narrow end of the card into the raised hook on the tray; then, gently pivot the wide end of the card into the I/O expansion card connectors, as shown in the previous illustration.

Note: For device driver and configuration information to complete the installation of the I/O expansion card, see the documentation that comes with the card. Some documentation might also be on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD that comes with the BladeCenter unit.

8. If you have other options to install or remove, do so now; otherwise, go to "Completing the installation" on page 38.

Installing an Ethernet cable

One dual-port Gigabit Ethernet controller is integrated on the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 system board. To support Ethernet connections and the SOL feature and to configure your blade server, you must install an optional Ethernet-compatible switch module, such as the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter or IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter, in I/O bay 1 of the BladeCenter unit.

If you plan to use both Ethernet controller ports, you must install an identical Ethernet switch module in I/O bays 1 and 2, since both I/O bays require the same type of optional Ethernet-compatible switch module. Each controller port provides a 1000-Mbps full-duplex interface for connecting to one of the Ethernet-compatible switch modules in I/O bays 1 and 2. If you plan to attach additional Ethernet devices to the blade server or the BladeCenter unit, you must install an optional Ethernet-compatible switch module, such as the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter or IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter, in I/O bay 3 or 4 of the BladeCenter unit, to support these

additional Ethernet connections. If you install optional Ethernet-compatible switch modules in I/O bays 3 and 4, these switch modules must be identical.

The optional Ethernet switch modules contain four ports with RJ-45 connectors. These connectors provide a 10/100/1000 Base-T interface (either at half-duplex or full duplex) for connecting twisted-pair cable to the Ethernet network. You must purchase and install a compatible cable to connect these devices. To connect an Ethernet controller port to a repeater or switch module, use an unshielded twisted pair (UTP) cable with RJ-45 connectors at both ends. For 100 Mbps or higher operation, Category 5 cabling is required. For 10 Mbps operation, Category 3 cabling is required.

Notes:

- · For more information about Ethernet requirements, see the documentation that comes with the Ethernet devices and the @server BladeCenter Type 8677 Installation and User's Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- For more information about the Ethernet switch modules, see the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter Installation and User's Guide or Nortel Networks Laver 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM BladeCenter Installation Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- For more information about the SOL feature, see Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 and the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

Replacing the battery

IBM has designed this product with your safety in mind. The lithium battery must be handled correctly to avoid possible danger. If you replace the battery, you must adhere to the following instructions.

If you replace the original lithium battery with a heavy-metal battery or a battery with heavy-metal components, be aware of the following environmental consideration. If your system has a module containing a lithium battery, replace it only with the same module type made by the same manufacturer. 

- 2. Follow any special handling and installation instructions that come with the battery.
- 3. If the blade server is operating, shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.
- 4. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit (see "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23 for information).
- 5. Open the blade server cover (see "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions).
- 6. Locate the battery (connector BH1) on the system board.




7. Remove the battery:


a. Use your finger to press down on one side of the battery; then, slide the battery out from its socket. The spring mechanism will push the battery out toward you as you slide it from the socket.


Note: You might need to lift the battery clip slightly with your fingernail to make it easier to slide the battery.

b. Use your thumb and index finger to pull the battery from under the battery clip.


Note: After you remove the battery, press gently on the clip to make sure that the battery clip is touching the base of the battery socket.








- 8. Insert the new battery:
 - a. Tilt the battery so that you can insert it into the socket, under the battery clip. Make sure that the side with the positive (+) symbol is facing up.
 - As you slide it under the battery clip, press the battery down into the socket.







9. Close the blade server cover (see "Closing the blade server cover" on page 39).

- 10. Reinstall the blade server into the BladeCenter unit (see Chapter 3, "Installing the blade server in the BladeCenter unit," on page 17).

- 12. Reset the system date and time through the operating system that you installed. For additional information, see your operating-system documentation.

Replacing the system board

Two operational microprocessors and heat sinks are required on the system board in the blade server at all times. The microprocessors and heat sinks are not replaceable. Do not attempt to remove these components or any components that secure the microprocessors and heat sinks to the system board. You must replace the system board if any of these conditions exists:

- · A microprocessor or heat sink becomes defective.
- Certain errors occur as described in "Firmware error codes" on page 80.
- The blade server does not restart after you recover the system firmware code as described in "Recovering the system firmware code" on page 96.

To obtain a new system board, you must order a new blade server. The replacement system board comes attached to the new blade server. To order a blade server, contact your IBM marketing representative or authorized reseller.

Important: After you replace the system board, you must either update the new blade server with the latest firmware or restore the pre-existing firmware from a diskette or CD image. You must also configure the new blade server and use the operating system to reset the system date and time.

Complete the following steps to replace the system board:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If the blade server is operating, shut down the operating system by typing the shutdown -h now command. If the blade server was not turned off, press the power-control button (behind the blade-server control panel door) to turn off the blade server. See "Blade server controls and LEDs" on page 15 for more information about the location of the power-control button.
- 3. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit (see "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23 for information). The faulty system board is attached to the blade server.
- 4. Open the blade server cover (see "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions).
- 5. Remove the blade-server bezel assembly (see "Removing the blade-server bezel assembly" on page 25).
- 6. Remove the following components from the faulty system board (see the applicable installation instructions in this chapter and reverse the steps), and place them on a flat, static-protective surface. Make sure that the following components are accessible for reinstallation:
 - IDE hard disk drives (see "Installing IDE hard disk drives" on page 25)
 - DIMMs (see "Installing memory modules" on page 27)
 - I/O expansion cards (see "Installing an I/O expansion card" on page 30)
 - Jumper J14, between jumpers J16 and J20 (for location, see the illustration in "Recovering the system firmware code" on page 96)
- 7. While the new blade server is still in its static-protective package, touch it to an unpainted metal part of the system unit for at least 2 seconds.
- 8. Remove the new blade server from its package and place it on a flat, static-protective surface.

Note: The replacement system board is already attached to the new blade server.

- 9. Install the components that you removed from the faulty system board in step 6 on page 35 onto the replacement system board.
 - IDE hard disk drives (see "Installing IDE hard disk drives" on page 25)
 - DIMMs (see "Installing memory modules" on page 27)
 - I/O expansion cards (see "Installing an I/O expansion card" on page 30)
 - Jumper J14, between jumpers J16 and J20 (for location, see the illustration in "Recovering the system firmware code" on page 96)

If you plan to increase the amount of memory in the blade server, install the new DIMMs on the new system board now. For additional information, see "Installing memory modules" on page 27.

10. Note the machine type, model number, and serial number on the blade-server bezel assembly. You will need this information to complete this step.

Your replacement system board comes with a repair identification (RID) tag label. To ensure future entitlement for service, you must write the serial number of the original system board onto the RID tag label in this step. The part number for the RID tag is 13N0477.

Use the RID tag label to transfer entitlement (machine type, model number, and serial number) from the previous blade server to the new blade server. Do not use a pencil or felt-tip pen to complete the RID tag label.

Important:

- The serial number of the failing system board must match the serial number that you reported when you called IBM for service.
- Because the new system board does not have a serial number, you must transfer the original system-board serial number to the new system board. The first time that you turn on the new blade server, the firmware code will request that you enter the serial number. You must enter the original system-board serial number. If you enter a different serial number, the operating system that you installed might interpret this information as an incorrect serial number, and you might have to change your software-licensing agreement.
- To maintain proper airflow, do not place the new label on the blade-server bezel assembly.

