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Safety Information

DANGER

An electrical outlet that is not correctly wired could place hazardous voltage on metal parts of the system or the devices that attach to the system. It is the responsibility of the customer to ensure that the outlet is correctly wired and grounded to prevent an electrical shock.

Use one hand, when possible, to connect or disconnect signal cables to prevent a possible shock from touching two surfaces with different electrical potentials.

During an electrical storm, do not connect cables for display stations, printers, telephones, or station protectors for communication lines.

CAUTION:

The Fast Write Cache Option Card contains a nickel-cadmium (NiCad) battery. To avoid possible explosion, do not incinerate the battery. Exchange only with a manufacturer approved part. Recycle or discard the battery as instructed by local regulations and where recycling facilities exist.

Handling the Adapter

Attention: Static electricity can damage this adapter and your system unit. To avoid damage, keep your adapter in its protective bag until you are ready to install it. To reduce the possibility of electrostatic discharge, follow the precautions listed below.

Electrostatic Discharge Protection

To prevent electrostatic discharge:

- Always wear an electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap correctly connected to an ESD ground bracket when you handle the adapter. This prevents possible damage to the adapter and decreases any possible impact to system operations.
- · Limit your movement. Movement can cause static electricity to build up around you.
- Handle the adapter carefully and by the edges.
- · Do not touch any exposed printed circuitry.
- · Prevent other people from touching the components or the adapter card.
- When you are installing the adapter, touch the static-protective package containing the adapter to a metal expansion-slot screw or other unpainted metal surface on the computer, for at least 2 seconds. (This drains static electricity from the package and from your body.)
- When possible, remove the adapter and install it directly into the computer without setting it down. If this is not possible, place the adapter, component side up, on the static-protective bag on a flat surface until the adapter is installed.
- Do not place the adapter on the computer cover or on a metal table.

About This Book

This book provides information about installing the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, the Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter, the 128 MBbyte DRAM Option Card, the device driver support software for all of the above, and the latest microcode for the SSA adapter and the SSA disk drives.

This book gives details of how to install the following:

- 1. The Advanced SerialRAID Adapter which is ordered as Feature Code FC 6225.
- 2. The Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter which is ordered as FC 6230.
- 3. The 128 MByte DRAM Option Card which is ordered by FC 6231 and which can only be installed on an Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter.

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Chapter 1. Overview

This chapter introduces the Advanced SerialRAID Adapters.

Advanced SerialRAID Adapters

The Advanced SerialRAID and Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapters allow you to connect SSA disk drives to certain system units with a Peripheral Component Interconnect (PCI) bus. These disk drives can be accessed individually or they can be configured in RAID arrays. RAID (Redundant Array of Independent Disks) provides a way to spread stored data among a number of hard disk drives attached to a host system. A PCI bus provides high-speed data transfer. An optional SSA Fast-Write Cache Option Card feature further improves the performance of the adapter.

You can create, control, and manage a RAID configuration with supporting host software. The Advanced SerialRAID and Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapters support data rates up to 40 MB per second on each SSA interface; and data rates up to 68 MB per second on the PCI bus. You can install up to 32 Advanced SerialRAID Adapters or Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapters in some host systems, depending on the system unit.

The Advanced SerialRAID Adapter can manage disks that are configured as non-RAID, RAID-0, and RAID-5 and any of these can be configured with the SSA Fast-Write Cache option. The number of adapters that can be supported in a loop that contains the following configurations of disks are:

Non-RAID	8 adapters maximum
RAID-0	1 adapter
RAID-5	2 adapters maximum
Fast-Write Cache	1 adapter

The Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter can manage disks that are configured as non-RAID, RAID-0, RAID-1, RAID-5, and RAID-10 arrays and all of these can be configured with the SSA Fast-Write Cache option. The number of adapters that can be supported in a loop that contains the following configurations of disks are:

Non-RAID	8 adapters maximum
RAID-0	1 adapter
RAID-1	2 adapters maximum
RAID-5	2 adapters maximum
RAID-10	2 adapters maximum
Fast-Write Cache	2 adapters maximum

SSA Architecture

Serial Storage Architecture (SSA) is a high-performance serial-interconnect technology used to connect I/O devices and host adapters. SSA is an open standard, and SSA specifications have been approved by the SSA Industry Association and are approved as an ANSI standard through the ANSI X3T10.1 subcommittee.

