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About this document

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This document provides information about how to plan, install, configure, and work with IBM[®] TotalStorage[™] Fibre Array Storage Technology (FAStT) Storage Manager Version 8.3 in a Microsoft[®] Windows NT[®] 4.0, Windows[®] 2000, and Windows Server 2003 operating system environment. Use this guide to:

- Determine the hardware and software that you will require to install the storage-management software.
- Integrate the necessary hardware components into your network.
- Install the FAStT Storage Manager software.
- · Upgrade controller firmware, if necessary.
- Identify storage-management features that are unique to your installation.

Note: Throughout this document, Storage Manager Version 8.3 refers to software levels 8.30 or higher.

Who should read this document

This document is intended for system administrators and storage administrators who are responsible for installing software. Readers should have knowledge of redundant array of independent disks (RAID), small computer system interface (SCSI), and Fibre Channel technology, They should also have working knowledge of the applicable operating systems that are used with the management software.

FAStT installation process overview

The following flow chart gives an overview of the FAStT hardware and the FAStT Storage Manager software installation process. Lined arrows in the flow chart indicate consecutive steps in the hardware and software installation process. Labeled arrows indicate which current documents provide detailed information about

those steps.




Figure 1. Installation process flow by current publications

This document provides information on how to prepare, install, configure, and start IBM TotalStorage FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 in a Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, or Windows Server 2003 environment. All references to the Storage Manager refer to the IBM TotalStorage FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3.

Before you begin the installation of this product, consult the following documentation:

- readme.txt file
 - Read this first. The readme file is located in the root directory of the installation CD. For the latest installation and user information, refer to the IBM Web site at: www.ibm.com/pc/support/
- IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 7.10 Concepts Guide
 Use this document to become familiar with terminology and features of the IBM FAStT Storage Manager software. To download this book, go to the Web site at: www.ibm.com/pc/support/

When you finish the installation process, refer to the following online help systems:

- Enterprise Management window help
 Use this online help system to learn more about working with the entire management domain.

You can access these help systems from within the Storage Manager 8.3 Client. From either an Enterprise Management or Subsystem Management window, click **Help** or press F1.

After you install IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3, consider installing the FAStT Management Suite Java (MSJ) and SANavigator diagnostic programs. You can use these programs to verify the status of the Fibre Channel connections before you use the storage subsystem.

The SANavigator program, the *IBM FAStT MSJ User's Guide*, and the FAStT MSJ program are located on the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD. For information about how to install and run SANavigator, see the *FAStT Hardware Maintenance Manual and Problem Determination Guide*.

New features

This section describes the standard features that are part of the Storage Manager Version 8.3 software. Your storage subsystem firmware must be version 5.3x.xx if you want to use any of the features listed in this section. If your controller firmware is version 04.x or earlier, you must purchase a firmware upgrade option.

The following list includes new standard features that have been added to the storage management software:

- Support for IBM TotalStorage FAStT900 and FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server
- Support for online Environmental Services Monitor (ESM) card firmware downloads

The ESM cards are customer replaceable unit (CRU) components in the IBM FAStT storage expansion units. The ESM firmware can be updated while the storage subsystem receives I/Os from the servers.

- Support for offline Fibre Channel hard drive firmware and mode page downloads
 The I/O from the servers must be suspended while the hard drive firmware and mode page download.
- · Support for Media Scan without Parity repairs
- Support for forcibly disabling Fibre Channel drive-level write caching
- · Support the controller state dump function for diagnostics
- Support for IBM TotalStorage FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server

Premium features

FAStT600

The FlashCopy and Remote Mirror features are not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server.

There are two premium features, $FlashCopy^{TM}$ and the Remote Mirror option, that can be enabled by purchasing a premium feature key. Each of these features is described in the following sections:

FlashCopy

This feature supports the creation and management of FlashCopy logical drives. A FlashCopy logical drive is a logical point-in-time image of another logical drive, called a base logical drive, that is in the storage subsystem. A FlashCopy is the logical equivalent of a complete physical copy, but you create it much more quickly and it requires less disk space. Because a FlashCopy is a host addressable logical drive, you can perform backups using the FlashCopy while the base logical drive remains online and user-accessible. In addition, you can write to the FlashCopy logical drive to perform application testing or scenario development and analysis. The maximum number of FlashCopy logical drives allowed is one half of the total number of logical drives supported by your controller model. For more information, see "Creating a FlashCopy logical drive" on page 100.

Remote Mirror Option

The Remote Mirror option is used for online, real-time replication of data between storage subsystems over a remote distance. In the event of a disaster or unrecoverable error on one storage subsystem, the Remote Mirror Option enables you to promote a second storage subsystem to take over responsibility for normal input/output (I/O) operations. When the Remote Mirror option is enabled, the maximum number of logical drives per storage subsystem is reduced. For more information, see "Using the Remote Mirror Option" on page 100.

FAStT600 restrictions

Windows Server 2003 is not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server. The following features are also not supported on the FAStT600:

- FlashCopy
- · Remote Mirror Option

If you are upgrading from a previous version of the storage management software, some of the terms you are familiar with have changed. It is important that you familiarize yourself with the new terminology. Table 9 provides a list of some of the changed terms. It is important to understand the distinction between the following two terms when you read this document:

Management station

A management station is a system that is used to manage the storage subsystem. It can be attached to the storage subsystem in the following ways:

- Through a TCP/IP Ethernet connection to the controllers in the storage subsystem
- Through a TCP/IP connection to the host-agent software that is installed on a host computer, which in turn is directly attached to the storage subsystem through the Fibre Channel input/output (I/O) path

Host computer

A host computer is a system that is directly attached to the storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel I/O path. This system is used to perform the following tasks.:

- · Serve data (typically in the form of files) from the storage subsystem
- Function as a connection point to the storage subsystem for a remote-management station

Notes:

- The terms host and host computer are used interchangeably throughout this book.
- 2. A host computer can also function as a management station.

IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 software

Storage Manager Version 8.3 contains the following software components for Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, and Windows Server 2003:

- Microsoft Virtual Machine (for Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions only)
- Storage Manager 8.3 Client (SMclient)
- Redundant Disk Array Controller (RDAC)
- Storage Manager 8.3 Agent (SMagent)
- Storage Manager 8.3 Utility (SMutil)

Note: The SMclient and SMagent software packages will not be available for the Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions. In order to manage storage servers when connected to a host server with Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions installed, you must use host servers or management workstations that have Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, or Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions installed.

Microsoft Virtual Machine

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For systems running Windows NT 4.0 or Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions, the Microsoft Virtual Machine is required to support the following Storage Manager 8.3 components or options:

- SMagent
- · Event Monitor option of the SMclient

Storage Manager 8.3 Client

The Storage Manager 8.3 Client (SMclient) component provides the graphical user interface (GUI) for managing storage subsystems. The SMclient contains two main components:

- Enterprise Management. You can use the Enterprise Management component to add, remove, and monitor storage subsystems within the management
- Subsystem Management. You can use the Subsystem Management component to manage the components of an individual storage subsystem.

The Event Monitor is a separate program that is bundled with the SMclient. If installed, it monitors storage subsystems whenever the Enterprise Management window is closed. It runs continuously in the background and can send alert notifications in the event of a critical problem.

The redundant disk array controller (RDAC) contains the multi-path device driver that is necessary to provide controller failover support when a component on the Fibre Channel I/O path fails. For RDAC in Storage Manager 8 and higher, a maximum of four end-to-end Fibre Channel paths from the host to the storage subsystems are supported.

Storage Manager 8.3 Agent

The Storage Manager Agent (SMagent) provides a management conduit for the SMclient to configure and monitor the subsystem through the Fibre Channel I/O path. The agent also provides local or remote access to the SMclient depending on whether the client is installed on the host or in a network management station over the TCP/IP network.

Storage Manager 8.3 Utility

The Storage Manager 8.3 Utility (SMutil) dynamically defines and maps new logical drives to the operating system. This software package contains the following components:

- · Hot Add utility. The Hot Add utility enables you to register newly created logical drives with the operating system. For more information, see "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101.
- **SMdevices utility.** The SMdevices utility enables you to associate storage subsystem logical drives with operating-system device names. For more information, see "Using the SMdevices utility" on page 101.
- SMflashcopyassist utility. The SMflashcopyassist utility enables you to perform the following tasks:
 - Flush cached data before creating a FlashCopy[™] logical drive
 - Resolve duplicate logical drive signatures between the base logical drives and the FlashCopy logical drives (Windows NT 4.0 only)

For more information, see "Using the SMflashcopyassist utility" on page 102.

Note: FlashCopy is a premium feature that you must purchase and it is not supported on FAStT600. Contact your IBM service representative for more information.

Storage-subsystem management methods

The storage management software provides the following two methods for managing storage subsystems:

- · the host-agent management method
- · the direct management method

Depending on your specific storage-subsystem configurations, you can use either or both methods. The management methods you select will determine where you will need to install the software components.

Host-agent (in-band) management method




Figure 2. Host-agent (in-band) managed storage subsystems

When you use the host-agent (in-band) management method, you manage the storage subsystems through the Fibre Channel I/O path to the host. The management information can either be processed in the host or passed to the management station through the network connection, as shown in Figure 2 on page 7.

Managing storage subsystems through the host-agent has the following advantages:

- Ethernet cables do not need to be run to the controllers.
- A DHCP/BOOTP server is not needed to connect the storage subsystems to the network.
- The controller network configuration tasks that are described in Chapter 2, "Preparing for installation", on page 25, do not need to be performed.
- A host name or IP address must only be specified for the host instead of for the individual controllers in a storage subsystem. Storage subsystems that are attached to the host are automatically discovered.

Managing storage subsystems through the host-agent has the following disadvantages:

- The host-agent requires a special logical drive, called an *access logical drive*, to communicate with the controllers in the storage subsystem. Therefore, you are limited to configuring one less logical drive than the maximum number that is allowed by the operating system and the host adapter that you are using.
- If the connection through the Fibre Channel is lost between the host and the subsystem, the subsystem cannot be managed or monitored.

Note: The access logical drive is also referred to as the *Universal Xport Device*.

Important: If your host already has the maximum number of logical drives configured, either use the direct management method or give up a logical drive for use as the access logical drive. For more information, see "Number of supported logical drives" on page 22.

Direct-management (out-of-band) method




Figure 3. Direct-management (out-of-band) storage subsystems

When you use the direct-management (out-of-band) method, you manage storage subsystems directly over the network through a TCP/IP Ethernet connection to each controller. To manage the storage subsystem through the Ethernet connections, you must define the IP address and host name for each controller. Each of the storage subsystem controllers must be connected, through a cable connected to the RJ-45 connector, to an Ethernet network, as shown in Figure 3 on page 9.

Managing storage subsystems using the direct-management (out-of-band) method has the following advantages:

- The Ethernet connections to the controllers enable a management station running SMclient to manage storage subsystems that are connected to a host running any of the operating systems that are supported by Storage Manager 8.3.
- An access logical drive is not needed to communicate with the controllers. You can configure the maximum number of logical drives that are supported by the operating system and the host adapter that you are using.
- The user can manage and troubleshoot the storage subsystem when there are problems with the Fibre Channel links.

Managing storage subsystems using the direct-management (out-of-band) method has the following disadvantages:

- · You need two Ethernet cables to connect the storage subsystem controllers to a network.
- · When adding devices, you must specify an IP address or host name for each controller.
- Network preparation tasks are required and you might need a DHCP/BOOTP server. For a summary of the preparation tasks, see "Preparing a network installation" on page 25.

You can avoid DHCP/BOOTP server and network tasks by assigning static IP addresses to the controller, or by using a default IP address.

- To assign a static IP address, see the IBM support Web site at: www.ibm.com/support/ Refer to Retain Tip #H171389 Unable To Setup Networking Without DHCP/BOOTP.
- If the storage subsystem controllers have firmware version 05.00.xx. or later, they have the following default settings.

Reviewing a sample network




Figure 4. Sample network using directly-managed and host-agent managed storage subsystems

Figure 4 on page 10 shows an example of a network that contains both a directly-managed storage subsystem (Network A) and a host-agent-managed storage subsystem (Network B).

Directly-managed storage subsystem: Network A is a directly-managed storage subsystem. Network A contains the following components:

- A DHCP/BOOTP server
- A network management station (NMS) for Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) traps
- · A host that is connected to a storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel I/O
- A management station that is connected by an Ethernet cable to the storage subsystem controllers

Note: If the controllers, static IP addresses or default IP addresses are used, you do not need to setup the DHCP/BOOTP server.

Host-agent-managed storage subsystem: Network B is a host-agent-managed storage subsystem. Network B contains the following components:

- A host that is connected to a storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel I/O path
- A management station that is connected by an Ethernet cable to the host computer

Where to install the software components

How you manage the storage subsystems determines where you must install the various software components.

Management stations

You must install the following software components on each management station:

- SMclient
- Microsoft Virtual Machine (for Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only)

Host computers

You must install the following software components on each host computer:

- RDAC
- SMutil

Depending on how you intend to manage the storage subsystems, you might need to install the following software components:

- SMagent
- SMclient

Note: The SMclient and SMagent software packages will not be available for the Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions. In order to manage storage servers when connected to a host server with Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions installed, you must use host servers or management workstations that have Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, or Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions installed.

You must install the SMagent on a host computer if you intend to manage the storage subsystems using the host-agent management method. In Microsoft Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only, Microsoft Virtual Machine must be installed before you install SMagent software.

You must install the SMclient on a host computer if you intend the host computer to act as a management station. If the host computer is not connected to a network, you must install TCP/IP software and assign an IP address.

Configuration types

You can install Storage Manager 8.3 in one of two configurations:

- Standard (noncluster) configuration
- · Cluster server configuration

Standard (noncluster) configuration




Figure 5. Sample standard (noncluster) configuration

Figure 5 shows a sample standard (noncluster) configuration.

Cluster server configuration




Figure 6. Sample cluster server configuration

Figure 6 shows a sample cluster server configuration.

Installation types

You can install the storage management software in two types of hardware environments:

- New storage subsystem environment. Use this hardware environment if you are installing the IBM TotalStorage FAStT Fibre Channel Storage Server using firmware 05.3x.xx.xx and you will manage storage subsystems using Storage Manager 8.3.
- Existing storage subsystem environment. If you are installing the storage management software in an environment with existing storage subsystems, see Table 10 on page 14 for your installation options.

Note: When instructed to uninstall Storage Manager software in the following table, be sure to uninstall the management software on all management systems or hosts that have access to the storage subsystem that has firmware 5.3x.xx.xx. The Storage Manager 8.3 RDAC has new functionality and features and it is compatible with older versions of firmware. To ensure the

highest level of compatibility and error-free operation, the Storage Manager 8.3 RDAC must be installed on all host computers that have disks defined on storage subsystems that have firmware level 5.3x.xx.xx.

Managing coexisting storage subsystems

Storage subsystems are coexisting storage subsystems when the following conditions are met:

- Multiple storage subsystems with controllers are running different versions of firmware.
- · These storage subsystems are attached to the same host.

For example, a coexisting situation exists when you have a new storage subsystem with controllers running firmware version 05.3x.xx.xx, and it is attached to the same host as one or more of the following configurations:

- A storage subsystem with controllers running firmware versions 04.00.xx.xx through 04.00.01.xx, which is managed by a separate management station with Storage Manager 7.10
- A storage subsystem with controllers running firmware versions 04.00.02.xx through 04.01.xx.xx, which is managed with Storage Manager 8.3

Important: The common host must have the latest level (8.3) of RDAC and SMagent installed.

Firmware requirements

To utilize all of the features of Storage Manager 8.3, your storage subsystem must contain controllers with firmware version 5.3x.xx.xx for machine types 1722, 1742, 3552, and 3542. To manage storage subsystems with Storage Manager 8.3, your storage subsystems must contain controllers with firmware versions 04.00.02.xx or higher.

To upgrade your firmware from version 04.xx.xx.xx to 05.3x.xx.xx for machine types 3552 and 3542, you must purchase a firmware option. For more information, contact your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative.

Storage Manager 8.3 also supports two premium feature options: FlashCopy and Remote Mirroring. For more information about these premium features, see "Creating a FlashCopy logical drive" on page 100 and "Using the Remote Mirror Option" on page 100, or contact your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative.