Also, be sure to place the RID tag label on the bottom of the new blade server chassis.

- 11. Install the blade-server bezel assembly on the new blade server (see "Installing the blade-server bezel assembly" on page 38).
- 12. Close the blade server cover (see "Closing the blade server cover" on page 39).

Statement 21:





CAUTION:

Hazardous energy is present when the blade server is connected to the power source. Always replace the blade cover before installing the blade server.

13. Install the new blade server into the same BladeCenter unit I/O bay from which you removed the original blade server that contains the faulty system board (see Chapter 3, "Installing the blade server in the BladeCenter unit," on page 17).

14. Turn on the blade server (see "Turning on the blade server" on page 13).

Note: If you have just connected the power cords of your BladeCenter unit to electrical outlets, you will have to wait until the power-on LED on the blade server slowly flashes before you press the power-control button on the blade server.

- Configure an SOL connection and attach it to this blade server.
 For additional information, see Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 and Chapter 6, "Running a Serial Over LAN session," on page 57.
- 16. The blade server will boot to the Open Firmware command to enter the serial number from the previous (faulty) blade server.

The blade server will not start until the serial number and other relevant information have been entered and verified at the prompts when the following checkpoint codes are displayed, as shown in the following example window. Depending on the blade server configuration, the text that is displayed in your system window might be slightly different.

Completing the installation


To complete the installation, perform the following tasks. Instructions for each task are in the following sections.

- 1. Reinstall the blade server into the BladeCenter unit (see Chapter 3, "Installing the blade server in the BladeCenter unit," on page 17).
- 2. Turn on the blade server (see "Turning on the blade server" on page 13).
- 3. After you replace the battery or the system board, reset the system date and time through the operating system that you installed. For additional information, see your operating-system documentation.

Note: If you have just connected the power cords of your BladeCenter unit to electrical outlets, you will have to wait until the power-on LED on the blade server flashes slowly before pressing the power-control button on a blade server.

Installing the blade-server bezel assembly

The following illustration shows how to install the bezel assembly on the blade server.




Complete the following steps to install the blade-server bezel assembly:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- Connect the control-panel cable to the control-panel connector on the system board.
- 3. Carefully slide the bezel assembly onto the blade server as shown in the illustration, until it clicks into place.

Closing the blade server cover

Important: The blade server cannot be inserted into the BladeCenter unit until the cover is installed and closed. Do not attempt to override this protection.

The following illustration shows how to close the blade server cover.



Complete the following steps to close the blade server cover:

- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 21.
- 2. If you removed the blade bezel assembly, replace it now. See "Installing the blade-server bezel assembly" on page 38 for instructions.
- 3. Lower the cover so that the slots at the rear slide down onto the pins at the rear of the blade server, as shown in the illustration. Before closing the cover, make sure that all components are installed and seated correctly and that you have not left loose tools or parts inside the blade server.
- 4. Pivot the cover to the closed position as shown in the illustration, until it clicks into place.

Input/output connectors and devices

The BladeCenter unit contains the input/output connectors that are available to your blade server. See the documentation that comes with your BladeCenter unit for information about the input/output connectors.

The blade server does not support a direct connection to a monitor, keyboard, or mouse. Therefore, to enable communication between the blade server and these devices, you must establish an SOL connection and perform the configuration tasks that are described in Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41. In addition, you must start an SOL session as described in Chapter 6, "Running a Serial Over LAN session," on page 57.

Chapter 5. Configuring your blade server

This chapter contains instructions for establishing a Serial Over LAN (SOL) connection, enabling the SOL feature, and configuring the blade server so that you can run SOL sessions and use the BladeCenter management-module command-line interface. This chapter also explains how to update and configure BladeCenter components for SOL operation using the management-module Web-based management and configuration program. The IBM @server BladeCenter management-module command-line interface provides access to the text-console command prompt on each blade server through an SOL connection, enabling the blade servers to be managed from a remote location.

You also can perform many configuration procedures using the management-module command-line interface. See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command-Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD for information and instructions. In addition, you can use the simple network management protocol (SNMP) to perform configuration procedures. SNMP commands are described in the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command-Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD. For additional information about SNMP, see also the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter Installation and User's Guide or Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM BladeCenter Installation Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

The firmware code in your blade server uses auto-configuration; therefore, additional blade-server configuration programs are not required for the blade server. However, if you have attached other devices to the blade server or the BladeCenter unit, you must configure those devices as described in the applicable documentation that comes with those devices or the BladeCenter unit. You do not have to set any passwords to use the blade server. If you change the battery or replace the system board, you must reset the date and time through your operating system.

For information about setting up your network configuration for remote management, see the *IBM* @server BladeCenter Planning and Installation Guide. You can obtain the planning guide from the Web site at http://www.ibm.com/pc/eserver/bladecenter.

Note: Before you can run programs on the blade server, you must establish an SOL connection and install an operating system on the blade server. For information about installing your operating system, see Chapter 7, "Installing the operating system," on page 61.

Using the Serial Over LAN (SOL) feature on the blade server

Before you can perform the following tasks, you must establish an SOL connection and start an SOL session on the blade server:

- Establishing a communications channel between the blade server and a compatible monitor (or video console), keyboard, and mouse.
- · Installing the operating system on the blade server.
- · Configuring the SOL feature.
- · Running diagnostics programs.
- Having the blade server serviced.

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To support the SOL feature and to configure your blade server, you must install a compatible Ethernet switch module in I/O bay 1 of the BladeCenter unit. Examples of compatible Ethernet switch modules are the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter and the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM BladeCenter. For more information about these switch modules, see the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter Installation and User's Guide or Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM BladeCenter Installation Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD. For more details, see the following information:

- Chapter 6, "Running a Serial Over LAN session," on page 57.
- The IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

Note: The BladeCenter unit supports up to four Ethernet switch modules.

The SOL feature is accessed through the management-module command-line interface. For information about using the command-line interface, see "Using the command-line interface" on page 56 and the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.

Configuring the BladeCenter unit for the Serial Over LAN (SOL) feature

This section provides instructions for configuring the BladeCenter unit to operate using SOL. The BladeCenter unit needs to be configured only once. The settings in this section are used by all components in the BladeCenter unit. See "Configuring the BladeCenter components for Serial Over LAN operation" on page 46 for SOL configuration steps that are specific to each BladeCenter component.

SOL configuration that is shared by all BladeCenter components is performed using the management-module Web-based user interface. The management-module Web-based user interface supports only configuration and monitoring of the command-line interface and SOL and cannot be used to start command-line interface or SQL sessions.

Note: Throughout this document, the management-module Web-based user interface is also known as the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.

Some SOL configuration can also be performed using the management-module command-line interface. See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command-Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD for information and instructions.

After you install the operating system (including the Ethernet device drivers) on your blade server, you can use either Telnet or Secure Shell (SSH) sessions to communicate with the blade server. An SOL session must be used for the initial installation of the operating system.

Before you continue with the configuration tasks, read the information in "Preinstallation requirements" on page 11.

Before you begin

The BladeCenter unit must be correctly configured before you can use the command-line interface and SOL. Hardware and firmware required for the command-line interface and SOL are as follows:

Hardware:

SOL operation has the following hardware requirements:

- An SOL-capable blade server. You can use the console command to control a blade server through SOL only on blade server types that support SOL functionality and that have an integrated system management processor firmware level of version 1.00 or later.
- An SOL-capable Ethernet I/O module installed in I/O-module bay 1. The following I/O modules support SOL operation:
 - IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter
 - Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter
- For the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842, SOL uses the first network interface (Ethernet 1) of the blade server to communicate.