Upgrading an Adapter

The Advanced SerialRAID Adapter can be upgraded to an Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter by downloading new firmware to the adapter. This book also give details of how to do this upgrade, and if required, install the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card at the same time.

If you are upgrading to an Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter, you will need to verify that you performed the upgrade correctly in order to take advantage of the extra features of this adapter.

To determine which kind of adapter you have installed, you need to determine the adapter microcode package ID in one of two ways:

1. On the command line, give the following command:

lsattr -E -l adapter -a ucode

where **adapter** is the ID of the adapter that you want to check; for example, ssa0. An example of a response to this command is:

ucode 14109100.05.nn Name of adapter code download False

where **nn** is the adapter microcode package ID.

 Use the Display or Change Configuration or Vital Product Data (VPD) service aid to display the VPD for the adapter (see the Diagnostic Information for Multiple Bus Systems manual). The first two characters of the ROS Level field contain the adapter microcode package ID.

If the microcode package ID is at level 5000 or higher, then your adapter is already configured as an Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter. If the microcode package ID is less than level 5000, then your adapter is still configured as an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter.

Important Note

From this point on, the two adapters will be treated as one where possible. That is, where reference is made to the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, the text is also applicable to the Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter.

In places where it is necessary to highlight differences between the two adapters, the book will identify such differences.

Handling the Adapter

Attention: Static electricity may damage your equipment. Leave the adapter in the static-protective bag until you are ready to install it.

SSA Connectors

The Advanced SerialRAID Adapter has four external connectors, arranged in two pairs. Up to 48 SSA disk drives can be connected in a loop between each pair of external connectors.

"Appendix A. Connecting SSA Devices to the Adapter" on page 31 provides more information about SSA loops. Figure 1 shows the card.

Adapter Card Lights

On the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter cards, there is a light next to the pair of SSA connectors (port 1 and port 2) for each SSA loop.

- The light is on continuously when power is turned on to the adapter and both ports for that loop are operational; that is, the devices connected next to the adapter in the loop have power turned on to them, are connected correctly to the adapter, and are operational.
- The light flashes continuously if one of the ports is not operational. That occurs when the cable to that port is not connected correctly or the device connected next to the adapter in the loop is not operational.
- The light is off if both ports are not operational.

Summary of Installation Procedures

Installing, or upgrading, the adapter consists of the following steps:

- · Taking an inventory of all pieces necessary for installation
- Installing the SSA software and disk drive microcode.

Note: If you are installing code at level 5000 or higher, your adapter will be configured as an Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter.

- If required, installing the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card.
- If required, installing the SSA Fast-Write Cache Option Card card onto the adapter
- Installing the adapter
- · Connecting the SSA disk drives

Chapter 2. Preparing for Installation

This section shows you the items you need to install the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter. It also describes the cable requirements.

Inventory

To install an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, you need:

- The adapter.
- If required, the optional SSA Fast-Write Cache Option Card feature package.
- If required, the optional 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card.
- One of the three CD-ROMs that are supplied with the adapter. The three CD-ROMs are:
 - For AIX 4.2.1
 - For AIX 4.3.2
 - For AIX 4.3.3

Each CD-ROM contains the device-driver software, the SSA-disk-drive microcode, the SSA-adapter microcode, and any AIX PTFs that you need.

- · Your system unit documentation.
- PCI Adapter Placement Reference
- Your operating system documentation.
- A flat-blade screwdriver.