Preparing a network installation

To begin installing the storage management software, ensure that the network components are set up and operating properly, and that you have all the host and controller information needed for the software to operate correctly.

The following steps provide an overview of the tasks involved in setting up a network installation:

- 1. Install all hardware components (host computers, storage subsystems, and cables) that you want to connect to the network. You might need to refer to the installation guides specific to the hardware components.
- 2. Establish a naming convention for the storage subsystems connected to the network. Refer to "Naming the storage subsystems" on page 27 for more information.
- 3. Record the storage subsystem names and management types in Table 22 on page 109. An example of a completed information record is shown in Table 16.

Note: Throughout the remaining steps, you will need to return to Table 22 on page 109 to record information such as hardware Ethernet addresses and IP addresses.

- 4. (For a directly-managed system only) Determine the hardware Ethernet address for each controller in storage subsystems connected to the network. Refer to "Identifying the hardware Ethernet MAC address for each controller" on page 27 for more information.
- 5. (For a directly-managed system only) If you are using a default controller IP address, go to step 7. Otherwise, obtain the TCP/IP address and host name for each of the controllers in the storage subsystems on the network from the network administrator. Refer to "Assigning IP addresses to hosts and controllers" on page 29.
 - (For a host-managed system only) Obtain the IP address and host name of the host computer on which the host-agent software will run from the network administrator. Refer to "Assigning IP addresses to hosts and controllers" on page 29.
- 6. (For a directly-managed system only) Set up the DHCP/BOOTP server to provide network configuration information for a specific controller. If you are using a controller static IP addresses, skip this step.
- 7. Verify that the TCP/IP software is installed. For more information, see "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.
- 8. (For a directly-managed system only) Set up the host or domain name server (DNS) table. For more information, see "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.
- 9. Power on the devices connected to the network.

Table 16 shows a sample information record for the network shown in Figure 4 on page 10. This network contains storage subsystems that are managed by using both the direct-management and host-agent-management method.

Naming the storage subsystems

As you set up your network, decide on a naming convention for the storage subsystems. When you install the storage management software and start it for the first time, all storage subsystems in the management domain are displayed as <unnamed>. Use the Subsystem Management window to rename the individual storage subsystems.

Consider the following factors when naming storage subsystems:

- There is a 30-character limit. All leading and trailing spaces are deleted from the name.
- Use a unique, meaningful naming scheme that is easy to understand and remember.
- Avoid arbitrary names or names that might quickly lose their meaning.
- The software displays storage-subsystem names with the prefix Storage Subsystem. Therefore, if you rename a storage subsystem to Engineering, it is displayed as:

Storage Subsystem Engineering

After you decide on a naming scheme, record the storage-subsystem names in the information record (Table 22 on page 109).

If you plan to manage your storage subsystem using the direct-management method, go to "Identifying the hardware Ethernet MAC address for each controller". If you plan to manage your storage subsystem using the host-agent management method, go to "Assigning IP addresses to hosts and controllers" on page 29.

Identifying the hardware Ethernet MAC address for each controller

To manage your storage subsystem using the direct-management method, you need to identify the hardware Ethernet Medium Access (MAC) address for each controller.

To identify the hardware Ethernet MAC address for machine types 3542 and 1722, perform the following steps:




Figure 8. Locating the Ethernet MAC address for machine types 3542 and 1722

- 1. Locate the Ethernet MAC address at the back of the unit, under the controller Fibre Channel Host ports, as shown in Figure 8 on page 28. The number will be in the form xx.xx.xx.xx.xx (for example, 00.a0.b8.20.00.d8).
- 2. Record each Ethernet address in the information record (Table 22 on page 109).

To identify the hardware Ethernet MAC address for machine types 3552 and 1742, perform the following steps:




Figure 9. Removing the controller-unit bezel (machine types 3552 and 1742)

1. Remove the front bezel from the storage subsystem, as shown in Figure 9. Carefully pull the bottom of the bezel out 1 to release the pins. Then slide the bezel down 2 .

- 2. On the front of each controller, look for a label with the hardware Ethernet MAC address. The number will be in the form xx.xx.xx.xx.xx (for example, 00.a0.b8.20.00.d8).
- 3. Record each Ethernet address in the information record (Table 22 on page 109).




Figure 10. Replacing the controller-unit bezel (machine types 3552 and 1742)

4. To replace the bezel, slide the top edge under the lip on the chassis 1. Then push the bezel bottom until the pins snap into the mounting holes 2, as shown in Figure 10.

5. Continue with "Assigning IP addresses to hosts and controllers".

Assigning IP addresses to hosts and controllers

If you plan to manage your storage subsystem using the direct-management method, assign a unique IP address for every controller in all storage subsystems on the network. Record the IP address for each controller in the information record (Table 22 on page 109). Then, go to "Setting up the DHCP or BOOTP-compatible server" on page 30.

Note: If you want to assign static IP addresses for the controllers, refer to Retain Tip #H171389 *Unable to setup networking without DHCP/BOOTP* at the IBM support Web site at:

www.ibm.com/support/ Then go to "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.

If you plan to manage your storage subsystem using the host-agent management method, assign an IP address for each host on which you will install the host-agent software. Record the IP address for each host in the information record (Table 22 on page 109). Then, go to "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.

Setting up the DHCP or BOOTP-compatible server

To directly manage storage subsystems through the Ethernet connection to each controller, you will need to set up a DHCP or BOOTP-compatible server and configure the following options:

- Router/Gateway
- · DNS Server
- Hostname
- DNS

This section provides instructions for setting up a DHCP server on Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, Windows Server 2003, and Novell NetWare, as well as instructions for setting up a UNIX BOOT server.

Note: The remote management station (RMS) and network management station (NMS) entries used in previous versions of the storage management software are not required when using Storage Manager 8.3.

Setting up a Windows NT 4.0 DHCP server

You must use a version of DHCP that supports BOOTP static addressing. To use a DHCP server, you must have a DHCP Manager installed. If a DHCP Manager is installed on the system, go to "Setting up a DHCP server". If a DHCP Manager is not installed, use the following installation procedure to install one.

Installing the DHCP Manager

Use the following procedure to install the DHCP Manager:

- 1. Click Start → Settings → Control Panel. A Control Panel window opens.
- 2. Double-click **Network**. The Network window opens.
- 3. Click Services.
- 4. From the Services tab, click Add.
- 5. Click Microsoft DHCP Server. Click OK.
- 6. Specify the path to the Windows NT Install file. Click Continue. A dialogue window opens, stating that a static IP address is required.
- 7. Click **OK**. The Network window opens.
- 8. Click Protocols.
- 9. Click TCP/IP Protocol. Click Properties.
- 10. Verify that the IP address information is correct. Then click **OK**.
- 11. Continue to "Setting up a DHCP server".

Note: After you install the DHCP Manager, you can refer to its online help for additional information.

Setting up a DHCP server

Use the following procedure, along with the information you recorded in Table 22 on page 109, to set up a DHCP server:

- 1. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → DHCP Manager. The DHCP Manager window opens.
- 2. Create a scope. A scope defines a group of TCP/IP addresses that you want the DHCP server to use to assign to the controllers.
 - a. Click Local Machine.

b. Click **Scope → Create**. The Create Scope - (Local) window opens.




Figure 11. Create Scope - (Local) window

c. Type the starting and ending IP addresses of the controllers that you are configuring for the network.

For example, if you are configuring 50 controllers on a 153.79.144.0 subnet, set the starting address to 153.79.144.1 and the ending address to 153.79.144.50.

Note: If each field does not contain at least three characters, press the period (.) key to advance to the next field. If you have only one controller, type its address for both the starting and ending address.

- d. Type the subnet mask (obtained from your network administrator).
- e. Set the Lease Duration to **Unlimited**. This makes the DHCP connection permanent.
- f. Type a scope name and comment.
- g. Click OK.
- h. When the scope successfully completes, click **Yes** to activate it. This returns you to the DHCP Manager window.
- Configure global scope options. Table 17 shows the global options that you need to set.

a. Click DHCP Options - Global. The DHCP Options: Global window opens.




Figure 12. DHCP Options: Global window

- b. To make a global option active, select an item in the Unused Options list. Click Add to move it to the Active options list.
- c. Click **Value** to assign a value to the active option. If the Value field is not available, click Edit Array. The Edit Array Editor window opens. Perform one of the following actions:
 - If you need to add an IP address, complete the following procedure:
 - 1) Click Edit Array. The IP Address Array Editor window opens.





Figure 13. IP Address Array Editor window

- 2) Type a unique IP address for the option that you added.
- 3) Click Add to move the New IP Address to the IP Addresses list.
- 4) Click **OK**. This returns you to the DHCP Options: Global window.
- · If you do not need to add an IP address, click Cancel. This returns you to the DHCP Options: Global window.
- d. Repeat step 3b through step 3c until all global options are added.
- e. When you finish adding the Global Scope Options, click **OK** at the DHCP Options: Global window.
- 4. Create a reservation for each controller. Use the information record (Table 22 on page 109) to make sure that you include all of the controllers on the network.

- a. Click Scope Add Reservations.
- In the IP Address field, type the IP address for the first controller on your data sheet.
- c. In the **Unique Identifier** field, type the controller hardware Ethernet address. Do not type decimal points or spaces.
- d. In the Client Name field, type the controller eight-character name.
- e. Click Add.
- f. Repeat step 4b on page 33 through step 4e on page 33 for each controller that is listed on the information record (Table 22 on page 109).
- g. When you finish adding the information for all of the controllers, click **Close**. This returns you to the DHCP Manager window.
- 5. Configure controller-specific options. By creating a controller-specific option, you can associate a controller configuration entry with a specific controller.

Note: If you set an option as **Global Scope**, it applies to every controller in this group and you do not need to add it again.

a. Click **Scope** • **Active Leases**. The Active Leases window opens.

- b. Select a controller in the list.
- c. Click **Properties**. The Add Option Type window opens. The Unique Identifier is the hardware Ethernet address from step 4c.




Figure 15. Add Option Type window

- d. Click **Options**. The DHCP Options: Reservations window opens.
- e. Select an option from the Unused Options list and click Add to move it to the Active Options list.
- f. Click **Value** to assign a value to the active option.
- g. Type the information for the value of the option. For example, type the host name for the controller from your information record (Table 22 on page 109) in the String field. Click Edit if the value that you need to add is an IP address for a router.
- h. Repeat step 5e through step 5g until you finish adding specific options for this controller.
- i. Click **OK**. This returns you to the Add Option Type window.
- Click OK. This returns you to the Active Leases window.
- k. Repeat step 5b on page 33 through step 5j until you finish adding controller-specific options for every controller.
- I. Click **OK** on the Active Leases window. This returns you to the DHCP Manager window.
- Continue with "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.

Setting up a Windows 2000 DHCP server

You must use a version of DHCP that supports BOOTP static addressing. To use a DHCP server, you must have a DHCP Manager installed. If a DHCP Manager is installed on the system, go to "Creating a scope and setting up a DHCP server" on page 35.

Installing the DHCP Manager

To install the DHCP Manager, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Administrative Tools → Configure Your Server. The Configure Your Server window opens.
- 2. In the left pane, double-click Networking. Click DHCP.
- 3. In the right pane, click Start. The Windows Components Wizard starts.
- 4. In the Components field, select Networking Services. Then click Details. The Networking Services window opens.

Note: Do not select the check box; you do not want to install all of the Networking Services subcomponents.


- 5. In the Subcomponents of Networking Services field, select Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP).
- 6. Click **OK**. The Windows Components Wizard window opens.
- 7. Click Next to start the installation process.
- 8. If prompted, type the full path to the Windows 2000 distribution files and click **Continue**.
- 9. When the installation has successfully completed, the Windows Components Wizard window closes and the Configure Your Server Window opens.
- 10. Click Next.
- 11. Click Open the DHCP Manager. The DHCP window opens.
- 12. Continue with step 2 of "Creating a scope and setting up a DHCP server".

- 2. In the Console tree, right-click the server you want to configure; click **New Scope**. The New Scope Wizard starts.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions to define the scope of IP addresses for TCP/IP clients. You will define the following fields:
 - a. Scope name and description
 - b. IP address range for the subnet mask, and the controllers you are configuring.

- c. IP addresses that you want to exclude from the IP address range
- d. IP address lease duration
- e. Common DHCP options:
 - · IP address for a router
 - · Domain name and DNS servers
- 4. When you have defined the scope, click Yes, I want to activate this scope **now**. The wizard ends, and the DHCP window appears.
- 5. In the Console tree, open the scope folder.
- 6. Right-click Reservations. Then select New Reservations. The New Reservations window opens.
- 7. To define the IP address reservation, type the following information:
 - a. Reservation name
 - b. IP address
 - c. Ethernet hardware MAC address
 - d. Description
- 8. In the Supported Type field, select Both (DHCP and BOOTP).
- 9. Click Add.
- 10. Repeat step 5 through step 9 for each controller in the network.
- 11. Restart the DHCP server and then restart the storage subsystem so that all modifications are applied.
- 12. Go to "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.

Setting up a Windows Server 2003 DHCP server

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You must use a version of DHCP that supports BOOTP static addressing. To use a DHCP server, you must have a DHCP Manager installed. If a DHCP Manager is already installed on the system, see "Creating a scope and setting up a DHCP server".

Installing the DHCP Manager

To install the DHCP Manager, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click **Start → Control Panel → Add or Remove Programs**. The Add or Remove Programs window opens.
- 2. In the left pane, click **Add/Remove Windows Components**. The Windows Components Wizard window opens.
- 3. In the **Components** field, select **Networking Services**. Then click **Details**. The Networking Services window opens.

Note: Do not select the check box; you do not want to install all of the Networking Services subcomponents.

- In the Subcomponents of Networking Services field, select Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP). Click OK. The Networking Services window closes.
- 5. In the Windows Components Wizard window, click **Next** to start the installation process.
- 6. If prompted, type the full path to the Windows Server 2003 distribution files and click **Continue**.
- When the installation has successfully completed, the Windows Components Wizard window displays. Click **Finish** to close the Windows Components Wizard window.
- 8. Close the Add or Remove Programs window. You are now ready to perform the tasks in "Creating a scope and setting up a DHCP server".

After you install the DHCP Manager, you can refer to the DHCP Manager online help for additional information.

Creating a scope and setting up a DHCP server

Use the following procedure to create a scope and to set up a DHCP server. A scope defines a group of controllers by their IP addresses. You must create and configure a scope so that dynamic IP addresses can be assigned to controllers on your network. See the "Storage subsystem and controller information record", on page 109. Before you begin, read through the instructions to determine what information is required. Then request the information from your network administrator.

- 1. Click Start → Administrative Tools → DHCP. The DHCP window opens.
- 2. In the Console tree, right-click the server you want to configure, then click **New Scope**. The New Scope Wizard starts.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions to define the scope of IP addresses for TCP/IP clients. You will define the following fields:
 - · Scope name and description
 - IP address range for the subnet mask, and the controllers that you are configuring.
 - IP addresses that you want to exclude from the IP address range
 - · IP address lease duration
 - Common DHCP options:

- IP address for a router
- Domain name and DNS servers or Windows Internet Naming Service (WINS) servers
- 4. When you have defined the scope, click Yes, I want to activate this scope now. The New Scope Wizard window displays.
- 5. Click Finish. The New Scope Wizard window closes and the DHCP window opens.
- 6. In the Console tree, expand the Scope folder.
- Right-click Reservations. Then select New Reservations. The New Reservations window opens.
- 8. To define the IP address reservation, type the following information:
 - Reservation name
 - IP address
 - Ethernet hardware MAC address
 - Description
- 9. In the Supported Type field, select Both (DHCP and BOOTP).
- 10. Click Add.
- 11. Repeat steps 7 through 10 for each controller in the network.
- 12. Restart the DHCP server and then restart the storage subsystem so that all the modifications are applied.
- 13. Go to "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table" on page 42.

Setting up a Novell NetWare DHCP server

A Novell NetWare DHCP server automatically assigns IP addresses and other configuration information to clients upon request or when the clients are restarted.