Firmware:

Make sure that you are using the latest versions of device drivers and firmware code for your blade server, the management module, and other BladeCenter components. Also, make sure that you are using the latest versions of basic input/output system (BIOS) code for the management module and other BladeCenter components. Go to the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/, for the latest information about upgrading the device drivers, firmware code, and BIOS code for BladeCenter components. The latest instructions are in the documentation that come with the updates.

The following table lists the minimum firmware levels that are required for BladeCenter components to support SOL operation. Go to the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/, for the latest firmware information. For additional information, see "Updating the firmware code for your blade server and the service processor" on page 55.

Starting the management and configuration program in the management module

Complete the following steps to start the Web-based management and configuration program:

- 1. Access and log onto the BladeCenter management-module Web interface as described in the IBM @server BladeCenter Type 8677 Installation and User's Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- 2. Open a Web browser. In the address or URL field, type the Internet protocol (IP) address or host name that is assigned for the management-module remote connection.

The Enter Network Password window opens.

3. Type your user name and password. Before you log onto the management module for the first time, contact your system administrator regarding whether your organization has assigned a user name and password to you. Use the initial (default) user name and password the first time that you log onto the management module. If you have an assigned user name and password, use them for all subsequent logins. All login attempts are documented in the event log.


Note: The initial user ID and password for the management module are:

- User ID: USERID (all capital letters)
- Password: PASSW0RD (note the number zero, not the letter O, in PASSW0RD)
- 4. Follow the instructions that appear on the screen. Be sure to set the timeout value that you want for your Web session.

The BladeCenter management and configuration window opens.

Global SOL settings and status

Use the **Serial Over LAN** choice under **Blade Tasks** to view and change the global SOL settings that are used by all blade servers installed in the BladeCenter unit. You can also use this choice to enable or disable SOL for each blade server.



The default management-module SOL settings provide the best overall SOL performance. You can modify these settings to meet requirements that are specific to your BladeCenter unit or network configuration. The default SOL values are as follows:

· Serial Over LAN: Enabled

Use this field to enable or disable SOL globally for the BladeCenter unit. The SOL feature works only if SOL is enabled for the BladeCenter unit *and* the blade server. If SOL is not already enabled for the blade server, you must enable SOL.

SOL VLAN ID: 4095

This value is fixed and cannot be modified.

• BSMP IP Address Range: x.x.x.x

This is a mandatory field where *x.x.x.x* is the base IP address for blade servers that are installed in the BladeCenter unit. The IP address that SOL uses to communicate with each blade server is based on the IP address that is set in this field. For example, if the entered value is 10.1.1.1, then the blade server in blade bay 1 has an IP address of 10.1.1.1, the blade server in blade bay 2 has an IP address of 10.1.1.2, and so on.


Accumulate timeout: 5Send threshold: 250

Retry count: 3

Note: The firmware code sets the retry interval.

If you make changes, you must click Save to save your changes.

Use the Serial Over LAN Status table lets to monitor the SOL status for each blade server. You can also use it to enable or disable SOL for each blade server and globally for the BladeCenter unit. SOL must be enabled both globally for the BladeCenter unit and individually for each blade server where you plan to start an SOL session. SOL is enabled globally and on blade servers by default.



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The SOL Session status has three possible states:

Not ready

This status indicates that no SOL session is available between the management module and the blade server. It might indicate that an SOL session setup failure must be investigated.

- Ready This status indicates that an SOL session is established between the management module and the blade server. This SOL session is available to connect to a Telnet session, if requested by a user.
- Active This status indicates that there is an SOL session between the management module and the blade server and that this session is currently connected to a Telnet session.

Complete the following steps to configure the global SOL settings for your BladeCenter unit:

- 1. Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page 44).
- 2. In the navigation pane, click Blade Tasks -> Serial Over LAN. In the management-module information page that opens, make sure that the settings match the default values that are described in this section (beginning on page 45) or are set to the values required by your network configuration.

Configuring the BladeCenter components for Serial Over LAN operation

This section contains the information about configuring BladeCenter components for SOL operation. Use it in addition to the information in "Configuring the BladeCenter unit for the Serial Over LAN (SOL) feature" on page 42. It contains the following subsections:

Management-module configuration

Before you configure the management module for SOL operation, review the following information:

- The management-module external network interface (eth0) configuration must be valid for your production network. This configuration can be obtained from a DHCP server or set statically.
- The management-module internal network interface (eth1) and the Ethernet I/O module configuration can be different from that of the management-module external network interface (eth0); however, the management-module internal network interface (eth1) and the Ethernet I/O module configuration must be in the same subnet. The management-module internal interface (eth1) is exposed to the external network through the management module; therefore, the configuration must not conflict with any other addresses on your production network. If you use a configuration for the Ethernet I/O module that is not valid for your production network, you will not be able to update the firmware or manage your Ethernet I/O module through the Telnet or the Web interfaces.

 The SOL Blade System Management Processors (BSMP) address range can be any valid IP address. These addresses are used for internal communications and are not exposed to the external network.

Complete the following steps to update the management-module firmware and configure the management module to enable SOL:

- 1. Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page 44).
- Complete the following steps to update the BladeCenter management module firmware:
 - a. Download the latest management-module firmware from the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/; then, uncompress and store the firmware update files in a temporary location on the client computer.
 - b. Three packet (.pkt) files are used to update the firmware for the management module. Complete the following steps for each of the packet files:
 - 1) In the navigation pane, click MM Control > Firmware Update.
 - 2) Click **Browse...**; then, select a firmware update packet (.pkt) file to update and click **Open**.
 - Click Update; then, click Continue to confirm.
 A message is displayed when the update is complete.
 - 4) Repeat these steps for each of the remaining firmware update packet files.
 - c. Complete the following steps to restart the management module. Do not restart the management module until all of the firmware update packet files are installed.
 - 1) In the navigation pane, click MM Control → Restart MM.
 - 2) Click Restart.
 - 3) Click **OK** to confirm.
 - Restarting the management module ends the current Web-based management and configuration program session. Click **Yes** to end the session.
- Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page 44). You must wait approximately 10 seconds for the management module to restart before attempting start the Web-based management and configuration program.
- 4. Complete the following steps to enable SOL for the management module:
 - a. Complete the following steps to configure the internal network interface (eth1) settings:
 - 1) In the navigation pane, click **MM Control → Network Interfaces**.
 - 2) Scroll to the Internal Ethernet Interface (eth1) section.
 - 3) Make sure that **Interface** is set to **Enabled**.
 - 4) Set the **Static IP Configuration** fields to the values that are required for your physical network.

• IP address: x.xxx.xxx.xxx

Subnet mask: xxx.xxx.xxx.xxx

Gateway address: x.xxx.xxx.xxx

- 5) Click **Save**; then, click **OK** or **Yes** to confirm. *Do not* restart the management module.
- b. Complete the following steps to configure the Ethernet I/O module network settings:
 - 1) In the navigation pane, click I/O Module Tasks → Management.
 - 2) Scroll to the **Bay 1 (Ethernet SM)*** section.
 - 3) Configure and save the **New Static IP Configuration** fields, if they are not already correct as listed in the Current IP Configuration section.
 - IP address: x.xxx.xxx.xxx
 - Subnet mask: xxx.xxx.xxx.xxx
 - Gateway address: x.xxx.xxx.xxx

If any values were changed, click Save.