To set up a Novell NetWare DHCP server, you must complete the following tasks:

- 1. Install DNS/DHCP Services, either during or after installing NetWare 6.
- 2. Install the DNS/DHCP Management Console.
- 3. Create the DHCP server object.
- Create the subnet address.
- 5. Create the subnet address range.
- 6. Create the IP address object.
- Start the DHCP server.

Each of these tasks is described in detail in the sections that follow.

Adding Novell DNS/DHCP Services during the NetWare 6.0 installation:

Perform the following steps to add Novell DNS/DHCP Services during the Netware

- 1. From the Installation Options window, select **Custom**.
- 2. From the Components window, select the Novell DNS/DHCP Services check
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete the NetWare installation.

Adding Novell DNS/DHCP Services after the NetWare 6.0 installation:

Perform the following steps to add Novell DNS/DHCP Services after the Netware installation:

- Insert the NetWare 6.0 Installation CD into the CD-ROM drive. Then mount the CD as a volume.
- Load NWCONFIG and select Product Options.
- 3. Select Install a Product not Listed.
- 4. Press F3 and specify the volume name of the CD. The X Server-Graphical Console window opens.
- In the Additional Products and Services dialog box, select the Novell DNS/DHCP Services check box.
- 6. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete installation.

Note: Installing the DNS/DHCP Service will extend the Novell Directory Services (NDS) schema and create the following NDS objects:

- DNSDHCP-GROUP Group object
- DNS/DHCP Locator object
- · RootServerInfo Zone object

Installing the DNS/DHCP Management Console

Perform the following steps to install the DNS/DHCP Management Console and NetWare Administrator snap-in files on the client workstation you will use to administer DNS and DHCP:

- If you have not done so, install the latest version of Novell Client 32 on your workstation.
- 2. From the workstation, run the SYS:PUBLIC\DNSDHCP\SETUP.EXE program.
- 3. Install the DNS/DHCP Management Console on the local hard-disk drive.
- 4. Install the NetWare Administrator snap-in files in the SYS:PUBLIC\WIN32 directory.
- 5. Restart the workstation.
- 6. To start the DNS/DHCP Management Console, double-click the shortcut icon on the desktop, enter the NDS Tree NAME, and click **Launch**.

Note: You can install the DNS/DHCP Management Console on a workstation, or you can access it from the Tools menu of the NetWare Administrator utility.

Creating the DHCP server object

Use the DHCP Management Console to create a DHCP server object. You can create a DHCP server object under any of the following objects:

- Organization (O)
- Organization Unit (OU)
- Country (C)
- · Locality (L)

Perform the following steps to create a DHCP server object:

- 1. From the DHCP Management Console, click the **DHCP Service** tab.
- 2. In the left pane, select Our Network.
- 3. Click Create. The Create New DHCP Object window opens.
- 4. Select **DHCP Server**. Click **OK**. The Create DHCP Server window opens.

- 5. Select a server. Click Create. This creates the DHCP server object, called DHCP servername, in NDS.
- 6. In the DHCP Management Console, locate the icon for the DHCP server object at the bottom of the DHCP Service tab. The server object is displayed with a red line through it. The red line indicates that the DHCP server has not been started.
- 7. Continue with "Creating the DHCP subnet object".

Creating the DHCP subnet object

Perform the following steps to create a DHCP subnet object for each of the subnets for which you want to assign addresses:

- 1. In the DNS/DHCP Management Console, click the **DHCP Service** tab.
- 2. Select Our Network or the DHCP Server Object.
- 3. Click Create. The Create New DHCP Object window opens.
- 4. Select **Subnet**. Then click **OK**. The Create Subnet window opens.
- 5. For each subnet, type the following information:
 - Subnet name
 - · NDS context
 - Subnet address
 - Subnet mask
 - · Default DHCP Server
- 6. Click Create. The DHCP subnet object is created and displayed in the DNS/DHCP Management Console.

Creating the subnet address range

Perform the following steps to create a subnet address range object:

- 1. From the DNS/DHCP Management Console, click the **DHCP Service** tab.
- 2. Select the subnet object under which you want to create the subnet address range object. Then click Create. The Create New DHCP Record window opens.
- 3. Select **Subnet Address Range**. Then click **OK**. The Create New Subnet Address Range window opens.
- 4. Type the following information for the subnet address range:
 - · Subnet address range name
 - Starting address
 - Ending address
- 5. Click Create.
- 6. Select the **Define Additional Properties** check box. Then set the Range Type to Dynamic BOOTP and DHCP.

Creating the IP address object

Use the DNS/DHCP Management Console to create IP address objects. You use IP address objects for the following purposes:

- · To exclude an IP address from assignment
- To assign an IP address manually to a specific host
- · To record dynamic IP address leases

Perform the following steps to create an IP address object:

- 1. From the DNS/DHCP Management Console, click the **DHCP Service** tab.
- 2. Select the subnet object of the target IP address. Then click **Create**.
- 3. Select IP Address. Click OK. The Create IP Address window opens.

- 4. In the IP Address field, type the IP address for the first controller.
- 5. In the **Assignment** field, select **Manual**.
- 6. In the Client Identifier field, specify the MAC address.
- 7. In the MAC Address field, enter the hardware Ethernet MAC address for the controller.
- 8. Select the **Define Additional Properties** check box.
- 9. In the **Hostname field**, type the eight-character name for the controller.
- 10. In the Usage field, select **Permanent**.
- 11. Repeat step 3 on page 40 through step 10 for each controller.

Starting the DHCP server

To start the DHCP server, at the DHCP server console, type:

LOAD DHCPSRVR

The DHCP server can now respond to client requests and assign IP addresses.

Notes:

- 1. To load the DHCP server automatically each time the server starts, place the DHCPSRVR command in the SYS:\SYSTEM\AUTOEXEC.NCF directory.
- 2. For additional information about setting up, configuring, or using Novell DNS/DHCP Services, refer to the Novell Documentation CD or go to the following Web site:

Setting up a UNIX BOOTP server

To use a UNIX BOOTP server, you must set up a BOOTP table. Table 18 and the information record (Table 22 on page 109) provide the necessary information.

To set up a UNIX BOOTP server, perform the following steps:

1. Use a text editor to edit the **bootptab** file in the /etc directory. Use the following example of the BOOTP table to configure the Network A server shown in Figure 4 on page 10:

- 3. Continue with "Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table".

Verifying the TCP/IP protocol and setting up the host or DNS table

In order for SMclient to function, the TCP/IP networking stack must be installed. Use the following procedure to perform two tasks:

- Verify that the TCP/IP protocol software is installed on the management station or the host server that SMclient will be installed and run from
- Set up the host or DNS table

Note: Make sure that the host names for the controllers match the IP addresses for the controllers.

For Windows NT 4.0, perform the following steps:

- 1. Right-click Network Neighborhood.
- Select Properties. The Network window opens.
- 3. Click the **Protocols** tab. If the TCP/IP protocol entry does not appear in the Network Products box, click Add. The Select Network Protocol window opens.
- 4. In the Network Protocol field, select TCP/IP Protocol.
- 5. Click **OK**. Then follow the on-screen instructions to install the TCP/IP protocol.
- 6. Update the DNS table to specify a host name to associate with an IP address. If you do not have a DNS server, use a text editor to update the hosts file to link the IP address and controller name entries. The following example shows the host tables for the controllers that are connected to Network A as shown in Figure 4 on page 10:

Chapter 3. Installing software in a standard configuration

This chapter describes how to install the storage management software in a standard (noncluster) configuration. Before you install the software, make sure that you have read the following information:

- If you intend to configure your system for clustering, see Chapter 4, "Installing the software in a cluster server environment", on page 59.
- If you have existing storage systems, see "Installation types" on page 13 and "Managing coexisting storage subsystems" on page 16.
- To ensure proper installation, make sure you have completed all preparation tasks described in Chapter 2, "Preparing for installation", on page 25.

Important: Always check for a readme file on any installation media. The readme file contains important information that was not available when the guide was prepared.

Note: Windows Server 2003 is not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server.

New installation process

You can install the Storage Manager 8.3 software components on host computers only or on both host computers and management stations.

Management station: A management station is a system that you use to manage the storage subsystem. You can attach it to the storage subsystem in the following ways:

- Through a TCP/IP Ethernet connection to the controllers in the storage subsystem
- Through a TCP/IP network connection to a host computer with host-agent software installed on it, which in turn is directly attached to the storage subsystem through the Fibre Channel input/output (I/O) path

You *must* install storage management software on a management station in the following order:

- 1. Microsoft Virtual Machine (Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only)
- 2. SMclient

Host computer: A host computer (or host) is a system that is directly attached to the storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel I/O path.

Important: Be sure you install the host-bus adapter and driver before you install the storage management software.

You <u>must</u> install storage management software on each host computer in the following order:

- 1. Microsoft Virtual Machine (Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only)
- 2. SMclient
- 3. RDAC
- 4. SMagent
- 5. SMutil

If you are installing the Storage Manager software on a Windows NT 4.0 or Windows Server 2003 platform, see "Microsoft Virtual Machine" to begin the installation.

If you are installing the Storage Manager software on a Windows 2000 platform, see "Storage Manager 8.3 Client" to begin the installation.

Microsoft Virtual Machine

For systems running Windows NT 4.0 or Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions, the Microsoft Virtual Machine is required to support the following Storage Manager 8.3 components or options:

- SMagent
- · Event Monitor option of the SMclient

To install Microsoft Virtual Machine on management stations and host computers, perform the following steps:

- 1. Close all programs.
- 2. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM drive.
- 3. Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 4. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.
- 5. Select the CD-ROM drive.
- 6. Select the folder that pertains to your operating system:

Operating System	Folder
Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000 operating systems	\Win32\MSVM\NT
Windows Server 2003 operating systems	\WS03_32bit\MSVM

Then click Open.

- 7. Select the MSJavx86-3805.exe file. Click **Open** and follow the instructions on the screen. The Setup Complete window opens.
- 8. Click No, do not restart the system at this time. Click Finish.
- 9. Continue with "Storage Manager 8.3 Client".

Storage Manager 8.3 Client

This section describes how to install SMclient on management stations and host computers that run Windows operating systems.

Note: The SMclient software package is not available for the Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions.

Before you install the software, make sure that:

- The management station or host computer has at least 40 MB of available disk space.
- (Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only) Microsoft Virtual Machine software has been installed on the device.

Important: When you install SMclient on a stand-alone host and manage storage subsystems through the Fibre Channel I/O path rather than through the network, you must install the TCP/IP software on the host and assign an IP address to the host.

Installing SMclient

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To install SMclient on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 3. Click Browse. The Browse window opens.
- 4. Select the CD-ROM drive.
- 5. Select the folder that pertains to your operating system:

Click **Open**.

- 6. Select the displayed .exe file. Click **Open**. The InstallShield Wizard window opens, then the Welcome window opens.
- 7. Click **Next**. The End User License Agreement window opens.

Note: For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003, ensure that you install the Microsoft Virtual Machine before you install the Event Monitor.

8. Perform the following procedures depending on your operating system:

For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000:

- Read the license agreement and click Yes. The Event monitor window opens.
- b. At the prompt, click **Yes** if you want to install the Event Monitor. The Choose Destination Location window opens.
- c. Click **Browse** to change the destination location.
- d. Click **Next** to start the installation. When the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- e. Click Finish.
- f. Continue with "Verifying the SMclient installation" on page 65.

For Windows Server 2003:

- a. Read the license agreement and click **Yes**. The Choose Destination Location window opens.
- Click Browse to change the destination location. Click Next to continue with the installation.
- c. The Event monitor window opens. Click **Yes** if you want to install the Event Monitor. Otherwise, click **No**.
- d. The Setup Status window opens showing the installation progress. When the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- e. Click Finish.
- f. Continue with "Verifying the SMclient installation" on page 50.

Verifying the SMclient installation

To verify that SMclient is installed correctly on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Perform one of the following steps depending on your operating system:
 - For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000, click Start → Programs.
 - For Windows Server 2003, click Start → All Programs.
- 2. Verify that the software version that pertains to your operating system displays in the Program list.
 - For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000, IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client v08.33.G5.xx should display.
 - For Windows Server 2003, IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client v08.30.G5.xx should display.

If the appropriate software version displays, go to step 3.

Otherwise, repeat "Installing SMclient" on page 49. If the appropriate software version that pertains to your operating system still does not display, a failure has occurred. Contact your IBM technical support representative.

- 3. If you installed the optional Event Monitor service, go to "Verifying the Event Monitor installation". Otherwise, continue to step 4.
- 4. If you are installing SMclient on a host computer, go to "RDAC" on page 51. Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Windows Server 2003

To verify that you installed the Event Monitor service correctly, perform the following steps:

- Verify that the IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Event Monitor service displays with the startup type Automatic and status Started. If it does not display, click Start. If it displays but does not start, reinstall the SMclient. If the failure persists, call your IBM technical support representative.
- 3. If you are installing the storage management software on a host computer, go to "RDAC". Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

RDAC

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This section describes how to install RDAC on Windows operating systems. RDAC must be installed on each host computer. RDAC contains the multipath device driver that is necessary for controller failover support.

Before you install the software, ensure that the following conditions are met:

- · You have Administrator privileges on the host computer.
- The host computer has at least 1 MB of available disk space.
- All programs are closed.
- · You have installed the host bus adapter and driver.

If you are installing RDAC on Windows NT 4.0, continue with "Assigning static drive letters".

If you are installing RDAC on Windows 2000 or Windows Server 2003, continue with "Installing the RDAC" on page 52.

Assigning static drive letters

Important: Before you install RDAC, you *must* assign static drive letters to existing local drives. Otherwise, problems might occur during new installations and upgrades. When RDAC is installed, the RDAC utility installs the RDAC device driver before the Windows NT 4.0 class driver. If static drive letters have not previously been assigned to local drives, the system will detect storage subsystem arrays and assign them drive letters before detecting and assigning drive letters to local drives. If you have software applications using non-permanent drive letters that are assigned to local drives, and this occurs, application errors will result.

Use the following procedure to manually assign static drive letters on host computers running Windows NT 4.0:

- Determine how many partitions are on the system. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Disk Administrator to view the disk configuration and check the number of partitions.
- 2. Check that the following conditions are met:
 - A boot partition exists.
 - The last partition has been created with Disk Administrator or Disk Management.
 - The partition has an assigned drive letter with either an unknown status or a status other than Unformatted.

If all conditions are met, go to "Installing the RDAC". Otherwise, continue to step

- 3. Create a new partition on your local system or on a storage subsystem by using the following procedure:
 - a. Select a drive with free space. Click Partition Create. The partition is created with a status of Unformatted and a drive letter is assigned. You can delete or change the logical drive at a later time without causing reassignment of the boot partition.
 - b. Click Partition -> Commit Changes Now. The partition status changes to Unknown, and static drive letters are assigned to all existing partitions.
- 4. Continue with "Installing the RDAC".

Installing the RDAC

To install RDAC on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM
- 2. Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 3. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.

- 5. Select the directory that pertains to your operating system.

 - If you do not plan to use the host-agent software to manage one or more storage subsystems, perform the following steps to disable the host-agent service:
 - a. Click Start > Administrative Tools > Computer Management. The Computer Management window opens.
 - b. Click Services.
 - c. From the list of displayed services, right-click IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent.
 - d. Click **Properties** from the pull-down menu. The IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent Properties window opens.
 - e. In the Startup Type list, select Manual. Click OK.
 - f. The IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent Properties window closes.
- 5. Continue with "Storage Manager 8.3 Utility".

Storage Manager 8.3 Utility

This section describes how to install SMutil on host computers that run both Windows operating systems. This component contains utilities that will register and map new logical drives to the operating systems.

Installing SMutil

To install SMutil on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Close all programs and insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 installation CD in the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 3. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.
- Select the CD-ROM drive.

5. Select the folder that pertains to your operating system.

Windows 2000 Advanced Server	\Win32\SMutil

Then click Open.

- Select the displayed .exe file. Click **Open**. The InstallShield Wizard window opens, displaying the status of the files unpacking. The Welcome window opens.
- 7. Click **Next**. The End User License Agreement window opens.
- 8. Click **Yes** to begin the installation. After the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- 9. Click Finish.
- 10. Continue with "Verifying the SMutil installation".

Verifying the SMutil installation

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To verify that you have installed the SMutil correctly on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

1. Go to the following directory:

installation_directory\IBM_FAStT\Util

where installation_directory is the directory where you installed the SMutil.

- 2. Verify that the directory contains the following files:
 - hot_add.exe
 - · SMdevices.bat
 - SMflashcopyassist.exe

If it does not, reinstall the SMutil by using the procedure outlined in "Installing SMutil" on page 56. If the problem persists, contact your IBM technical support representative.

3. Go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Chapter 4. Installing the software in a cluster server environment

This chapter describes how to install the storage management software in a cluster server environment. Before you install the software, make sure that you have read the following information:

- If you have existing storage systems, read "Installation types" on page 13 and "Managing coexisting storage subsystems" on page 16.
- If you are upgrading from a previous version of Storage Manager on an existing cluster, go to "Upgrading from a previous version of the storage management software" on page 74.
- To ensure proper installation, complete all preparation tasks described in Chapter 2, "Preparing for installation", on page 25.

Important: Always check for a readme file on any installation media. A readme file contains important information that was not available when this guide was prepared.

Note: Windows Server 2003 is not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server.

Preinstallation considerations

The hardware installation involves installing host adapters and storage subsystems. Before you begin the installation of the software, make sure that all hardware components are installed correctly for the cluster server configuration.

Configuration options




Figure 17. Installing the storage subsystem on a Fibre Channel network

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You can connect the storage subsystem to the cluster nodes either directly or through Fibre Channel switches. Figure 17 on page 60 illustrates typical direct-attached or Fibre Channel switch connection configurations. Both configurations offer full redundancy.

Host adapters

Refer to the appropriate host-adapter documentation for specific installation requirements and procedures. The following considerations apply:

- To use the dual-path configuration, perform the following tasks:
 - Install two host adapters in each node.
 - Run two Fibre Channel cables from each node to the storage subsystem.

- If you connect the storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL), ensure that every adapter on the loop has been assigned a unique hard ID. For instructions about changing hard IDs, refer to the documentation provided with your host adapters.
- · The correct device driver is installed for the host adapter. Refer to the readme file in the \Host_Adapter directory on the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD for information on supported host adapters and device drivers.

Storage subsystems

Refer to the appropriate hardware documentation for specific installation requirements and procedures. If you are managing storage subsystems directly, you must connect Ethernet cables to both controllers in each storage subsystem.

Installing the storage management software in a cluster environment

The following procedures describe how to install the storage management software in a cluster environment.

Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000

Perform the following steps to install the storage management and cluster service software on Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000 operating systems:

- 1. Be sure that the host bus adapter and driver are installed in each cluster node.
- 2. Power down node B. Start node A.
- 3. Install the storage management software on node A. Refer to "Installing the storage management software" on page 63 for instructions.
- 4. Complete the procedures detailed in Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.
- 5. Run the Hot Add utility on node A. Refer to "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101 for instructions.

Note: You might have to restart node A in order to see the newly-added logical drives.

6. Format all shared logical drives as NT File System (NTFS), assign volume labels, and specify a drive letter for each.

Important: You must assign a permanent (sticky) drive letter to the shared logical drive on both cluster nodes. The two nodes must have the same drive letters on each shared drive. If you do not assign permanent drive letters, Windows might assign different drive letters on each node. Assigning a permanent drive letter ensures that Windows assigns the same drive letter to the partition on both cluster nodes.

- 7. Shut down node A. Start node B.
- 8. Install the storage management software on node B. Refer to "Installing the storage management software" on page 63 for instructions.
- 9. To verify the drive letters for the cluster configuration, perform one of the following procedures:
 - For Windows NT 4.0, click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Disk Administrator.
 - For Windows 2000, perform the following steps:
 - a. Click Start -> Programs -> Administrative Tools -> Computer Management. The Computer Management window opens.
 - b. Click Storage > Disk Management.

- 10. Verify that the following conditions are met:
 - The same logical drives appear on each cluster node.
 - · Each cluster node has the same number of partitions defined on the logical drives.
 - Drive letters are assigned to the configured logical drives.
 - · The drive letters on the partitions are the same on both cluster nodes.
- 11. Shut down node B.
- 12. Install the cluster server software. Refer to "Installing the cluster server software" on page 73 for instructions.
- 13. Go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Windows Server 2003

Perform the following steps to install the storage management and cluster service software on Windows Server 2003 operating systems:

- 1. Make sure that the host bus adapter and driver are installed in each cluster node.
- 2. Install the storage management software on the host server that will be the first node of the cluster. See "Installing the storage management software" on page 63 for instructions.
- 3. Complete the procedures detailed in Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85, specifically to create LUNs that will be used as cluster disks and to make sure that the host type of the host group or host ports that these LUNs are mapped to were set to "Windows 2000...clustered."
- 4. Run the Hot Add utility on the first node of the cluster. See "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101 for instructions.

Note: You might have to restart the first node of the cluster in order to see the newly-added logical drives (LUNs).

5. Format all shared logical drives as NT File System (NTFS), assign volume labels, and specify a drive letter for each.

Important: You must make sure that the permanent (sticky) drive letters that are assigned to LUNs in the first cluster node are available (not used) in the rest of the cluster nodes. In another words, all of the nodes in the cluster must have the same drive letters on each shared drive. If you do not assign permanent drive letters, Windows might assign different drive letters on each node, which will prevent the cluster disks from operating correctly. Assigning a permanent drive letter ensures that Windows assigns the same drive letter to the partition on all cluster nodes.

6. Install the storage management software on the second node of the cluster.

Note: You must install the RDAC and SMutil software packages. You do not have to install all of the storage management software packages unless you want to manage the storage subsystem from this cluster node.

- 7. Run the Hot Add utility on the second node of the cluster.
- 8. Repeat steps 6 and 7 for each additional node of the cluster.
- 9. Install the cluster server software. See "Installing the cluster server software" on page 73 for instructions.
- 10. Manually move the cluster disk groups from the first cluster node to each of the nodes in the cluster, making sure that they can be brought online. If they

can be brought online with no problems, you are ready to continue with your application software installation. If you experience any problems, call IBM support for assistance.

Installing the storage management software

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This section describes how to install the storage management software on Windows operating systems. Before you begin an installation with existing storage subsystems, refer to your hardware installation documentation for the specific configuration. A specific configuration might be required for your hardware to support the storage management software in a cluster configuration.

You can install the Storage Manager 8.3 software components on cluster nodes only or cluster nodes and management stations.

Management station: A management station is a system that is used to manage the storage subsystem. It can be attached to the storage subsystem in the following

- Through a TCP/IP Ethernet connection to the controllers in the storage subsystem
- Through a TCP/IP network connection to a cluster node with the host-agent software installed

You must install storage management software on a management station in the following order:

- 1. Microsoft Virtual Machine (Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only)
- SMclient

Cluster node: The cluster nodes are directly attached to the storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel I/O path.

You must install storage management software on each cluster node in the following order:

- 1. Microsoft Virtual Machine (Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 only)
- 2. SMclient
- RDAC
- 4. SMagent
- 5. SMutil

If you are installing the Storage Manager software on a Windows NT 4.0 platform, see "Installing the Microsoft Virtual Machine" to begin the installation.

If you are installing the Storage Manager software on a Windows 2000 platform, see "Installing the SMclient" on page 64 to begin the installation.

Installing the Microsoft Virtual Machine

For systems running Windows NT 4.0 or Windows Server 2003 32-bit editions, the Microsoft Virtual Machine is required to support the following Storage Manager 8.3 components or options:

- SMagent
- Event Monitor option of the SMclient

To install Microsoft Virtual Machine on management stations or cluster nodes, perform the following steps:

- 1. Close all programs.
- 2. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM
- 3. Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 4. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.
- Select the CD-ROM drive.
- 6. Select the folder that pertains to your operating system.

Operating System	Folder
Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000	\Win32\MSVM\NT
Windows Server 2003	\WS03_32bit\MSVM

Click Open.

- 7. Select the MSJavx86-3805.exe file; then, click **Open**.
- 8. Click **Finish** and follow the instructions on the screen. When the software is installed, the Setup Complete window opens.
- 9. Click No, do not restart the system at this time.
- 10. Continue with "Installing the SMclient".

Installing the SMclient

This section provides instructions for installing SMclient on management stations and cluster nodes that run on Windows operating systems.

Note: The SMclient software package is not available for the Windows Server 2003 64-bit editions.

Before you install the software, make sure that the following conditions have been met:

- The management station or host computer has at least 40 MB of available disk space.
- · All programs are closed.
- For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 32-bit edition operating systems, ensure that the Microsoft Virtual Machine software has been installed on the device. See "Installing the Microsoft Virtual Machine" on page 63.

Important: When you install SMclient on a stand-alone host and manage storage subsystems through the Fibre Channel I/O path rather than through the network, you must install the TCP/IP software on the host and assign an IP address to the host.

Installing SMclient

To install SMclient on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Click Start Run. The Run window opens.
- 3. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.
- 4. Select the CD-ROM drive.

5. Select the folder that pertains to your operating system:

Operating System	Folder
Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000	\Win32\SMclient
Windows Server 2003	\WS03_32bit\SMClient

Click Open.

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- 6. Select the displayed .exe file. Click Open. The InstallShield Wizard window opens then the Welcome window opens.
- 7. Click **Next**. The End User License Agreement window opens.

Note: For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows Server 2003 32-bit edition, ensure that the Microsoft Virtual Machine is installed before you install the Event Monitor.

8. Perform the procedure that pertains to your operating system:

For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000:

- a. Read the license agreement and click **Yes**. The Event monitor window opens.
- b. At the prompt, click Yes if you want to install the Event Monitor. The Choose Destination Location window opens.
- c. Click **Browse** to change the destination location.
- d. Click **Next** to start the installation. When the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- e. Click Finish.
- f. Continue with "Verifying the SMclient installation".

For Windows Server 2003:

- a. Read the license agreement and click Yes. The Choose Destination Location window opens.
- b. Click Browse to change the destination location. Click Next to continue with the installation.
- c. The Event monitor window opens. Click Yes if you want to install the Event Monitor. Otherwise, click No.
- d. The Setup Status window opens showing the installation progress. When the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- e. Click Finish.
- f. Continue with "Verifying the SMclient installation".

Verifying the SMclient installation

Perform the following steps to verify that the SMclient software is installed correctly on Windows operating systems:

- 1. Perform one of the following steps depending on your operating system:
 - For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 200, click Start → Programs.
 - For Windows Server 2003, click Start → All Programs.
- 2. Verify that the software version that pertains to your operating system appears in the Program list.
 - For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000, IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client v08.33.G5.xx should display.
 - For Windows Server 2003, IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client v08.30.G5.xx should display.

If the appropriate software version displays, go to step 3.

Otherwise, repeat "Installing SMclient" on page 64. If the appropriate software version that pertains to your operating system still does not display, a failure occurred. Contact your IBM technical support representative.

- 3. If you installed the optional Event Monitor service, go to "Verifying the Event Monitor installation". Otherwise, continue with step 4.
- 4. If you are installing SMclient on a host computer, go to "RDAC". Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Verifying the Event Monitor installation

This section describes how to verify that you installed the Event Monitor correctly on Windows operating systems.

Windows NT 4.0: To verify that you installed the Event Monitor service correctly on Windows NT 4.0, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start -> Settings -> Control Panel. The Control Panel window opens.
- 2. Double-click **Services**. The Services window opens.
- Verify that IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Event Monitor service is displayed with the status Started. If it is not, click **Start**. If the service does not start, reinstall the SMclient. If the failure persists, call your IBM technical support representative.
- 4. If you are installing the storage management software on a cluster node, go to "RDAC". Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Windows 2000: To verify that you installed the Event Monitor service correctly on Windows 2000, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Services. The Services window opens.
- 2. Verify that the IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Event Monitor service is displayed with the startup type Automatic and status Started. If it is not, click **Start**. If the service does not start, reinstall the SMclient. If the failure persists, call your IBM technical support representative.
- 3. If you are installing the storage management software on a host computer, go to "RDAC". Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

Windows Server 2003: To verify that you installed the Event Monitor service correctly on Windows Server 2003, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Administrative Tools → Services. The Services window opens.
- 2. Verify that the IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Event Monitor service is displayed with the startup type Automatic and status Started. If it is not, click **Start**. If it does not start, reinstall the SMclient. If the failure persists, call your IBM technical support representative.
- 3. If you are installing the storage management software on a host computer, see "RDAC". Otherwise, go to Chapter 5, "Completing the installation", on page 85.

RDAC

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This section describes how to install RDAC on Windows operating systems. RDAC must be installed on each cluster node. RDAC contains the multipath device driver that is necessary for controller failover support.

Before you install the software, ensure that the following conditions are met:

· You have Administrator privileges on the cluster nodes.

- Each cluster node has at least 1 MB of available disk space.
- You close all programs.

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· The appropriate host bus adapter driver is installed.

If you are installing RDAC on Windows NT 4.0, continue with "Assigning static drive letters".

If you are installing RDAC on Windows 2000 or Windows Server 2003, continue with "Installing the RDAC".

Assigning static drive letters

Important:Before you install RDAC, you must assign static drive letters to existing local drives. Otherwise, problems might occur during new installations and upgrades. When RDAC is installed, the RDAC utility installs the RDAC device driver before the Windows NT 4.0 class driver. If static drive letters have not previously been assigned to local drives, the system will detect storage subsystem arrays and assign them drive letters before detecting and assigning drive letters to local drives. If this occurs and you have software applications that use non-permanent drive letters that are assigned to local drives, application errors will result.

Use the following procedure to manually assign drive letters on cluster nodes running Windows NT 4.0:

- 1. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Disk Administrator to view the disk configuration and check the number of partitions.
- 2. Check that the following conditions are met:
 - A boot partition exists.
 - · The last partition has been created with Disk Administrator or Disk Management.
 - The partition has an assigned drive letter and either an unknown status or a status other than Unformatted.

If all conditions are met, go to "Installing the RDAC". Otherwise, continue to step

- 3. Create a new partition on your local system or on a storage subsystem using the following procedure:
 - a. Select a drive with free space; then, click **Partition > Create**. The partition is created with a status of Unformatted and a drive letter is assigned. You can delete or change the logical drive at a later time without causing reassignment of the boot partition.
 - b. Click Partition Commit Changes Now. The partition status changes to Unknown, and static drive letters are assigned to all existing partitions.
- 4. Continue with "Installing the RDAC".

Installing the RDAC

To install RDAC on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM drive.
- Click Start → Run. The Run window opens.
- 3. Click **Browse**. The Browse window opens.
- 4. Select the CD-ROM drive.

5. Select the directory that pertains to your operating system.

- 7. Click Yes to start the installation. Perform the following steps depending on your operating system:
 - For Windows NT 4.0 and Windows 2000, after you install RDAC, the InstallShield Wizard Complete window opens.
 - For Windows Server 2003, the Installation/Removal Status window opens displaying the RDAC installation progress. After the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- 8. Select Yes I want to restart my computer now. Click Finish.
- 9. Continue with "Verifying the RDAC".

Verifying the RDAC

The following sections describes how to verify that you installed RDAC correctly on Windows operating systems.

Windows NT 4.0: To verify that you installed RDAC correctly on Windows NT 4.0, perform the following steps.

Note: Make sure that all storage subsystems are connected to the host computer and are powered on.

- 3. Perform one of the following procedures:
 - If you are managing the storage subsystems using the host-agent method, continue with "SMagent" on page 69.
 - If you are managing your storage subsystems directly, go to "SMutil software" on page 72.

Windows 2000: To verify that you installed RDAC correctly on Windows 2000, perform the following steps.

Note: Make sure that all storage subsystems are connected to the host computer and are powered on.

1. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Computer Management. The Computer Management window opens. Go to the \System Tools\System Information\Software environment\Drivers directory.

- 1. Click Start → All Programs→ Accessories→ System Tools→System information. The System Information window opens. Go to the \System Summary\Software Environment\System Drivers list.
- 2. Scroll through the list and select one of the following device drivers.

If the problem persists, contact your IBM technical support representative.