- c. Complete the following steps to configure the Serial Over LAN settings:
 - 1) In the navigation pane, click Blade Tasks -> Serial Over LAN.
 - 2) Scroll to the Serial Over LAN Configuration section and set the following values:
 - Set Serial Over LAN to Enabled.
 - BSMP IP address range: x.x.x.x
 - Set Accumulate timeout. The default value is 5.
 - Set Send threshold. The default value is 250.
 - · Set Retry count. The default value is 3.
 - 3) Click Save.

Do not attempt to enable or disable SOL on any of the blade servers that are listed in the Serial Over LAN Status section.

Note: The blowers in the BladeCenter unit might become audible when the management module restarts.

- 5. Complete the following steps to restart the management module.
 - a. In the navigation pane, click MM Control → Restart MM.
 - b. Click Restart.
 - c. Click **OK** to confirm.
 - d. Restarting the management module ends the current Web-based management and configuration program session. Click Yes to end the session.
 - e. Wait approximately 10 seconds; then, start a new Web-browser session and reconnect to the Web-based management and configuration program.

The management module is now enabled for SOL.

BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 configuration

After you install the blade server in the BladeCenter unit, the blade server is automatically configured. The blade server has built-in support for the SOL feature. The Broadcom Ethernet controller device driver is installed after you install the operating system. The blade server is automatically reconfigured after you install software or hardware. IBM will periodically make firmware updates available for your blade server. Before you continue, you can make sure that your blade server has the latest version of firmware code. For additional information, see "Updating the firmware code for your blade server and the service processor" on page 55.

IBM 4-Port Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter configuration

Before you continue, make sure that:

- You are already connected to the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.
- You have enabled the spanning tree feature for all Ethernet switch modules.

Complete the following steps to update the firmware of the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter. No configuration is required for the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter to enable SOL.

Note: You will not be able to perform this procedure if the values for the network configuration of the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter are not within the same subnet as the BladeCenter management-module network interfaces (eth0 and eth1). See "Management-module configuration" on page 46 for information.

- Start the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter Web-based interface:
 - a. Obtain the latest version of IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter firmware from the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.
 - b. Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page 44).
 - c. In the navigation pane, click I/O Module Tasks → Management.
 - d. Scroll to the Current IP Configuration section and make sure that it contains values that are within the same subnet as the BladeCenter management-module network interfaces (eth0 and eth1). If the values are not in the same subnet, you must modify them before you continue. See "Management-module configuration" on page 46 for information.
 - e. Scroll to the **Bay 1 (Ethernet SM)*** section; then, click **Advanced Management**.
 - f. Scroll to the Start Telnet/Web Session section; then, click Start Web Session. This will start a new Web browser and connect to the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter management-module Web interface.
 - g. Log in to the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter management-module Web interface. The default user name is USERID, and the default password is PASSW0RD (note the number zero, not the letter O, in PASSW0RD).
- 2. Update the IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter firmware:
 - a. Click Maintenance.
 - b. Click Using Browser.
 - c. Click Upgrade Firmware/Configuration.
 - d. Click **Browse**; then, and select the firmware update file that you obtained in step 1a.
 - e. Click **Start**; then, click **Yes** to confirm each time you are asked a question.
 - f. Close the Web browser.
- 3. Complete the following steps to restart the I/O module:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click I/O Module Tasks → Power/Restart.

- Select your IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter, labeled Ethernet SM, and click Restart Module(s) and Run Standard Diagnostics.
- c. Click **OK** to confirm.

The IBM 4-Port Gb Ethernet Switch Module for BladeCenter is now enabled for SOL.

Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter firmware update

Before you continue, make sure that:

- You are already connected to the BladeCenter management-module Web interface
- · You have enabled the spanning tree feature for all Ethernet switch modules

No configuration is required for the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter to enable SOL.

Notes:

- You will not be able to perform this procedure if the values for the network configuration of the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter are not within the same subnet as the BladeCenter management-module network interfaces (eth0 and eth1). See "Management-module configuration" on page 46 for information.
- These steps require that an accessible trivial file transfer protocol (TFTP) server is present on your production network.

Complete the following steps to update the firmware of the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter:

- 1. Obtain the latest version of Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter firmware from the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.
- 2. Extract the firmware file in a temporary directory.
- Copy the two image files, GbESM-AOS-x.x.x.x-os.img and GbESM-AOS-x.x.x.x-boot.img, from the temporary directory to the root of the TFTP server.

where:

x.x.x.x is the firmware code level of the Ethernet switch module

- 4. Update the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter firmware, following the instructions that come with the update file that you downloaded. Make sure that you restart the switch module after updating its firmware.
- 5. Complete the following steps to connect to the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter Telnet interface:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click I/O Module Tasks -> Management.
 - b. Scroll to the Current IP Configuration section and make sure that it contains values that are within the same subnet as the BladeCenter management-module network interfaces (eth0 and eth1). If the values are not in the same subnet, you must modify them before you continue. See "Management-module configuration" on page 46 for information.

- c. Scroll to the **Bay 1 (Ethernet SM)*** section; then, click **Advanced Management**.
- d. Scroll to the Start Telnet/Web Session section; then, click Start Telnet Session. This will start a new Telnet session and connect to the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter management-module Web interface.
- e. Log in to the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter management-module Web interface. The default password is admin.
- f. Type n and then press Enter when prompted to run Setup Up to configure the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter.
- 6. Update the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter operating-system image:

Note: There are two operating-system images (image 1 and image 2) in the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter. This I/O module usually starts image 1. However, you must determine which operating-system image is being used before you update the firmware for this I/O module.

a. At the Telnet prompt, type /boot/cur to determine which operating-system image is being used. The output from the /boot/cur command will specify the image that is being used. The text of the output is similar to Currently set to boot software image1.

Note: You must use image 2 for the command in the next step if the output from the /boot/cur command states that image 2 is currently empty.

b. At the Telnet prompt, type /boot/gtimg imageX TFTPAddr GbESM-AOS-x.x.x.x-os.img.

where:

imageX is the name of the operating-system image (image 1 or image 2) that was determined in the previous step

TFTPAddr is the IP address of the TFTP server on your production network, where the image files are located

x.x.x.x is the firmware code level of the Ethernet switch module Press Enter.

- c. Type y and press Enter when prompted to confirm the download operation.
- d. Wait for the flash operation to be completed.

Note: Type y and press Enter to start from the new image if you had to update the image 2 file because it was previously empty.

- e. Type exit and press Enter to terminate the Telnet session.
- f. Close the window in which the Telnet session was running.
- 7. Restart the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click I/O Module Tasks > Power/Restart.
 - b. Select the check box next to your Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter, labeled **Ethernet SM**, and click **Power Off Module(s)**.
 - c. Click OK to confirm.

- d. Select the check box next to your Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter, labeled Ethernet SM, and click Power On Module(s).
- e. Click **OK** to confirm.

Note: You must wait approximately 60 seconds for the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter to restart before continuing.

- 8. Reconnect to the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter by repeating step 5 on page 50.
- 9. Update the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter boot image:

At the Telnet prompt, type /boot/gtimg boot TFTPAddr GbESM-AOS-x.x.x.xboot.img.

where:

TFTPAddr is the IP address of the TFTP server on your production network, where the image files are located

x.x.x.x is the firmware code level of the Ethernet switch module Press Enter.