 - If you plan to use the host-agent software to manage one or more storage subsystems, go to "SMutil software" on page 72.
 - If you do not plan to use the host-agent software to manage one or more storage subsystems, perform the following procedure to disable the host-agent service:
 - a. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Computer Management. The Computer Management window opens.
 - b. Click Services.
 - c. From the list of displayed services, right-click Storage Manager 8 Agent.
 - d. Click Properties -> Startup Type -> Manual.
 - e. Click OK.
- 5. Continue with "SMutil software" on page 72.

Windows Server 2003: To verify that you have installed the SMagent correctly, perform the following steps:

SMutil software

This section provides instructions for installing the SMutil software on cluster nodes that run Windows operating systems. This component contains utilities that will register and map new logical drives to the operating systems.

Installing SMutil

- Select the setup.exe file, then click **Open**. The InstallShield Wizard window opens, displaying the status of the files unpacking. The Welcome window opens.
- 7. Click **Next**. The End User License Agreement window opens.
- 8. Click **Yes** to begin the installation. After the installation is complete, the Operation Complete window opens.
- 9. Click Finish.
- 10. Continue with "Verifying the SMutil installation".

Verifying the SMutil installation

To verify that you installed the SMutil correctly on Windows operating systems, perform the following steps:

1. Go to the following directory:

where installation_directory is the directory where you installed the SMutil.

 - a. Refer to the appropriate MSCS documentation for the correct procedure to install the Cluster Server software.

Note: During installation, specify that you want to join the existing cluster.

- b. After the system restarts, leave Node B running.
- 3. After installing MSCS, perform one of the following tasks:
 - For systems running Windows NT 4.0, reinstall Service Pack 6a.
 - For systems running Windows 2000, reinstall Service Pack 3.

Note: Refer to Microsoft knowledge base article Q174799 for more information about installing a service pack in a cluster environment.

- 4. Verify the software installation, as follows:
 - a. On either node A or node B, click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Cluster Administration.
 - b. In the Cluster or Server Name field, type either the name of the cluster or the name or IP address of one of the nodes.
 - If the installation is successful, the computer names of both nodes appear on the left side of the Cluster Administrator window.
 - c. Make sure that the cluster disk groups can be moved between cluster nodes.

5. If both node names do not appear on the left side of the Cluster Administrator window, reinstall the cluster server software. If the problem persists, contact your IBM technical support representative.

Windows Server 2003

Important: Do not perform this procedure unless you have installed the necessary storage management software components on all cluster nodes.

To install the cluster server software on cluster nodes, perform the following steps:

1. Install the cluster server software on the first node of the cluster. Refer to the appropriate Microsoft Cluster Server (MSCS) documentation for the correct procedure to install the cluster server software.

Note: During installation, specify that you want to form a new cluster.

- 2. In the Cluster Administrator window, make sure that all of the cluster disk groups can be varied online and offline with no problems.
- 3. Install the cluster server software on the second node of the cluster. Refer to the appropriate MSCS documentation for the correct procedure to install additional nodes in the cluster server.

Note: During installation, specify that you want to join the existing cluster. You can add one cluster node at a time or all of the remaining cluster nodes at the same time. You should add cluster nodes one at a time.

4. If all node names do not display on the left side of the Cluster Administrator window, reinstall the cluster server software. If the problem persists, contact your IBM technical support representative.

Upgrading from a previous version of the storage management software

Be sure that you are familiar with the steps required in a new installation before you continue with the following upgrade procedure.

Choose one of the following two procedures:

 Performing a scheduled upgrade: A scheduled upgrade requires scheduling downtime on your cluster server to upgrade the controller firmware and storage management software. The services and resources offered by the cluster are not available during the upgrade. If you choose this upgrade method, it is important that you perform the upgrade during off-peak workload time.

Note: The scheduled upgrade is the preferred procedure for upgrading a cluster server configuration.

Performing a rolling upgrade: A rolling upgrade requires upgrading the storage management software first in one of the cluster nodes and then in each of the remaining cluster nodes, one cluster node at at time, so that the services and resources offered by the cluster are always available.

Important: Do not upgrade your storage subsystem firmware until you have upgraded the storage management software on all cluster nodes and management stations. If you upgrade your storage subsystem controller firmware to version 05.3x.xx.xx, you will not be able to communicate with the controller until you have upgraded to Storage Manager 8.3 software on your management station and cluster nodes. Previously installed versions of Storage Manager will not recognize controllers running version 05.3x.xx.xx firmware.

Performing a scheduled upgrade

- 6. Install the RDAC on node A. Refer to "RDAC" on page 66 for instructions.
- 7. Install the SMagent on node A. Refer to "SMagent" on page 69 for instructions.
- 8. Install the SMutil on node A. Refer to "SMutil software" on page 72 for instructions.
- 9. Shut down node A.
- 10. Restart node B.
- 11. From node B, uninstall the components from the previous version of the storage management software. To uninstall the storage management software for Storage Manager Version 7.x, 8.0 or 8.2x, refer to "Uninstalling storage management software components" on page 103.
- 12. Verify that the IBM host adapter device driver versions are current. If they are not current, refer to the readme file located in the \Host Adapter directory on the installation CD and upgrade the device driver versions before continuing.

To upgrade from Windows NT 4.0 or Windows 2000 to Windows Server 2003 in a standard (non-cluster) configuration, perform the following steps:

- 1. Verify that the storage subsystem contains no system-dependent files or directories, such as paging files.
- 2. Uninstall the Storage Manager software. See "Uninstalling storage management software components" on page 103.
- 3. Use the instructions from Microsoft to upgrade to Windows Server 2003.
- 4. Reinstall Storage Manager. Either see the instructions in "Installing the storage management software" on page 63 or the procedure that came with the version of the storage management software that you are currently running.

- 16. From node B, uninstall all software components. To uninstall the software, see "Uninstalling storage management software components" on page 103. Uninstall the components in the following order:
 - a. SMagent
 - b. SMutil
 - c. RDAC
 - d. SMclient
- 17. Follow the instructions from Microsoft to upgrade node B from Windows 2000 Advanced Server to Windows Server 2003 Enterprise Edition.

- Note: During the upgrade, the existing cluster server installation is detected and clustering for Windows 2000 Advanced Server is installed. When the upgrade is complete, node B rejoins the cluster and remain paused.
- 18. Verify that the HBA device driver versions are correct. If they are not the certified versions, refer to the readme file in the \Host_Adapter directory on the installation CD and upgrade the device driver versions before you continue.
- 19. Verify that node B was successfully upgraded to Windows Server 2003 Enterprise Edition.
- 20. Install the Storage Management software in node B. See "Installing the storage management software" on page 63 for instructions.
- 21. In the Cluster Administrator window, select node B and click File>Resume Node to resume cluster service in node B.
- 22. In the Cluster Administrator window, move the cluster groups that were active in node B back to node B. Make sure that they come online with no problems.
- 23. If there are more than two nodes in a cluster, repeat step 12 on page 82 through step 22 for each of the remaining nodes in a cluster, one cluster node at a time.

Chapter 5. Completing the installation

This chapter contains procedures on how to use Enterprise Management and Subsystem Management to complete the following installation tasks:

- 1. Install SANavigator, if you want.
- 2. Perform an initial automatic discovery of storage subsystems.
- 3. Add devices, if necessary.
- 4. Set up alert notifications, if you want.
- 5. Name the storage subsystems.
- 6. Download firmware and NVSRAM.
- 7. Create arrays and logical drives.
- 8. Verify and define the default host type.
- 9. Configure the heterogeneous hosts.
- 10. Perform other storage subsystem tasks.

Each of these steps is discussed in detail in the sections that follow.

The Enterprise Management window opens when you start the FAStT Storage Manager. Use the Enterprise Management window to:

- · Add and discover the storage subsystems.
- · View all storage subsystems in your management domain.
- Perform batch storage subsystem management tasks using the Script Editor.

Introduction to SANavigator

This section provides an overview of the functions of SANavigator. SANavigator is an application that enables you to easily monitor and manage your storage area network (SAN). It is a powerful diagnostic tool that detects SAN failures and displays them in a graphical manner. When you use SANavigator with the problem determination maps found in the *FAStT Hardware Maintenance Manual and Problem Determination Guide*, you can detect and diagnose SAN malfunctions easily. Install SANavigator after you have installed the IBM FAStT Storage Manager and the FAStT Management Suite Java (FAStT MSJ).

SANavigator features

SANavigator enables you to easily monitor and manage your SAN through the following features:

Discovery

SANavigator uses TCP/IP (out-of-band) and Fibre Channel (in-band) to establish contact with a large number of SAN devices, gather embedded information, and then depict it graphically. SANavigator discovers the devices that are attached to your SAN. It then presents a visual map of devices and their interconnections to enable you to identify any problem components in the map.

Monitoring

SANavigator generates events and messages about the status of devices and their respective properties. The self-monitoring event logging and messaging feature enables you to stay informed about the current state of the SAN.

Launching device applications and utilities

You can launch applications and utilities such as IBM FAStT Storage Manager and IBM FAStT MSJ from SANavigator by right-clicking the respective devices. A

pop-up menu displays that allows you to select the applications and link to the IBM Fibre Channel Solution Support Web site at: www.pc.ibm.com/support/

Reporting

SANavigator enables you to generate, view, and print reports.

To learn more about the features of SANavigator, see the FAStT Hardware Maintenance Manual and Problem Determination Guide.

System requirements

The following list outlines the minimum requirements for SANavigator:

- Microsoft Windows operating systems (Windows NT 4.0 service pack 6a and Windows 2000 Professional, Enterprise Server, and Advanced Server)
 - 700 MHz Intel Pentium III and up
 - CD-ROM
 - 512 MB RAM
 - Disk space: 150 MB
 - VGA: 256 colors or greater
- Linux operating systems (Red Hat 7.2 and above)
 - 700 MHz Intel Pentium III and up
 - 512 MB RAM
 - Disk space: 150 MB
 - VGA: 256 colors or greater

Installing SANavigator

SANavigator installation is easy and fast. After installing IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3, consider installing the FAStT MSJ and SANavigator diagnostic programs. You can use these programs to verify the status of the fibre-channel connections before you use the storage subsystem.

The SANavigator program, the IBM FAStT MSJ User's Guide, and FAStT MSJ program are located on the IBM FAStT Storage Manager version 8.3 CD. For information about how to install and run SANavigator, see the FAStT Hardware Maintenance Manual and Problem Determination Guide.

Performing an initial automatic discovery of storage subsystems

To perform an initial automatic discovery of storage subsystems, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Programs.
- Click IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client v08.33.G5.xx. The client software starts and displays the Enterprise Management window and the Confirm Initial Automatic Discovery window.





Figure 18. Confirm Initial Automatic Discovery window

Note: The Enterprise Management window can take several minutes to open. No wait cursor (such as an hourglass) is displayed.

3. Click **Yes** to begin an initial automatic discovery of hosts and storage subsystems attached to the local subnetwork.

After the initial automatic discovery is complete, the Enterprise Management window displays all hosts and storage subsystems attached to the local subnetwork.

Note: The Enterprise Management window can take up to a minute to refresh after an initial automatic discovery.



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Figure 19. Enterprise Management window

4. Verify that each host and storage subsystem is displayed in the Enterprise Manager window.

If a host or storage subsystem is not displayed, perform the following tasks:

- · Check the hardware and hardware connections for possible problems (refer to the hardware documentation for specific procedures).
- Refer to the Enterprise Management online help for additional information about discovering storage subsystems.
- · If you are using the direct-management method, verify that all hosts and storage subsystems are connected to the same subnet network. If you are using the host-agent method, ensure that the Fibre Channel connection between the host and storage subsystems is made.
- Make sure that all of the preparation steps for setting up the storage subsystem for a directly-managed system in Chapter 2, "Preparing for installation", on page 25 are completed. If they are, use the Add Device option to add the IP addresses of the Storage subsystem. Add both IP addresses of the controller. Otherwise, you will get a "partially-managed device" error message when you try to manage the storage subsystem.
- If you are using the host-agent management method, perform the following steps:
 - a. Make sure that the SMagent is installed in the host.
 - b. Verify that you have a Fibre Channel connection from the storage subsystems to the host that has the SMagent installed.
 - c. Verify that all of the preparation steps outlined in Chapter 2, "Preparing for installation", on page 25 have been completed. If they have, perform the following steps:
 - Run the Hot Add Utility.

- 2) Restart the SMagent using the information in "Stopping and restarting the host-agent software" on page 102.
- 3) Click **Tools** → **Rescan** in the Enterprise management window.

Note: In certain situations, a storage subsystem might be duplicated in the device tree after an automatic discovery. You can remove a duplicate storage management icon from the device tree by using the Remove Device option in the Enterprise Management window.

- 5. Verify that the status of each storage subsystem is Optimal. If a device shows a status of Unresponsive, right-click the device and select **Remove Device** to delete it from the management domain. Then use the Add Device option to add it to the management domain again. Refer to the Enterprise Management window online help for instructions on removing and adding devices.
- 6. Continue with "Adding devices".

Adding devices

You can manually add more hosts or storage subsystems. You can use this option to selectively manage a group of storage subsystems from an SMclient. You can also use this option to add additional devices to be managed that were not discovered during the SMclient initial discovery. For more information about this option, refer to the Enterprise Management window online help.

Important:

- When you add new storage subsystems to the existing storage subsystems in a Storage Area Network (SAN) that are managed through the host-agent software, you must stop and restart the host-agent service. When the host-agent service restarts, the new storage subsystem is detected. For more information, refer to "Stopping and restarting the host-agent software" on page 102. Then, go to the Enterprise Management window and click Tools → Rescan to add the new storage subsystems to the management domain.
- When you add new storage subsystems to existing storage subsystems that are managed using the direct-management method, be sure to specify the IP addresses for both controllers.

Continue with "Setting up alert notifications".

Setting up alert notifications

After you add devices to the management domain, you can set up alert notifications to report critical events on the storage subsystems. The following alert-notification options are available:

- Notification to a designated network management station (NMS) using Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) traps
- Notification to designated e-mail addresses
- Notification to designated alphanumeric pagers (requires separately supplied software to convert e-mail messages)

Note: You can only monitor storage subsystems within the management domain. If you do not install the Event Monitor service, the Enterprise Management window must remain open. If you close the window, you will not receive any alert notifications from the managed storage subsystems. Refer to the Enterprise Management window online help for additional information.

To set up alert notification to an NMS using SNMP traps, perform the following steps:

- 1. Insert the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 CD into the CD-ROM drive on an NMS. You need to set up the designated management station only once.
- 2. Copy the SM820.MIB file from the SM820.mib directory to the NMS.
- 3. Follow the steps required by your NMS to compile the management information base (MIB) file. (For details, contact your network administrator or see the documentation specific to the storage management product you are using.)
- 4. Continue with "Naming storage subsystems".

Naming storage subsystems

To name your storage subsystem, perform the following steps:

- 1. In the Enterprise Management window, select a storage subsystem.




Figure 20. Subsystem Management window

- Click Tools → Manage Device. The Subsystem Management window opens, as shown in Figure 20.

- 3. Click **Storage Subsystem → Rename**. The Rename Storage Subsystem window opens.
- 4. Type the name of the storage subsystem (see Table 22 on page 109). Then click **OK**.
- Repeat for each unnamed storage subsystem. For more information, see the topic on renaming storage subsystems in the Subsystem Management window online help.
- 6. Continue with "Downloading firmware and NVSRAM".

Downloading firmware and NVSRAM

This section provides instructions for downloading firmware and NVSRAM. You must download firmware version 05.3x.xx before you download NVSRAM.

Downloading firmware

To download firmware version 05.3x.xx, perform the following steps:

- 1. From the Enterprise Management window, select a storage subsystem.
- 2. Click **Tools Manage Device**. The Subsystem Management window opens.
- 3. Click Storage Subsystem → Download → Firmware. Follow the instructions that display.
- 4. Continue with "Downloading NVSRAM".

Downloading NVSRAM

To download NVSRAM, perform the following steps:

- 1. From the Enterprise Management window, select a storage subsystem.
- 2. Click Tools -> Manage Device. The Subsystem Management window opens.
- Click Storage Subsystem→ Download → NVSRAM. Follow the instructions that display.
- 4. Continue with "Creating arrays and logical drives".

Creating arrays and logical drives

Important: You should create a storage subsystem profile and save it in a safe place whenever you modify the arrays and logical drives in your storage server. This profile contains detailed controller information including logical and physical disk configuration information that can be used to help recover the configuration in the event of a catastrophic failure.

To create a storage subsystem profile, select **View → Storage Subsystem Profile** in the Storage Subsystem Management window and click the **Save As** button when the Storage Subsystem Profile window opens.

If you have a storage server with firmware 04.01.xx.xx or earlier, you must also perform a controller state capture in addition to saving the storage subsystem profile. To use the Capture State Information feature, you must upgrade the controller to firmware 04.01.02.34 or later and install the FAStT Storage Manager Field Tool Version 5.21 program. This program is available at the following Web site:http:\\ssddom02.storage.ibm.com/techsup/webnav.nsf/support/disk/.

To create a storage subsystem profile using the Capture State Information feature, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click **Tools → Capture State Information**. A State Capture window opens.
- Click the **Browse** button to specify the file name for the state capture information.
- 3. Click the **Start** button to start the capture process.
- 4. Click the **Cancel** button to close the State Capture window when the capturing is completed.

An array is a set of Fibre Channel hard drives that are logically grouped together to form a RAID set. The maximum number of hard drives for each array is 30 if the hard drive capacities are 73.4GB or less and 14 if the hard drive capacities are 146GB. Each array can be divided into 1 to 256 logical drives. A *logical drive* is a logical structure, which is the basic structure that you create to store data on the storage subsystem. The operating system recognizes a logical drive as a single drive. Choose a RAID level to meet application needs for data availability and maximize Fibre Channel I/O performance.

To create arrays and logical drives, perform the following steps:

- 1. From the Enterprise Management window, select a storage subsystem.
- 2. Click **Tools → Manage Device**. The Subsystem Management window opens.
- 3. Click the Logical/Physical View tab.
- 4. Click Logical Drive → Create. The Logical Drive Create wizard starts. Follow the online instructions to create arrays and logical drives.
- 5. Continue with "Verifying and defining the default host type".

Note: For cluster configurations, if you add or delete logical drives, you must make them known to both node A and node B.

Verifying and defining the default host type

Before you use the logical drives in a host computer, you must specify the host type. The host type determines how the storage subsystem controllers will work with each particular operating system on the hosts to which it is connected. If all of the host computers connected to the same storage subsystem are running the same operating system, and you do not want to define partitioning, you can define a default host type.

To verify the current default host type, perform the following steps:

- 1. In the Subsystem Management window, click View → Storage subsystem profile. A Storage Subsystem Profile window opens.
- 2. Click the Mappings folder tab and scroll down to NVSRAM Host Type Internal Definitions. The host type name of the index that has the word DEFAULT next to it is the default host type.
- 3. Click Close.

To define a default host type, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Storage subsystem → Change → Default host-type. The Default Host-type window opens.
- 2. From the pull-down list, select the host type.
- Click OK.

If you have hosts with different operating systems or if you want to define partitions for the hosts, continue with "Configuring heterogeneous hosts".

Configuring heterogeneous hosts

The heterogeneous hosts feature enables hosts running different operating systems to access a single storage subsystem. Previous releases of FAStT Storage Manager (versions 7.02 or earlier) required that hosts run the same operating system in order to access a single storage subsystem.

Host computers can run completely different operating systems (for example, Solaris and Windows NT 4.0) or variants of the same operating system (for example, Windows NT 4.0 running in a cluster environment or Windows NT 4.0 running in a noncluster environment). When a host type is specified in the Define New Host Port window, the heterogeneous hosts feature enables the controllers in the storage subsystem to tailor their behavior (such as LUN reporting) to the needs of the host.

Important: To use the heterogeneous host feature, you must meet the following conditions:

- · You must enable storage partitioning.
- During host-port definition, you must set each host type to the appropriate operating system so that the firmware on each controller can respond correctly to the host.

To start the heterogeneous host configuration, perform the following steps:

- 1. From the Subsystem Management window, click **Mappings View**.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions.
- 3. Continue with "Performing other storage-subsystem management tasks".

Note: Partitioning is a premium feature. If you disable partitioning, you *must* contact your IBM technical support representative to obtain a key to reenable partitioning.

Performing other storage-subsystem management tasks

The following list includes other storage subsystem management tasks that you can perform:

- · Locating a storage subsystem
- · Viewing a storage subsystem profile or event log
- · Entering or changing a storage subsystem password
- Creating and managing logical drives and arrays
- · Using the Performance Monitor
- · Creating storage partitions (if applicable) and heterogeneous hosts
- · Viewing or changing media scan settings
- Increasing capacity of an array or logical drive
- · Changing RAID level for an array
- · Monitoring read-link-status error counts
- · Downloading ESM firmware or Fibre Channel drive firmware

Note: To create storage partitions, you must obtain the worldwide name or port of each host adapter in every host connected to the storage subsystem.

For more information about these and other storage subsystem management tasks, refer to the appropriate topics in the Subsystem Management online help.

Chapter 6. Using the storage management software

This chapter provides information about how to add or delete logical drives, create FlashCopy logical drives, use the Hot Add and SMdevices utilities, start and stop the host-agent software, and uninstall Storage Manager components.

Adding or deleting logical drives

Use the following procedures to add or delete logical drives in a standard (noncluster) and a cluster configuration.

Standard (noncluster) configuration for Windows NT 4.0

Creating logical drives

When you create logical drives with the storage management software, you must add the new logical drives to Windows NT 4.0. Refer to the Windows NT 4.0 documentation for details about how to add a drive. Each logical drive (not array) is recognized by Windows NT 4.0 as a single drive.

After you create logical drives, run the Hot Add and SMdevices utilities that are provided with the storage management software. The Hot Add utility adds newly created logical drives to the operating system. The SMdevices utility identifies logical drives by their associated operating system device names. For more information, see "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101 and "Using the SMdevices utility" on page 101.

Deleting logical drives

Important: If you have data or logical drives that you want to keep, do not click **Configuration → Reset**. This action resets the controller unit and deletes *all* previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or using **Configuration → Reset**, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use the Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.
- 2. Restart the system to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Disk Administrator to delete OS partitions and unassigned drive letters before deleting logical drives or resetting the configuration in Storage Manager. This avoids damage to your registry information.

Cluster server configuration for Windows NT 4.0

Use the following procedures to create or delete logical drives in a cluster server environment for Windows NT 4.0.

Creating logical drives

To add logical drives in a Windows NT 4.0 cluster server environment, perform the following steps:

- 1. Using the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client, create arrays and assign them to the appropriate host group by using storage partitioning.
- 2. Stop the cluster server service in node A. Make sure that all of the cluster groups and resources failover to node B.

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- b. Click **Services**. The Services window opens.
- c. Select Cluster Server, and click Startup. The Service window opens.

3. Perform the following steps to disable the cluster server service and the cluster

- d. Change the Startup Type Setting to **Disabled**; then, click **OK**.
- e. Close the Services window.
- f. Click Start -> Settings -> Control Panel. The Control Panel window opens
- g. Click **Devices**. The Device window opens.
- h. Select Cluster Disk; then, click Startup. The Devices window opens.
- i. Select **Disabled**; then, click **OK**.
- j. Close the Devices window.
- 4. Restart node A.
- 5. Use Disk Administrator to create and format your operating system partitions.
- 6. Enable cluster server service and the cluster disk device in node A. Make sure that the start-up type is set to System for cluster disk device and Automatic for cluster server service.
- 7. Restart node A. Then make sure that the cluster server service has started and that the cluster groups and resources have failed back correctly.
- 8. Stop the cluster server service in node B.
- 9. Using the procedure outlined in step 3, disable cluster server service and the cluster disk device in node B.
- Restart node B.
- 11. Use Disk Administrator to reassign the drive letters to match the ones that were assigned to a given disk in node A.
- 12. Enable cluster server service and the cluster disk device in node B. Make sure that the start-up type is set to System for cluster disk device and Automatic for cluster server service.
- 13. Restart node B. Then make sure that the cluster server service started and the cluster groups and resources failed back correctly.
- 14. Stop the cluster server service in node A.
- 15. Restart node A.
- 16. After cluster server service has started, use Cluster Administrator to create your physical disk resources.
- 17. Verify that the physical disk resources can be brought online in both nodes.

Deleting logical drives

Important: Do not click Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window if you have data or logical drives that you want to keep. This action resets the controller unit and deletes all previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or use Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use Cluster Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources that own the logical drives that will be deleted.
- 2. Use Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.

3. Restart the system to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Cluster Administrator and Disk Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources, delete OS partitions, and unassigned drive letters before deleting logical drives or resetting the configuration in Storage Manager. This will avoid damage to your registry information.

Standard (noncluster) configuration for Windows 2000

Use the following procedures to create or delete logical drives in a standard server environment for Windows 2000.

Creating logical drives

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When you create logical drives with the storage management software, you must add the new logical drives to the Windows 2000 operating system. Each logical drive (not array) is recognized by Windows 2000 as a single drive.

After creating logical drives, run the Hot Add and SMdevices utilities that are provided with the storage management software. The Hot Add utility adds newly created logical drives to the operating system without requiring a system restart. The SMdevices utility identifies the logical drives by their associated operating system device names. For more information, see "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101 or "Using the SMdevices utility" on page 101.

Deleting logical drives

Important: Do not click **Configuration → Reset** if you have data or logical drives that you want to keep. This action resets the controller unit and deletes *all* previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or use **Configuration** • **Reset**, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use the Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.
- 2. Restart the system to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Disk Administrator to delete OS partitions and unassigned drive letters before you delete logical drives or reset the configuration in Storage Manager. This action avoids damage to your registry information.

Cluster server configuration for Windows 2000

Use the following procedures to create or delete logical drives in a cluster server environment for Windows 2000.

Creating logical drives

To add logical drives in a Windows 2000 cluster server environment, perform the following steps:

- 1. Using the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client, create arrays and assign them to the appropriate host group by using storage partitioning.
- 2. Use the Hot Add utility to add the new logical drives to node A.
- 3. Using the Disk Administrator, create, format, and assign drive letters to the disk partitions on the new logical drives.
- 4. Use the Hot Add utility to add the new logical drives to node B.
- 5. Using the Disk Administrator, ensure that the drive letters assigned to the disk partitions on the logical drives are the same on both node A and node B.

- 6. Restart node A. Then use the Cluster Administrator to create cluster physical disk resources using the new disk partitions on the new logical drives.
- 7. Bring the cluster resources online in node A.
- 8. Use cluster administrator to move the cluster physical disk resources to node B.
- 9. Verify that the resources come online in node B.

Deleting logical drives

Important: Do not click Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window if you have data or logical drives that you want to keep. This action resets the controller unit and deletes all previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or use Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use the Cluster Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources that own the logical drives that will be deleted.
- 2. Use the Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.
- 3. Restart the system to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Cluster Administrator and Disk Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources, delete OS partitions, and unassigned drive letters before deleting logical drives or resetting the configuration in Storage Manager. This avoids damage to your registry information.

Standard (non-clustered) configuration for Windows Server 2003

Use the following procedures to create or delete logical drives in a standard environment.

Creating logical drives

When you create logical drives with the storage management software, you must add the new logical drives to the Windows Server 2003 operating system. Each logical drive (not array) is recognized by Windows Server 2003 as a single disk drive.

After creating logical drives, run the Hot Add and SMdevices utilities that are provided with the storage management software. The Hot Add utility adds newly created logical drives to the operating system without requiring a system restart. The SMdevices utility identifies logical drives by their associated operating system device names. For more information, see "Using the Hot Add utility" on page 101 or "Using the SMdevices utility" on page 101.

Deleting logical drives

Important: Do not click Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window if you have data or logical drives that you want to keep. This action resets the controller unit and deletes all previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or use Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window, perform the following steps:

1. Use the Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.

2. If possible, restart the system to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Disk Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources, delete OS partitions, and unassigned drive letters before you delete logical drives or reset the configuration in Storage Manager. This action avoids damage to your registry information.

Cluster server configuration for Windows Server 2003

Use the following procedures to create or delete logical drives in a cluster server environment.

Creating logical drives

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To add logical drives in a Windows Server 2003 cluster server environment, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client program to create arrays and logical drives and use storage partitioning to assign them to the appropriate cluster host group.
- 2. Use the Hot Add utility to add the new logical drives to the cluster node that is currently owned by the cluster quorum resource.
- 3. Use the Disk Administrator program to create, format, and assign drive letters to the disk partitions on the new logical drives.
- 4. In each of the rest of the cluster nodes in the cluster configuration, use the Hot Add utility to add the new logical drives to the cluster node.
- 5. In the first cluster node, use the Cluster Administrator program to create cluster physical disk resources using the new disk partitions on the new logical drives.

Note: If the new disk does not show up in the available disk pull-down list when you go through the Cluster Administrator program, you might have to reboot the server.

- 6. Bring the cluster resources online in the first cluster node.
- 7. Use the Cluster Administrator to move the newly-created cluster physical disk resources to other nodes in the cluster configuration.
- 8. Verify that the resources come online in other nodes in the cluster configuration.

Deleting logical drives

Important: Do not click Configuration → Reset in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window if you have data or logical drives that you want to keep. This action resets the controller unit and deletes *all* previously-configured logical drives.

Before you delete logical drives with the storage management software or use **Configuration → Reset** in the Storage Manager Client Storage Subsystem management window, perform the following steps:

- 1. Use the Cluster Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources that own the logical drives that will be deleted.
- 2. Use the Disk Administrator to delete any partitions and to unassign drive letters that are associated with the logical drives.
- 3. If possible, restart the cluster nodes to remove the configuration information.

Attention: You must use the Cluster Administrator and Disk Administrator to delete the cluster physical disk resources, delete OS partitions, and unassigned drive letters before you delete logical drives or reset the configuration in Storage Manager. This action avoids damage to your registry information.

Creating a FlashCopy logical drive

FAStT600

The FlashCopy feature is not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server.

A FlashCopy logical drive is a logical point-in-time image of a logical drive, called a base logical drive. A FlashCopy logical drive has the following features:

- It is created quickly and requires less disk space than an actual logical drive.
- It can be assigned to a host address, so that you can perform backups using the FlashCopy logical drive while the base logical drive is online and accessible.
- You can use the FlashCopy logical drive to perform application testing or scenario development and analysis. This does not effect the actual production environment.
- The maximum number of FlashCopy logical drives allowed is one half of the total logical drives supported by your controller model.

For additional information about the FlashCopy feature and how to manage Flash Copy logical drives, refer to the Storage Manager Subsystem Management online help.

Note: FlashCopy is a purchased premium feature. Contact your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative for more information.

To create a FlashCopy logical drive, perform the following steps:

- 1. To ensure that you have the accurate point-in-time image of the base logical drive, stop applications and flush cache I/O to the base logical drive. For instructions, see "Using the SMflashcopyassist utility" on page 102.
- 2. Open the Subsystem Management window. From the Logical View, right-click the base logical drive.
- Select Create FlashCopy Logical Drive. The Create FlashCopy Logical Drive Wizard starts.
- 4. Follow the on-screen instructions.
- 5. Refer to the Subsystem Management online help for instructions on how to add the FlashCopy logical drive to the host.

Using the Remote Mirror Option

FAStT600

The Remote Mirror Option is not supported on the FAStT600 Fibre Channel Storage Server.

The Remote Mirror Option is a purchased premium feature. The Remote Mirror Option is used for online, real-time replication of data between storage subsystems over a remote distance. In the event of a disaster or unrecoverable error at one storage subsystem, you can promote a second storage subsystem to take over responsibility for normal I/O operations. Consult the IBM FAStT Remote Mirror Option Installation and User's Guide, or contact your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative for more information.

Using the Hot Add utility

The Hot Add utility enables you to add new logical drives without restarting the system. The utility registers the new logical drives with the operating system so that you can use Disk Administrator to create partitions, add device names, and so on. The Hot Add utility is part of the SMutil software package. If you run the program twice and the new logical drives are not displayed in the Disk Administrator window, you must either run Fibre Channel diagnostics or restart (reboot) the host.

When you finish creating logical drives on a particular storage subsystem, go to the host that is attached to that storage subsystem and perform the following steps to use the Hot Add utility:

- 1. From a DOS or command prompt, change to the installation_directory\IBM_FAStT\Util where installation_directory is the directory where you installed the SMutil.
- 2. From a DOS or command prompt, type the following command: hot add
- Press Enter. The new logical drives are available through the Disk Administrator.