- 10. Type y and press Enter when prompted to confirm the download operation.
- 11. Wait for the flash operation to be completed.
- 12. Type exit and press Enter to terminate the Telnet session.
- 13. Close the window in which the Telnet session was running.
- 14. Restart the Nortel Networks Layer 2-7 GbE Switch Module for IBM @server BladeCenter by repeating step 7 on page 51.

Completing the SOL configuration

Before you continue, make sure that you are already connected to the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.

Complete the following steps to complete the SOL configuration:

- 1. Make sure that the global SOL parameters are correct for your BladeCenter unit (see "Global SOL settings and status" on page 44).
- 2. Make sure that the SOL settings for individual BladeCenter components are correct (see "Configuring the BladeCenter components for Serial Over LAN operation" on page 46).
- 3. Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page
- 4. Complete the following steps to enable SOL on the blade servers:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click Blade Tasks -> Serial Over LAN; then, scroll to the Serial Over LAN Status section.
 - b. Select each blade server for which SOL will be enabled; then, click **Enable** Serial Over LAN.

The SOL column of the table will show a status of Enabled for each blade server that was selected. The SOL Session column of the table indicates a status of Not Ready for each blade server that you selected.

- Complete the following steps to start or restart the blade servers for which SOL was enabled:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click Blade Tasks → Power/Restart.
 - Select each blade server for which SOL was enabled; then, click either Power On Blade or Restart Blade, depending on the current status of the blade servers.
 - c. Click OK twice to confirm.
- 6. Complete the following steps to check the SOL status of the blade servers:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click **Blade Tasks → Serial Over LAN**; then, scroll to the **Serial Over LAN Status** section.
 - Make sure that the SOL Session column of the table shows a status of Ready.

Installing and Configuring SSH for SOL

Before you continue, make sure that:

- You are already connected to the BladeCenter management-module Web interface.
- You can connect to the external IBM Web site.

Complete the following steps to install and configure Secure Shell (SSH) Server for SOL:

- 1. Start the Web-based management and configuration program (see "Starting the management and configuration program in the management module" on page 44).
- If you have not previously installed the Secure Sockets Layer/Secure Shell (SSL/SSH) security key file, complete the following steps to install the SSL and SSH security file:
 - a. Download the latest version of the SSL/SSH security key file from the IBM Support Web site, http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/. Scroll to the Install SSL/SSH section and click BladeCenter firmware update.
 - b. In the navigation pane, click MM Control → Security.
 - c. Click **Browse** and select the file that you downloaded.
 - d. Click Install SSL/SSH.
 - e. Scroll to the Install SSL/SSH section and click configure and enable.
- 3. Complete the following steps to generate the SSH Server Private Key:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click MM Control → Security.
 - b. Scroll to the SSH Server Key Management section and click Generate SSH Server Private Key.
 - c. Click OK to confirm.
- 4. Complete the following steps to enable SSH:
 - a. Scroll to the Secure Shell (SSH) Server section.
 - b. Select **Enabled** for the **SSH Server** option; then, click **Save**.
 - c. Click OK to confirm.

- 5. Complete the following steps to restart the management module:
 - a. In the navigation pane, click MM Control → Restart MM.
 - b. Click Restart.
 - c. Click **OK** to confirm.
 - d. Restarting the management module ends the current Web-based management and configuration program session. Click Yes to end the session.

You can now use an SSH client to start a secure Telnet session with the management module and secure SOL sessions with the blade servers.

Configuring the Gigabit Ethernet controller

One dual-port Gigabit Ethernet controller is integrated on the blade server system board. Each controller port provides a 1000-Mbps full-duplex interface for connecting to one of the Ethernet-compatible switch modules in I/O bays 1 and 2, which enables simultaneous transmission and reception of data on the Ethernet local area network (LAN). Each Ethernet-controller port on the system board is routed to a different switch module in I/O bay 1 or bay 2. The routing from the Ethernet-controller port to the I/O bay will vary according to whether an Ethernet adapter is enabled and the operating system that is installed. See "Blade server Ethernet controller enumeration" for information about how to determine the routing from the Ethernet-controller ports to I/O bays for your blade server.

Note: Other types of blade servers, such as the BladeCenter HS20 Type 8678, that are installed in the same BladeCenter unit as this BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 might have different requirements for Ethernet controller routing. See the documentation that comes with the other blade servers for detailed information.

You do not have to set any jumpers or configure the controllers for the blade server operating system. However, you must install a device driver to enable the blade server operating system to address the Ethernet-controller ports. For device drivers and information about configuring your Ethernet-controller ports, see the Ethernet software documentation that comes with your blade server, or contact your IBM marketing representative or authorized reseller. For updated information about configuring the controllers, go to the IBM Support Web site at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.

Blade server Ethernet controller enumeration

The enumeration of the Ethernet controllers or controller ports in a blade server is operating-system dependent. You can verify the Ethernet controller or controller port designations that a blade server uses through your operating-system settings.

The routing of an Ethernet controller or controller port to a particular BladeCenter unit I/O bay depends on the type of Ethernet expansion card that is installed. You can verify which Ethernet-controller port in this blade server is routed to which I/O bay by using the following test:

- 1. Install only one Ethernet switch module or pass-thru module, in I/O bay 1.
- 2. Make sure that the ports on the switch module or pass-thru module are enabled (Switch Tasks → Management → Advanced Switch Management in the BladeCenter management-module Web interface).

- 3. Enable only one of the Ethernet-controller ports on the blade server. Note the designation that the blade server operating system has for the controller port.
- 4. Ping an external computer on the network connected to the Ethernet switch module. If you can ping the external computer, the Ethernet-controller port that you enabled is associated with the switch module in I/O bay 1. The other Ethernet-controller port in the blade server is associated with the switch module in I/O bay 2.

Communications from optional Ethernet adapters and other I/O expansion cards are routed to I/O bays 3 and 4. You can verify which controller port on an expansion card is routed to which I/O bay by performing the same test, using a controller on the expansion card and a compatible switch module or pass-thru module in I/O bay 3 or 4:

- If you have removed an Ethernet adapter from the blade server and installed a different Ethernet adapter.
- If you have installed an I/O expansion card on the blade server.

Updating the firmware code for your blade server and the service processor

Your blade server contains firmware code. In addition, the service processor in your blade server comes with its own firmware code. IBM will periodically make firmware updates available for your blade server and the service processor. You can maintain the latest levels of firmware code for your blade server and the service processor in your blade server by installing firmware updates as they become available. Be sure to follow the instructions in this section.

Complete the following steps to view the current firmware code levels for your blade server and the service processor:

- 1. Access and log onto the BladeCenter management-module Web interface as described in the IBM @server BladeCenter Type 8677 Installation and User's Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- 2. From the Blade Tasks section, select Firmware VPD.

The **Blade Server Firmware VPD** window contains the build identifier, release, and revision. Compare this information to the firmware information on the IBM Support Web site at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/. If these two types of information match, then your blade server has the latest firmware code. If these two types of information differ, download the latest firmware code from the IBM Support Web site. Follow the update instructions on the IBM Support Web site.

To apply the latest firmware code for your blade server service processor, flash the service processor. Download the latest firmware code for your blade server service processor from the IBM Support Web site at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/. Use the BladeCenter management-module Web interface to flash the service processor. Follow the update instructions on the IBM Support Web site.

Important: To avoid problems and to maintain proper system performance, always make sure that the blade server firmware code, service processor code, and diagnostic firmware code levels are consistent for all blade servers within the BladeCenter unit.

Notes:

- If you have to recover the system firmware code, see "Recovering the system firmware code" on page 96.
- The IBM Remote Deployment Manager (RDM) program does not support the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842.

Using the command-line interface

The IBM @server BladeCenter management-module command-line interface provides direct access to BladeCenter management functions as an alternative to using the BladeCenter management-module Web interface. Using the command-line interface, you can issue commands to control the power and configuration of the blade server and other components installed in the BladeCenter unit. The command-line interface also provides access to the text-console command prompt for your blade server through an SOL connection. See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD for information and instructions.

Chapter 6. Running a Serial Over LAN session

The IBM @server BladeCenter management-module command-line interface provides a convenient method for entering commands that manage and monitor BladeCenter components. The blade server does not support a direct connection to a monitor, keyboard, or mouse. Therefore, to enable communication between the blade server and these devices, you must first configure the SOL feature on the blade server to establish an SOL connection as described in Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 and then start an SOL session as described in this chapter.

This chapter contains the following information about running an SOL session:

- · Starting the command-line interface
- · Establishing a Telnet connection
- Establishing a Secure Shell (SSH) connection
- · Starting an SOL session
- Ending an SOL session

In the BladeCenter environment, the integrated system management processor (ISMP) and network interface card (NIC) on each blade server route the serial data from the blade server serial communications port to the network infrastructure of the BladeCenter unit, including an Ethernet compatible I/O module that supports SOL communication. Configuration of BladeCenter components for SOL operation is done through the BladeCenter management module (see Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41). The management module also acts as a proxy in the network infrastructure to couple a client running a Telnet session with the management module to an SOL session running on a blade server, enabling the Telnet client to interact with the serial port of the blade server over the network. Because all SOL traffic is controlled by and routed through the management module, administrators can segregate the management traffic for the BladeCenter unit from the data traffic of the blade servers.

To start an SOL connection with a blade server, you must first start a Telnet command-line interface session with the management module. When this Telnet command-line interface session is running, you can start a remote console SOL session with any blade server in the BladeCenter unit that is set up and enabled for SOL operation. You can have as many as 14 simultaneous SOL sessions active (one for each of up to 14 blade servers) with six additional command-line interface sessions available for BladeCenter unit management. If security is a concern, you can use SSH sessions to establish secure Telnet command-line interface sessions with the BladeCenter management module before starting an SOL console redirect session with a blade server.

The most recent versions of all BladeCenter documentation are available from the IBM Web site. Complete the following steps to check for updated BladeCenter documentation and technical updates:

- 1. Go to http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.
- 2. In the Learn section, click Online publications.
- 3. On the "Online publications" page, in the **Brand** field, select **Servers**.
- 4. In the Family field, select BladeCenter.
- 5. Click Continue.

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See Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 for SOL setup instructions and the documentation for your operating system for information about commands that you can enter through an SOL connection. See the *IBM* @server *BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide* for information about:

- · Command-line interface guidelines
- · Command syntax and descriptions
- · Command-line interface error messages

Selecting the command target

You can use the command-line interface to target commands to the management module or to other devices installed in the BladeCenter unit. The command-line prompt indicates the persistent command environment: the environment where commands are entered unless otherwise redirected. When a command-line interface session is started, the persistent command environment is "system"; this indicates that commands are being directed to the BladeCenter unit. See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide for additional information.

Starting the command-line interface

Start the management-module command-line interface from a client computer by establishing a Telnet connection to the IP address of the management module or by establishing an SSH connection. You can establish up to 14 separate Telnet or SSH sessions to the BladeCenter management module.

Although a remote network administrator can access the management-module command-line interface through Telnet, this method does not provide a secure connection. As a secure alternative to using Telnet to access the command-line interface, SSH ensures that all data that is sent over the network is encrypted and secure.

The following SSH clients are available. Although some SSH clients have been tested, support or nonsupport of any particular SSH client is not implied.

- The SSH clients distributed with operating systems such as SUSE LINUX, Red Hat Linux, AIX[®], and UNIX[®] (see your operating-system documentation for information). The SSH client of Red Hat Linux 8.0 Professional was used to test the command-line interface.
- The SSH client of cygwin (see http://www.cygwin.com for information)
- Putty (see http://www.chiark.greenend.org.uk/~sgatham/putty/ for information)

The following table shows the types of encryption algorithms that are supported by the client software versions.

Algorithm	SSH version 1.5 clients	SSH version 2.0 clients
Public key exchange	SSH 1-key exchange algorithm	Diffie-Hellman-group 1-sha-1
Host key type	RSA (1024-bit)	DSA (1024-bit)
Bulk cipher algorithms	3-des	3-des-cbc or blowfish-cbc
MAC algorithms	32-bit crc	Hmac-sha1

Establishing a Telnet connection

To log on to the management module using Telnet, complete the following steps:

- 1. Open a command-line window on the network-management workstation, type telnet 192.168.70.125, and press Enter. The IP address, 192.168.70.125, is the default IP address of the management module; if a new IP address has been assigned to the management module, use that one instead.
 - A command-prompt window opens.
- At the login prompt, type the management-module user ID. At the password prompt, type the management-module password. The user ID and password are case sensitive and are the same as those that are used for management-module Web access.

A command prompt is displayed. You can now enter commands for the management module.

Establishing a Secure Shell (SSH) connection

To log on to the management module using SSH, complete the following steps:

- 1. Make sure that the SSH service on the network-management workstation is enabled. See your operating-system documentation for instructions.
- 2. Make sure that the SSH server on the BladeCenter management module is enabled. See the *IBM* @server BladeCenter Management Module User's Guide for instructions.
- 3. Start an SSH session to the management module using the SSH client of your choice. For example, if you are using the cygwin client, open a command-line window on the network-management workstation, type ssh -x 192.168.70.125, and press Enter. The IP address, 192.168.70.125, is the default IP address of the management module; if a new IP address has been assigned to the management module, use that one instead.
 - A command prompt window opens.
- 4. Type the management-module user ID when prompted. At the password prompt, type the management-module password. The user ID and password are case sensitive and are the same as those that are used for management-module Web access.

A command prompt is displayed. You can now enter commands for the management module.

Note: For information about installing and configuring the SSH, see "Installing and Configuring SSH for SOL" on page 53.

Starting an SOL session

Notes:

- The SOL feature must be enabled for both the BladeCenter unit and the blade server before you can start an SOL session with the blade server. See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide for information about SOL commands. See your operating-system documentation for information about SOL commands that you can enter using the command-line interface. See Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 for information about setting up and enabling SOL, and configuring a blade server for SOL.
- The BladeCenter management module automatically stores the previous 8 KB of serial data that was transmitted by each blade server, even when SOL sessions are not active. When an SOL session is established, all of the previous serial

data, up to 8 KB, is automatically displayed. If no previous data is available when the SOL session starts, the cursor will remain on the command line until new serial data is transmitted.

After you start a Telnet or SSL session to the BladeCenter management module, you can start an SOL session to any individual blade server that supports SOL using the **console** command. Therefore, you can have simultaneous SOL sessions active for each blade server installed in the BladeCenter unit.

Use the **console** command from the command line, indicating the target blade server, where *x* is the corresponding blade bay number:

```
console -T system:blade[x]
```

For example, to start an SOL connection to the blade server in blade bay 14, type console -T system:blade[14]

A blade server that occupies more than one blade bay is identified by the lowest bay number that it occupies.