Using the SMdevices utility

The SMutil software includes a utility called SMdevices that you can use to view the storage subsystem logical drive that is associated with a particular operating system device name. This utility is helpful when you want to create drive letters or partitions by using Disk Administrator.

When you finish creating the logical drives on a particular storage subsystem, go to the host that is attached to that storage subsystem, and perform the following steps to use SMdevices:

- 1. From a DOS or command prompt, change to the installation_directory\IBM_FAStT\Util where installation_directory is the directory where you installed the SMutil.
- 2. Type:
 - SMdevices
- 3. Press Enter. The software displays device identification information. For example, you might see the following information:

```
\\.\PHYSICALDRIVEx [Storage Subsystem Finance, Logical Drive DEBIT, LUN xx,
WWN <worldwide name>]
```

where:

- x is the Disk number that displays in Disk Administrator
- · Finance is the name of the storage subsystem
- DEBIT is the name of the logical drive
- xx is the LUN associated with the logical drive
- worldwide_name is the worldwide name for the logical drive

Using the SMflashcopyassist utility

Note: This utility requires that you enable the FlashCopy feature. The FlashCopy feature is not supported in FAStT600.

You can use SMflashcopyassist utility to perform the following tasks:

- Flush cached data for a logical drive.
- Resolve duplicate logical drive signatures between the base logical drives and the FlashCopy logical drives. (Windows NT 4.0 only)

To flush cached data in a logical drive, perform the following steps:

- 1. From a DOS or command prompt, change to the installation_directory\IBM_FAStT\Util where *installation directory* is the directory where you installed the SMutil.
- 2. Type the following command:

```
smflashcopyassist -f logical_drive_letter:
where logical drive letter is the operating system drive letter that was assigned
to the disk partition created on the logical drive.
```

3. Press Enter.

After you create a FlashCopy logical drive and map it to the same host as the base logical drive, (for Windows NT 4.0 only) to resolve duplicate logical drive signatures:

- 1. Type: smflashcopyassist -r
- 2. Press Enter.

Stopping and restarting the host-agent software

You must stop and restart the host-agent software if you add additional storage subsystems to the management domain of the host-agent software. When you restart the service, the host-agent software discovers the new storage subsystems and adds them to the management domain.

Note: If none of the access logical drives are detected after a restart, the host-agent software automatically stops running. Make sure that there is a good Fibre Channel connection from the host to the Storage Area Network that the storage subsystem is connected to. Then restart the host or cluster node so that new host-agent-managed storage subsystems can be discovered.

Windows NT 4.0

To stop and restart the host-agent software, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Settings → Control Panel. The Control Panel window opens.
- 2. Double-click Services. The Services window opens.
- 3. Click IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent; then, click Stop. The Confirmation window opens.
- 4. Click Yes.
- 5. Click Start. The Storage Agent Manager starts.
- 6. Close the Services window.

Windows 2000

To stop and restart the host-agent software, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Programs → Administrative Tools → Services. The Services window opens.
- Right-click IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent.
- 3. Click Restart. The IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent stops and then starts again.
- 4. Close the Services window.

Windows Server 2003

To stop and restart the host-agent software, perform the following steps:

- 1. Click Start → Administrative Tools → Services. The Services window opens.
- Right-click IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent.
- 3. Click Restart. The IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8 Agent stops and then starts again.
- Close the Services window.

Uninstalling storage management software components

Use the following procedure to uninstall one or more of the components of Storage Manager 8.3. If you are uninstalling components released with an earlier version of the storage management software, use the uninstall procedure that came with the version of the storage management software that you are currently running.

Important: Do not uninstall the RDAC unless instructed by an IBM technical support representative. The host-agent package requires RDAC to function properly. If you uninstall RDAC in a coexistence environment, you will lose Fibre Channel I/O path failover support for both the version 7.xx and version 8.xx of Storage Manager.

1. Click Start → Settings → Control Panel. The Control Panel window opens. Select Add/Remove programs. The Add/Remove Programs Properties window opens.

Note: Uninstall the Storage Manager components in the following order:

- a. SMagent
- b. SMutil
- c. RDAC
- d. SMclient
- 2. Select the component you want to uninstall from the list of programs (for example, IBM FAStT Storage Manager Client).
- 3. Click Add/Remove. The Confirm File Deletion window opens.
- 4. Click **Yes** to start the uninstallation process.
- 5. When the uninstallation is complete, click **OK**.

Chapter 7. Operating system support

This chapter contains information related to operating the storage management software in a Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, or Windows Server 2003 environment.

Limitations of Windows operating systems

Important: Always check for a readme file. A readme file contains important information that was not available when this Installation and Support Guide was prepared.

Table 21 explains limitations that apply when you use the IBM FAStT Storage Manager Version 8.3 with Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, and Windows Server 2003.

SMagent workaround for defining additional Access LUN mapping

Perform the following steps to define additional Access LUN mapping for SMagent:

- 1. Go to a different computer that has management access to the storage subsystem, or establish a direct management connection to the storage subsystem from the current host.
- 2. Start the IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8.3 Client and open the Subsystem Management window for the storage subsystem.
- 3. Click the **Mappings View** tab.
- 4. Right-click the **Default Group** and select **Define Additional mappings**.
- 5. Select **Access**.
- 6. From the LUN drop-down menu, select Logical Unit Number (LUN) 31.
- 7. Click Add to define the access LUN.
- 8. Click Close. In the Define Mapping pane, a LUN with the Access name is displayed.
- 9. Close the window and restart the host. When the host restarts, the SMagent service starts.

SMagent workaround for changing existing Access LUN mapping

Perform the following steps to change existing Access LUN mapping:

- 1. Go to a different computer that has management access to the storage subsystem, or establish a direct management connection to the storage subsystem from the current host.
- 2. Start the IBM FAStT Storage Manager 8.3 Client and open the Subsystem Management window for the storage subsystem.
- 3. Click the Mappings View tab.
- 4. From the topology pane, select the **Default Group** or the corresponding host partition.
- 5. Right-click **Access** and select **Change Mapping**. A Change Mapping window opens.
- 6. From the LUN drop-down menu, select the LUN that your operating system supports. If it is not available, you must remove one of the existing storage partitioning mappings.
- 7. Click OK.
- 8. Close the window and restart the host. When the host restarts, the SMagent service starts.

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Important notes

Processor speeds indicate the internal clock speed of the microprocessor; other factors also affect application performance.

CD-ROM drive speeds list the variable read rate. Actual speeds vary and are often less than the maximum possible.

When referring to processor storage, real and virtual storage, or channel volume, KB stands for approximately 1000 bytes, MB stands for approximately 1 000 000 bytes, and GB stands for approximately 1 000 000 000 bytes.

When referring to hard disk drive capacity or communications volume, MB stands for 1 000 000 bytes, and GB stands for 1 000 000 000 bytes. Total user-accessible capacity may vary depending on operating environments.

Maximum internal hard disk drive capacities assume the replacement of any standard hard disk drives and population of all hard disk drive bays with the largest currently supported drives available from IBM.

Maximum memory may require replacement of the standard memory with an optional memory module.

Definitions are identified by the symbol (I) after the definition; definitions taken from draft international standards, committee drafts, and working papers by ISO/IEC JTC1/SC1 are identified by the symbol (T) after the definition, indicating that final agreement has not yet been reached among the participating National Bodies of SC1.
- IBM Glossary of Computing Terms. New York: McGraw-Hill, 1994.

The following cross-reference conventions are used in this glossary:

See Refers you to (a) a term that is the expanded form of an abbreviation or acronym, or (b) a synonym or more preferred term.

See also

Refers you to a related term.

Abstract Windowing Toolkit (AWT). A Java graphical user interface (GUI).

accelerated graphics port (AGP). A bus specification that gives low-cost 3D graphics cards faster access to main memory on personal computers than the usual peripheral component interconnect (PCI) bus. AGP reduces the overall cost of creating high-end graphics subsystems by using existing system memory.

access volume. A special logical drive that allows the host-agent to communicate with the controllers in the storage subsystem.

adapter. A printed circuit assembly that transmits user data input/output (I/O) between the internal bus of the host system and the external Fibre Channel (FC) link and vice versa. Also called an I/O adapter, host adapter, or FC adapter.

ADT. See auto-logical drive transfer feature.

advanced technology (AT) bus architecture. A bus standard for IBM compatibles. It extends the XT bus architecture to 16 bits and also allows for bus mastering, although only the first 16 MB of main memory are available for direct access.

agent. A server program that receives virtual connections from the network manager (the client program) in a Simple Network Management Protocol-Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (SNMP-TCP/IP) network-managing environment.

AGP. See accelerated graphics port.

AL_PA. See arbitrated loop physical address.

arbitrated loop. A shared 100 MBps Fibre Channel transport structured as a loop and supporting up to 126 devices and one fabric attachment. A port must successfully arbitrate before a circuit can be established.

arbitrated loop physical address (AL_PA). One of three existing Fibre Channel topologies, in which two to 126 ports are interconnected serially in a single loop circuit. Access to the Fibre Channel-Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) is controlled by an arbitration scheme. The FC-AL topology supports all classes of service and guarantees in-order delivery of FC frames when the originator and responder are on the same FC-AL. The default topology for the disk array is arbitrated loop. An arbitrated loop is sometimes referred to as Stealth Mode.

auto-logical drive transfer (ADT) feature.. ADT is a built-in feature of the controller firmware that allows logical drive-level failover rather than controller-level failover.

auto volume transfer/auto disk transfer (AVT/ADT). A function that provides automatic failover in case of controller failure on a storage subsystem.

AVT/ADT. See auto volume transfer/auto disk transfer.

AWT. See Abstract Windowing Toolkit.

basic input/output system (BIOS). Code that controls basic hardware operations, such as interactions with diskette drives, hard disk drives, and the keyboard.

BIOS. See basic input/output system.

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BOOTP. See bootstrap protocol.

bootstrap protocol (BOOTP). A Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) protocol that a diskless workstation or network computer uses to obtain its Internet Protocol (IP) address and other network information such as server address and default gateway.

bridge. A storage area network (SAN) device that provides physical and transport conversion, such as Fibre Channel to small computer system interface (SCSI) bridge.

bridge group. A bridge and the collection of devices connected to it. Bridge Groups are discovered by the SANavigator tool and are displayed with a gray background on the Physical and Data Path Maps.

broadcast. A method of sending a Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) request for information to all the devices on a subnet that use a single special request. Because of its efficiency, the SANavigator tool sets its default method of discovery to broadcast. However, a network administrator might disable this method on the network router.

cathode ray tube (CRT). An electrical device for displaying images by exciting phosphor dots with a scanned electron beam. CRTs are found in computer video display units (VDUs) and monitors, televisions, and oscilloscopes.

CDPD. See cellular digital packet data.

cellular digital packet data (CDPD). A wireless standard that provides two-way, 19.2 kps packet data transmission over existing cellular telephone channels.

CGA. See color graphics adapter.

client. A computer system or process that requests a service of another computer system or process that is typically referred to as a server. Multiple clients can share access to a common server.

color graphics adapter (CGA). An early, now obsolete, IBM video display standard for use on IBM personal computers. CGA displays 80 x 25 or 40 x 25 text in 16 colors, 640 x 200 pixel graphics in two colors or 320 x 200 pixel graphics in four colors.

command. Any selection on a dialog box or elsewhere in the user interface that causes the SANavigator tool to perform a task.

community strings. The name of a community contained in each Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) message. SNMP has no standard mechanisms for verifying that a message was sent by a member of the community, keeping the contents of a message private, or for determining if a message has been changed or replayed.

CRC. See cyclic redundancy check.

CRT. See cathode ray tube.

cyclic redundancy check (CRC). (1) 1) A redundancy check in which the check key is generated by a cyclic algorithm. (2) 2) An error detection technique performed at both the sending and receiving stations.

dac. See disk array controller.

dar. See disk array router.

DASD. See direct-access storage device.

device type. Identifier used to place devices in the physical map, such as the switch, hub, storage.

DHCP. See Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol.

direct access storage device (DASD). IBM mainframe terminology for a data storage device by which information can be accessed directly, instead of by-passing sequentially through all storage areas. For example, a disk drive is a DASD, in contrast with a tape drive, which stores data as a linear sequence.

direct memory access (DMA). The transfer of data between memory and an input/output (I/O) device without processor intervention.

disk array controller (dac). A disk array controller device that represents the two controllers of an array. See also *disk array router*..

disk array router (dar). A disk array router that represents an entire array, including current and deferred paths to all logical unit numbers (LUNs) (hdisks on AIX). See also disk array controller.

DMA. See direct memory access.

domain. The most significant byte in the node port (N_port) identifier for the Fibre Channel (FC) device. It is not used in the Fibre Channel-small computer system interface (FC-SCSI) hardware path ID. It is required to be the same for all SCSI targets logically connected to an FC adapter.

DRAM. See dynamic random access memory.

dynamic host configuration protocol (DHCP). A protocol defined by the Internet Engineering Task Force that is used for dynamically assigning IP addresses to computers in a network.

dynamic random access memory (DRAM). A storage in which the cells require repetitive application of control signals to retain stored data.

E_port. See expansion port.

ECC. See error correction coding.

EEPROM. See *electrically erasable programmable read-only memory.*

EGA. See enhanced graphics adapter.

electrically erasable programmable read-only memory (EEPROM). A type of non-volatile storage device that can be erased with an electrical signal. Writing to EEPROM takes much longer than reading. It also can only be reprogrammed a limited number of times before it wears out. Therefore, it is appropriate for storing small amounts of data that are changed infrequently.

electrostatic discharge (ESD). The flow of current that results when objects that have a static charge come into close enough proximity to discharge.

enhanced graphics adapter (EGA). An IBM video display standard that provides text and graphics with a resolution of 640 x 350 pixels of 16 colors. It emulates the Color Graphics Adapter (CGA) and the Monochrome Display Adapter (MDA) and was superseded by the Video Graphics Display (VGA).

enhanced small device interface (ESDI). A hard disk controller standard that allows disks to communicate with computers at high speeds. ESDI drives typically transfer data at about 10 megabits per second, although they are capable of doubling that speed.

error correction coding (ECC). A method for encoding data so that transmission errors can be detected and corrected by examination of the data on the receiving end. Most ECCs are characterized by the maximum number of errors they can detect and correct.

error detection coding. A method for encoding data so that errors that occur during storage or transmission can be detected. Most error detection codes are characterized by the maximum number of errors they can detect. The simplest form of error detection is by using a single added parity bit or a cyclic redundancy check. Adding multiple parity bits can detect not only that an error has occurred, but also which bits have been inverted, thereby indicating which bits should be re-inverted to restore the original data.

ESD. See electrostatic discharge.

ESDI. See enhanced small device interface.

expansion port (E_port). An expansion port (E_port) that connects the switches for two fabrics (also used for McData ES-1000 B ports).

eXtended graphics array (XGA). An IBM advanced standard for graphics controller and display mode design introduced in 1990. XGA, used mostly on workstation-level systems, supports a resolution of 1024 x 768 pixels with a palette of 256 colors, or 640 x 480 with high color (16 bits per pixel). XGA-2 added 1024 x

768 support for high color and higher refresh rates, improved performance, and supports 1360 x 1024 in 16 colors.

F_port. See *fabric port*.

fabric group. A collection of interconnected storage area network (SAN) devices discovered by the SANavigator tool and displayed with a blue background on the Physical and Data Path Maps.

fabric port (F_port). A fabric port (F_port) that supports a node port (N_port) on a Fibre Channel switch.

Fibre Channel (FC). A bi-directional, full-duplex, point-to-point, serial data channel structured for high performance capability. Physically, Fibre Channel interconnects devices, such as host systems and servers, FC hubs and disk arrays, through ports, called node ports (N_ports), in one of three topologies: a point-to-point link, an arbitrated loop, or a cross point switched network, which is called a fabric. FC can interconnect two devices in a point-to-point topology, from two to 126 devices in an arbitrated loop. FC is a generalized transport mechanism that can transport any existing protocol, such as small computer system interface (SCSI), in FC frames.