After an SOL session is started, all commands are sent to the blade server that is specified by the **console** command until the SOL session is ended, regardless of the persistent command target that was in effect before the SOL session.

To restart the blade server through an SOL session, use the following key sequence: Esc R Esc r Esc R

Complete the following steps to start a BladeCenter management-module Telnet CLI session:

- From a command prompt, type telnet location
 Where location is the host name or IP address of the BladeCenter management module
- 2. Log on to the BladeCenter management module. The default user name is USERID, and the default password is PASSW0RD (note the number zero, not the letter O, in PASSW0RD).

Ending an SOL session

To end an SOL session, use the following key sequence: Esc (

The command-line interface will return to the persistent command target that was in effect before the SOL session.

To exit a BladeCenter management-module Telnet CLI session, type exit at the BladeCenter management-module Telnet CLI prompt after ending an SOL session.

Chapter 7. Installing the operating system

Important:

• Before you install the operating system on the blade server, make sure that you provide an SOL connection between the blade server and a compatible monitor (or video console), keyboard, and mouse. You must do this because the blade server does not support a direct connection to these devices. The SOL connection serves as a communications channel between the blade server and these devices. The SOL feature must be enabled for both the BladeCenter unit and the blade server before you can start an SOL session with the blade server. Therefore, do not disable this feature. If you have not already done so, you must configure the SOL feature on the blade server to establish an SOL connection and enable the SOL feature as described in Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 and start an SOL session as described in Chapter 6, "Running a Serial Over LAN session," on page 57.

See the IBM @server BladeCenter Management Module Command Line Interface Reference Guide for information about SOL commands. See your operating-system documentation for information about SOL commands that you can enter using the command-line interface.

 If you plan to install the operating system through the Ethernet network, you must install a second Ethernet switch module into I/O bay 2 of the BladeCenter unit.
 For additional information, see Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41.

Note: This Ethernet switch module must be of the same type that you installed in I/O bay 1 of the BladeCenter unit.

- After you install the operating system on your blade server, you must install any service packs or update packages that come with the operating system. For additional information, see the instructions that come with your operating-system documentation and the service packs or update packages.
- The BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 has no external USB ports; however, it can communicate with and use the USB diskette drive and CD-ROM drive that are in the BladeCenter unit chassis.
- Due to SOL requirements, you must select or install network device drivers after you install the operating system. This includes the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 Broadcom Ethernet controller device driver (for additional information, see the instructions that come with the device driver).

To install the operating system on a blade server, follow the operating-system installation instructions that come with the operating system. You can download the latest operating-system installation instructions from the IBM Support Web page at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/ and install the operating system at the BladeCenter unit (local deployment).

Note: The IBM Remote Deployment Manager (RDM) program does not support the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842.

Complete the following steps to download the installation instructions:

- 1. Go to the IBM Support Web page at http://www.ibm.com/pc/support/.
- 2. From the **Browse by product** list on the IBM Support Web page, select **Servers**.

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- 3. Under **Select your product**, from the **Family** list, select your server model; then, select **Display documents**.
- 4. From the **View by document type** list, select **OS installation**. The available installation instructions are displayed.

Note: Some options have device drivers that you must install. See the documentation that comes with the options for information about installing any required device drivers.

If your operating system does not have the required device drivers, contact your IBM marketing representative or authorized reseller, or see your operating-system documentation for additional information.

Chapter 8. Solving problems

This section provides basic troubleshooting information to help you solve some common problems that might occur while setting up your blade server.

If you cannot locate and correct the problem using the information in this section, see the *BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 Hardware Maintenance Manual and Troubleshooting Guide* on the IBM *BladeCenter Documentation* CD that comes with your BladeCenter unit, and the Server Support flowchart in the front of this book.

Diagnostic tools overview

The following tools are available to help you identify and solve hardware-related problems:

· Diagnostic programs, firmware error codes, and location codes

The system diagnostic programs are provided in read-only memory (ROM). These programs test the major components of your blade server. For detailed descriptions of the firmware error codes, see "Firmware error codes" on page 80. Some firmware error codes also include location codes. The location code information is required to identify the failing component. Check the system error logs and event logs to determine the location code information that corresponds to the firmware error code.

· Troubleshooting charts

These charts list problem symptoms and steps to correct the problems. See the "Troubleshooting charts" on page 89 for more information.

- Light path diagnostics
 - Use light path diagnostics to diagnose system errors. See "Light path diagnostics overview" on page 92 for more information.
- Power-on self-test (POST) firmware checkpoints and error codes. See "Checkpoint codes" on page 64 for more information.

The firmware checkpoints are progress codes that your blade server displays during the power-on self-test (POST).

Notes:

- For additional information about firmware error codes, location codes, error logs, event logs, and firmware checkpoints, see the BladeCenter JS20 Type 8842 Hardware Maintenance Manual and Troubleshooting Guide on the IBM BladeCenter Documentation CD.
- If you are unable to find the system error logs in the blade-server firmware code, view the system event logs in the BladeCenter management module.
- Before you have the blade server serviced, make sure that you provide an SOL connection between the blade server and a compatible monitor (or video console), keyboard, and mouse. To do this, you must configure the SOL feature on the blade server as described in Chapter 5, "Configuring your blade server," on page 41 and start an SOL session as described in Chapter 6, "Running a Serial Over LAN session," on page 57.

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System checkout

If your system fails to start after installation or an error occurs while running, perform the following steps:

- 1. Visually check the blade server system board for any lit external LEDs.
 - a. Turn off the server.
 - b. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit.
 - c. Open the blade server and press and hold the light path diagnostics button. See "System-board LEDs" on page 10 for the location of the light path diagnostics button.
 - d. Perform the steps in "Identifying problems using the light path diagnostics" on page 92 to identify lit error LEDs on the blade server.
 - 1) If any LEDs light, see "Light path diagnostics table" on page 93.
 - 2) If there is no error LED lit, proceed to the next step.
- 2. Reinstall the blade server in the same slot of the BladeCenter unit.
- To test the blade server, turn on the blade server and start a Serial over LAN (SOL) session.
- 4. Observe the progress codes in the SOL window and record any power-on self-test (POST) error messages or system checkpoint codes that occur. If an error occurs, see "Firmware error codes" on page 80 for more information.
- 5. Review the BladeCenter management-module event log and Linux Syslog to see if an error was recorded. If there is a hardware error, contact a service support representative and provide the details of the problem. If there is no hardware error, contact a service support representative for more information to resolve your problem.

Checkpoint codes

The power-on self-test (POST) firmware checkpoints (progress codes) indicate the detection of a problem if the server stops on a checkpoint during the startup process.

- A four-digit code indicates successful completion of POST when the server does not stop on that checkpoint.
- A result other than a four-digit code indicates that POST might have detected a problem. Error messages also appear during startup if POST detects a hardware-configuration problem. The last POST firmware checkpoint code posted is the most likely failure.

Checkpoints display in the system console from the time that ac power is connected to the system until the operating system login prompt is displayed after a successful operating system startup. These checkpoints have the following forms:

Dxxx, Exxx

Dxxx and Exxx checkpoints indicate that a system processor is in control and is initializing the system resources. Control passes to the operating system when E105 displays on the operator panel display. Location code information might also display on the operator panel during this time.

These codes range from Dxxx to EFFF.

Error codes

If a fault is detected, an 8-digit error code is displayed in the BladeCenter management-module event log. A location code might be displayed at the same time on the second line.

The management-module log, which can be accessed through the BladeCenter unit, contains the most recent error codes and messages that the system generated during POST.

Power problems

	The new configuration information was saved in the blade-server firmware code. Whenever memory or an option is changed, the new configuration information is automatically saved in the blade-server firmware code.

Option problems

An IBM option that was just installed does not work.	Make sure that: The option is designed for the blade server. Service processor problems

	 Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit. Wait 30 seconds and reinstall the blade server into the BladeCenter unit. Restart the blade server. If the problem remains, call for service.

Light path diagnostics overview

If the system-error LED on the system LED panel on the front or rear of the BladeCenter unit is lit, one or more error LEDs on the BladeCenter unit components also might be lit. These LEDs help identify the cause of the problem.

Identifying problems using the light path diagnostics

This section provides the information to identify, using the light path diagnostics, problems that might arise during installation. To locate the actual component that caused the error, you must locate the lit error LED on that component.

For example:

A blade server error has occurred and you have noted that the blade server blade-error LED is lit on the blade-server control panel. You then:

- 1. Remove the blade server from the BladeCenter unit.
- 2. Place the blade server on a flat, static-protective surface.
- 3. Remove the cover from the blade server.
- 4. Press and hold the light path diagnostics button to relight the LEDs that were lit before you removed the blade server from the BladeCenter unit. The LEDs will remain lit for as long as you press the button, to a maximum of 25 seconds.

See "System-board LEDs" on page 10 for the location of the light path diagnostics button and error LEDs, then see the "Light path diagnostics table" on page 93.

Light path diagnostics table

Use the following table to help determine the cause of the error and the action you should take.

Notes:

- Power is available to relight the light path diagnostics LEDs for a short period of time after the blade server is removed from the BladeCenter unit. During that period of time, you can relight the light path diagnostics LEDs for a maximum of 25 seconds (or less, depending on the number of LEDs that are lit and the length of time the blade server is removed from the BladeCenter unit) by pressing the light path diagnostics button (SW1).
- · Error LED CR29 is not used.



Recovering the system firmware code

The system firmware is contained in two separate images in the flash memory of the blade server (primary and backup). If the primary image becomes damaged, such as from a power failure during a flash update, you can recover the primary image from the backup image. If this occurs, you can see one of two symptoms:

- The system automatically starts up from backup. This is indicated by the error code 20D00902.
- The system hangs or is non-responsive after the system is started with no checkpoints.


Note: The primary image is also known as the TEMP side of the flash module. The backup image is also known as the PERM side of the flash module. If your system hangs, you can force the system to startup the backup image by using the code page jumper (J14).

Starting the backup image

To force the system to startup the backup image, complete the following steps:

Note: Do not perform these steps if the system error code 20D00902 has already occurred on your system.

- 1. Turn off the blade server.
- 2. Remove the blade server (see "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23).
- 3. Open the blade-server cover (see "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions).
- 4. Remove the blade-server bezel assembly (see "Removing the blade-server bezel assembly" on page 25).
- 5. Locate jumper J14 (system firmware code page jumper) on the system board.




- 6. Move jumper J14 to pins 2 and 3 to enable system firmware recovery mode.
- Replace the cover and reinstall the blade server in the BladeCenter unit, making sure that the blade server controls all relevant components and restart the blade server.
- 8. If the system starts with the operating system prompt, see "Recovering the primary image" on page 97. If the system does not start with the operating system prompt, replace the system board. Contact a service support representative for assistance.

Note: If the blade server does not restart, you must replace the system board. Contact a service support representative for assistance.

Recovering the primary image

To recover the primary image, you must perform the reject function. The reject function copies the backup image into the primary image. To perform the reject function, complete the following steps:

- 1. If you have not installed the ppc64 Linux utilities, perform the installation now. See http://techsupport.services.ibm/pc/support.
- 2. Reject the primary image. Type update_flash -r.
- 3. Shut down the blade server using the operating system.
- 4. If you have not moved jumper J14, restart the system.
- 5. If you moved jumper J14, complete the following steps:
 - a. Turn off the blade server.
 - b. Remove the blade server (see "Removing the blade server from the BladeCenter unit" on page 23).
 - c. Open the blade-server cover (see "Opening the blade server cover" on page 24 for instructions).
 - d. Remove the blade-server bezel assembly (see "Removing the blade-server bezel assembly" on page 25).
 - e. Locate jumper J14 (system firmware code page jumper) on the system board.



f. Move jumper J14 to pins 1 and 2 to enable system firmware recovery mode.

g. Replace the cover and reinstall the blade server in the BladeCenter unit, making sure that the blade server controls all relevant components and restart the blade server.

The term "Machine" does not include any software programs, whether pre-loaded with the Machine, installed subsequently or otherwise. Nothing in this Statement of Limited Warranty affects any statutory rights of consumers that cannot be waived or limited by contract.

What this Warranty Covers

IBM warrants that each Machine 1) is free from defects in materials and workmanship and 2) conforms to IBM's Official Published Specifications ("Specifications") which are available on request. The warranty period for the Machine starts on the original Date of Installation and is specified in Part 3 - Warranty Information. The date on your invoice or sales receipt is the Date of Installation unless IBM or your reseller informs you otherwise. Many features, conversions, or upgrades involve the removal of parts and their return to IBM. A part that replaces a removed part will assume the warranty service status of the removed part. Unless IBM specifies otherwise, these warranties apply only in the country or region in which you purchased the Machine.

THESE WARRANTIES ARE YOUR EXCLUSIVE WARRANTIES AND REPLACE ALL OTHER WARRANTIES OR CONDITIONS, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OR CONDITIONS OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE. SOME STATES OR JURISDICTIONS DO NOT ALLOW THE EXCLUSION OF EXPRESS OR IMPLIED WARRANTIES, SO THE ABOVE EXCLUSION MAY NOT APPLY TO YOU. IN THAT EVENT, SUCH WARRANTIES ARE LIMITED IN DURATION TO THE WARRANTY PERIOD. NO WARRANTIES APPLY AFTER THAT PERIOD. SOME STATES OR JURISDICTIONS DO NOT ALLOW LIMITATIONS ON HOW LONG AN IMPLIED WARRANTY LASTS, SO THE ABOVE LIMITATION MAY NOT APPLY TO YOU.

What this Warranty Does not Cover

This warranty does not cover the following:

- any software programs, whether pre-loaded or shipped with the Machine, or installed subsequently;
- failure resulting from misuse (including but not limited to use of any Machine capacity or capability, other than that authorized by IBM in writing), accident, modification, unsuitable physical or operating environment, or improper maintenance by you;
- · failure caused by a product for which IBM is not responsible; and
- any non-IBM products, including those that IBM may procure and provide with or integrate into an IBM Machine at your request.

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The warranty is voided by removal or alteration of identification labels on the Machine or its parts.

IBM does not warrant uninterrupted or error-free operation of a Machine.

Any technical or other support provided for a Machine under warranty, such as assistance via telephone with "how-to" questions and those regarding Machine set-up and installation, is provided WITHOUT WARRANTIES OF ANY KIND.

How to Obtain Warranty Service

If the Machine does not function as warranted during the warranty period, contact IBM or your reseller to obtain warranty service. If you do not register the Machine with IBM, you may be required to present proof of purchase as evidence of your entitlement to warranty service.

What IBM Will Do to Correct Problems

When you call for service, you must follow the problem determination and resolution procedures that IBM specifies. A technician will attempt to make an initial diagnosis of your problem and help you resolve it over the telephone.