Fibre Channel Protocol (FCP) for small computer system interface (SCSI). A high-level Fibre Channel mapping layer (FC-4) that uses lower-level Fibre Channel (FC-PH) services to transmit SCSI command, data, and status information between a SCSI initiator and a SCSI target across the FC link by using FC frame and sequence formats.

field replaceable unit (FRU). An assembly that is replaced in its entirety when any one of its components fails. In some cases, a FRU might contain other field replaceable units.

FRU. See field replaceable unit.

general purpose interface bus (GPIB). An 8-bit parallel bus developed for the exchange of information between computers and industrial automation equipment.

GPIB. See general purpose interface bus.

graphical user interface (GUI). A type of computer interface that presents a visual metaphor of a real-world scene, often of a desktop, by combining high-resolution graphics, pointing devices, menu bars and other menus, overlapping windows, icons, and the object-action relationship.

GUI. See graphical user interface.

HBA. See host bus adapter.

hdisk. An AIX term that represents a logical unit number (LUN) on an array.

host. A system that is directly attached to the storage subsystem through a Fibre Channel input/output path. This system is used to serve data (typically in the form of files) from the storage subsystem. A system can be both a storage management station and a host simultaneously.

host bus adapter (HBA). An interface between the Fibre Channel network and a workstation or server.

host computer. See host.

host group. The collection of host bus adapters (HBAs) and NASs in a fabric discovered by the SANavigator tool and displayed with a yellow background on the Physical and Data Path Maps.

hub. In a network, a point at which circuits are either connected or switched. For example, in a star network, the hub is the central node; in a star/ring network, it is the location of wiring concentrators.

IC. See integrated circuit.

IDE. See integrated drive electronics.

in-band. Transmission of management protocol over the Fibre Channel transport.

Industry Standard Architecture (ISA). A bus standard for IBM compatibles that allows components to be added as cards plugged into standard expansion slots. ISA was originally introduced in the IBM PC/XT with an 8-bit data path. It was later expanded to permit a 16-bit data path when IBM introduced the PC/AT.

initial program load (IPL). The part of the boot sequence during which a computer system copies the operating system kernel into main memory and runs it.

integrated circuit (IC). A microelectronic semiconductor device that consists of many interconnected transistors and other components. ICs are constructed on a small rectangle cut from a silicon crystal or other semiconductor material. The small size of these circuits allows high speed, low power dissipation, and reduced manufacturing cost compared with board-level integration. Also known as a *chip*.

integrated drive electronics (IDE). Also known as an Advanced Technology Attachment Interface (ATA). A disk drive interface based on the 16-bit IBM personal computer Industry Standard Architecture (ISA) in which the controller electronics reside on the drive itself, eliminating the need for a separate adapter card.

integrated services digital network (ISDN). A digital end-to-end telecommunication network that supports

multiple services including, but not limited to, voice and data. ISDNs are used in public and private network architectures.

interrupt request (IRQ). A type of input found on many processors that causes the processor to suspend normal instruction execution temporarily and start executing an interrupt handler routine. Some processors have several interrupt request inputs that allow different priority interrupts.

Internet Protocol (IP) address. The unique 32-bit address that specifies the location of each device or workstation on the Internet. For example, 9.67.97.103 is an IP address.

IP address. See Internet Protocol address.

IPL. See initial program load.

IRQ. See interrupt request.

ISA. See Industry Standard Architecture.

ISDN. See Integrated Services Digital Network.

isolated group. A collection of isolated devices not connected to the storage area network (SAN) but discovered by the SANavigator tool. The isolated group displays with a gray background near the bottom of the Physical and Data Path Maps.

Java Runtime Environment (JRE). A subset of the Java Development Kit (JDK) for end users and developers who want to redistribute the JRE. The JRE consists of the Java virtual machine, the Java Core Classes, and supporting files.

JRE. See Java Runtime Environment.

label. A discovered or user entered property value that is displayed underneath each device in the Physical and Data Path Maps.

LAN. See local area network.

LBA. See logical block addressing.

local area network (LAN). A computer network located on a user's premises within a limited geographic area.

logical block addressing (LBA). A hard disk sector addressing scheme in which the addressing conversion is performed by the hard disk firmware. LBA is used on all small computer system interface (SCSI) hard disks and on ATA-2 conforming intergrated drive electronics (IDE) hard disks.

logical unit number (LUN). An identifier used on a small computer systems interface (SCSI) bus to distinguish among up to eight devices (logical units) with the same SCSI ID.

loop address. The unique ID of a node in Fibre Channel loop topology sometimes referred to as a loop

loop group. A collection of storage area network (SAN) devices that are interconnected serially in a single loop circuit. Loop groups are discovered by the SANavigator tool and displayed with a gray background on the Physical and Data Path Maps.

loop port (FL_port). A node port (N-port) or fabric port (F-port) that supports arbitrated loop functions associated with an arbitrated loop topology.

LUN. See logical unit number.

MAC. See medium access control.

medium access control (MAC). In local area networks (LANs), the sublayer of the data link control layer that supports medium-dependent functions and uses the services of the physical layer to provide services to the logical link control sublayer. The MAC sublayer includes the method of determining when a device has access to the transmission medium.

man pages. In UNIX-based operating systems, online documentation for operating system commands, subroutines, system calls, file formats, special files, stand-alone utilities, and miscellaneous facilities. Invoked by the man command.

management information base (MIB). The information that is on an agent. It is an abstraction of configuration and status information.

MCA. See micro channel architecture.

MIB. See management information base.

micro channel architecture (MCA). IBM's proprietary bus that is used in high-end PS/2 personal computers. Micro channel is designed for multiprocessing and functions as either a 16-bit or 32-bit bus. It eliminates potential conflicts that arise when installing new peripheral devices.

MIDI. See musical instrument digital interface.

model. The model identification assigned to a device by its manufacturer.

musical instrument digital interface (MIDI). A protocol that allows a synthesizer to send signals to another synthesizer or to a computer, or a computer to a musical instrument, or a computer to another computer.

NDIS. See network device interface specification.

network device interface specification (NDIS). An application programming interface (API) definition that allows disk operating systems (DOS) or OS/2 to support one or more network adapters and protocol stacks.

NDIS is a 16-bit, Ring O (for the OS/2 operating system) application programming interface (API) that defines a specific way for writing drivers for layers 1 and 2 of the OSI model. NDIS also handles the configuration and binding of these network drivers to multiple protocol stacks.

network management station (NMS). In the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP), a station that executes management application programs that monitor and control network elements.

NMI. See non-maskable interrupt.

NMS. See network management station.

non-maskable interrupt (NMI). A hardware interrupt that another service request cannot overrule (mask). An NMI bypasses and takes priority over interrupt requests generated by software, the keyboard, and other such devices and is issued to the microprocessor only in disastrous circumstances, such as severe memory errors or impending power failures.

node. A physical device that allows for the transmission of data within a network.

node port (N_port). A Fibre Channel defined hardware entity that performs data communications over the Fibre Channel link. It is identifiable by a unique worldwide name. It can act as an originator or a responder.

N_port. See node port.

nonvolatile storage (NVS). A storage device whose contents are not lost when power is cut off.

NVS. See nonvolatile storage.

NVSRAM. Nonvolatile storage random access memory. See nonvolatile storage.

Object Data Manager (ODM). An AIX proprietary storage mechanism for ASCII stanza files that are edited as part of configuring a drive into the kernel.

ODM. See Object Data Manager.

out-of-band. Transmission of management protocols outside of the Fibre Channel network, typically over Ethernet.

PCI local bus. See peripheral component interconnect local bus.

PDF. See portable document format.

peripheral component interconnect local bus (PCI local bus). A standard that Intel Corporation introduced for connecting peripherals. The PCI local bus allows up to 10 PCI-compliant expansion cards to be installed in a computer at a time. Technically, PCI is not a bus but a bridge or mezzanine. It runs at 20 - 33 MHz and carries 32 bits at a time over a 124-pin connector or 64 bits over a 188-pin connector. A PCI controller card must be installed in one of the PCI-compliant slots. The PCI local bus is processor independent and includes buffers to decouple the central processing unit (CPU) from relatively slow peripherals, allowing them to operate asynchronously. It also allows for multiplexing, a technique that permits more than one electrical signal to be present on the PCI local bus at a time.

performance events. Events related to thresholds set on storage area network (SAN) performance.

polling delay. The time in seconds between successive discovery processes during which discovery is inactive.

port. The hardware entity that connects a device to a Fibre Channel topology. A device can contain one or more ports.

portable document format (PDF). A standard specified by Adobe Systems, Incorporated, for the electronic distribution of documents. PDF files are compact; can be distributed globally by e-mail, the Web, intranets, or CD-ROM; and can be viewed with the Acrobat Reader, which is software from Adobe Systems that can be downloaded at no cost from the Adobe Systems home page.

private loop. A freestanding arbitrated loop with no fabric attachment.

program temporary fix (PTF). A temporary solution or bypass of a problem diagnosed by IBM in a current unaltered release of the program.

PTF. See program temporary fix.

RAM. See random-access memory.

random-access memory (RAM). A temporary storage location in which the central processing unit (CPU) stores and executes its processes.

RDAC. See redundant disk array controller.

read-only memory (ROM). Memory in which the user cannot changed stored data except under special conditions.

recoverable virtual shared disk (RVSD). A virtual shared disk on a server node configured to provide continuous access to data and file systems in a cluster.

red, green, blue (RGB). (1) Color coding in which the brightness of the additive primary colors of light, red, green, and blue are specified as three distinct values of white light. (2) Pertaining to a color display that accepts signals that represent red, green, and blue.

redundant disk array controller (RDAC). (1) In hardware, a redundant set of controllers (either active/passive or active/active). (2) In software, a layer

that manages the input/output (I/O) through the active controller during normal operation and transparently reroutes I/Os to the other controller in the redundant set if a controller or I/O path fails.

RGB. See red, green, blue.

ROM. See read-only memory.

router. A computer that determines the path of network traffic flow. The path selection is made from several paths based on information obtained from specific protocols, algorithms that attempt to identify the shortest or best path, and other criteria such as metrics or protocol-specific destination addresses.

RVSD. See recoverable virtual shared disk.

SAN. See storage area network.

scope. Defines a group of controllers by their Internet Protocol (IP) addresses. You must create and configure a scope so that dynamic IP addresses can be assigned to controllers on your network.

SCSI. See small computer system interface.

segmented loop port (SL_port). A segmented loop port (SL_port) allows you to divide a Fibre Channel private loop into multiple segments. Each segment can pass frames around as an independent loop and can connect through the fabric to other segments of the same loop.

serial storage architecture (SSA). An interface specification from IBM in which devices are arranged in a ring topology. SSA, which is compatible with small computer system interface (SCSI) devices, allows full-duplex packet multiplexed serial data transfers at rates of 20 Mbps in each direction.

server. A functional hardware and software unit that delivers shared resources to workstation client units on a computer network.

server/device events. Events that occur on the server or a designated device that meet criteria that the user sets.

Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP). In the Internet suite of protocols, a network management protocol that is used to monitor routers and attached networks. SNMP is an application layer protocol. Information on devices managed is defined and stored in the application's Management Information Base (MIB).

SL_port. See segmented loop port.

small computer system interface (SCSI). A standard hardware interface that enables a variety of peripheral devices to communicate with one another.

SNMP. See Simple Network Management Protocol.

SNMPv1. The original standard for Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) is now referred to as SNMPv1, as opposed to SNMPv2, a revision of SNMP. See also Simple Network Management Protocol.

SNMP time-out. The maximum amount of time the SANavigator tool will wait for a device to respond to a request. The specified time applies to one retry only.

SNMP trap events. Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) is based on a manager/agent model. SNMP includes a limited set of management commands and responses. The management system issues messages that tell an agent to retrieve various object variables. The managed agent sends a Response message to the management system. That message is an event notification, called a trap, that identifies conditions, such as thresholds, that exceed a predetermined value.

SRAM. See static random access memory.

SSA. See serial storage architecture.

static random access memory (SRAM). Random access memory based on the logic circuit known as flip-flop. It is called static because it retains a value as long as power is supplied, unlike dynamic random access memory (DRAM), which must be regularly refreshed. It is however, still volatile, meaning that it can lose its contents when the power is switched off.

storage area network (SAN). A network that links servers or workstations to disk arrays, tape backup subsystems, and other devices, typically over Fibre Channel.

storage management station. A system that is used to manage the storage subsystem. A storage management station does not need to be attached to the storage subsystem through the Fibre Channel input/output path.

subnet. An interconnected but independent segment of a network that is identified by its Internet Protocol (IP) address.

super video graphics array (SVGA). A video display standard that Video Electronics Standards Association (VESA) created to provide high resolution color display on IBM PC compatible personal computers. The resolution is 800 x 600 4-bit pixels. Each pixel can therefore be one of 16 colors.

SVGA. See super video graphics array.

sweep method. A method of sending Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) requests for information to all the devices on a subnet by sending the request to every device on the network. Sweeping an entire network can take a half an hour or more. If broadcast is disabled, the recommended method is to enter the individual Internet Protocol (IP) addresses of the storage area network (SAN) devices into the SANavigator tool. This method produces good results without unnecessarily using time to wait for responses from every IP address in the subnet, especially for IP addresses where no devices are present. There might, however, be times when a full subnet sweep will produce valuable diagnostic information about the network or a device's configuration.

switch. A Fibre Channel device that provides full bandwidth per port and high-speed routing of data by using link-level addressing.

switch group. A switch and the collection of devices connected to it that are not in other groups. Switch groups are discovered by the SANavigator tool and displayed with a gray background on the Physical and Data Path Maps.

system name. Device name assigned by the vendor's third-party software.

TCP. See Transmission Control Protocol.

TCP/IP. See Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol.

terminate and stay resident program (TSR program). A program that installs part of itself as an extension of DOS when it is executed.

TFT. See thin-film transistor.

thin-film transistor (TFT). A transistor created by using thin film methodology.

topology. The physical or logical arrangement of devices on a network. The three Fibre Channel topologies are fabric, arbitrated loop, and point-to-point. The default topology for the disk array is arbitrated loop.

TL_port. See translated loop port.

translated loop port (TL_port). Each translated loop port (TL_port) connects to a private loop and allows connectivity between the private loop devices and off loop devices (devices not connected to that particular TL port).

Transmission Control Protocol (TCP). A communication protocol used in the Internet and in any network that follows the Internet Engineering Task Force (IETF) standards for internetwork protocol. TCP provides a reliable host-to-host protocol between hosts in packed-switched communication networks and in interconnected systems of such networks. It uses the Internet Protocol (IP) as the underlying protocol.

Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (TCP/IP). A set of communication protocols that provide peer-to-peer connectivity functions for both local and wide-area networks.

trap. In the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP), a message sent by a managed node (agent function) to a management station to report an exception condition.

trap recipient. Receiver of a forwarded Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) trap. Specifically, a trap receiver is defined by an Internet Protocol (IP) address and port to which traps are sent. Presumably, the actual recipient is a software application running at the IP address and listening to the port.

TSR program. See terminate and stay resident program.

user action events. Actions that the user takes, such as changes in the storage area network (SAN), changed settings, and so on. Each such action is considered a *user action event*.

vendor. Property value that the SANavigator tool uses to launch third-party software. Vendor property might be discovered but will always remain editable.

VGA. See video graphics adapter.

video graphics adapter (VGA). A computer adapter that provides high-resolution graphics and a total of 256 colors.

video random access memory (VRAM). A special type of dynamic random access memory (DRAM) used in high-speed video applications, designed for storing the image to be displayed on a computer's monitor.

VRAM. See *video random access memory*.

WORM. See write-once read-many.

worldwide name (WWN). A registered, unique 64-bit identifier assigned to nodes and ports.

write-once read-many (WORM). Any type of storage medium to which data can be written only a single time, but can be read from any number of times. After the data is recorded, it cannot be altered. Typically the storage medium is an optical disk whose surface is permanently etched by using a laser in order to record information. WORM media are high-capacity storage devices and have a significantly longer shelf life than magnetic media.

WWN. See worldwide name.

XGA. See *eXtended graphics array*.

zoning. A function that allows segmentation of nodes by address, name, or physical port and is provided by fabric switches or hubs.

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