To connect SSA disk drives to the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, you need:

- External SSA cables.
- Fibre-Optic Extenders, if you are using fiber optic cables. (The extenders are supplied in pairs as a feature of the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed, for example, 7133.)
- The plan for your SSA subsystem configuration.
- The documentation for the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed.

Determining Your Cable Requirements

There are two types of SSA cable:

- Copper cables with conventional connectors at each end. These enable you to connect SSA nodes at distances up to 25 m (82 feet).
- Fiber optic cables. These enable you to connect two SSA nodes at distances up to 10 km (32800 feet) in single-mode configuration. These require the use of Fibre-Optic Extenders; these are supplied in pairs as a feature of the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed, for example, 7133.

The number and type of cables that you need and their lengths should have been decided at the time that your SSA subsystem was ordered. If the configuration plan that

was created then is not available to you, use the sample configuration information that is provided in the documentation for the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed. "Appendix A. Connecting SSA Devices to the Adapter" on page 31 provides some general information about SSA configurations.

Chapter 3. Installing the Device Driver Software and Microcode

The instructions in this chapter are for AIX. AIX automatically configures your system the next time you restart your system after you install the device driver software. If you have another operating system installed, refer to your operating system documentation for information about installing the device driver software and configuring your system.

The array-configuration utility program, service aids, and the latest adapter and disk microcode are loaded at the same time as the device driver software as you follow the steps in this chapter.

Installing the Software

- 1. Be sure that you have read "Summary of Installation Procedures" on page 4. It tells you in what order to install the adapter hardware, the device driver software, and the disk-drive microcode.
- 2. Turn the system unit power on.
- 3. Log in as root.
- Insert the CD-ROM for your level of AIX (that is supplied with the adapter) into the CD-ROM drive.
- 5. Type the following

smitty install_selectable_all

and press Enter.

- 6. The next screen, titled 'Install and Update from ALL Available Software', highlights the "INPUT device/directory for software" option.
- 7. Select or type your input device:
 - Press **F4** to display the input device list. Select the *name of the device* (the CD-ROM drive) that you are using and press Enter.

-- or --

- In the Entry Field, type the *name of the input device* (the CD-ROM drive) you are using and press Enter.
- 8. The 'Install and Update from ALL Available Software' window highlights the **SOFTWARE to install** option.
- 9. Type the following

a11

then press Enter.

- 10. The 'ARE YOU SURE' window displays. Press Enter to accept the data.
- 11. The COMMAND STATUS screen appears.
 - The term RUNNING is highlighted to indicate that the installation is in progress.
 - When RUNNING changes to 0K, scroll down to the bottom of the page and locate the Installation Summary.

- After a successful installation, SUCCESS will appear in the Result column of the summary at the bottom of the page.
- 12. Remove the CD-ROM from the drive.
- 13. Press F10 to exit SMIT.
- 14. To shutdown your system, type:

shutdown -F

then press Enter.

Now that you have shut down your system, you are ready to install the adapter. "Chapter 5. Installing Hardware" on page 21 describes how to do this.

Chapter 4. Installing the Device Driver on the RS/6000 SP System

In an SP system, you need to do on each node what you normally do on a standalone system. You must make the installation files available to all the affected nodes and then install them.

Perform the following commands on the Control Workstation. You should not need to **telnet** or **rlogin** to the individual nodes. You should be familiar with the **dsh** command. If not, please refer to the *IBM Parallel System Support Program for AIX: Administration Guide*, GC23–3897–05, or *IBM Parallel System Support Program for AIX: Command and Technical Reference*, GC23–3900–05.

If you are unable to utilize the **dsh** command because of the setup at your site, then you will have to **telnet** to each node and perform the steps below, omitting the **dsh** prefix.

Prepare for installation and check system pre-requisites

1. Login to the Control Workstation as a root user.

```
AIX Version 4
(C) Copyrights by IBM and by others 1982, 1996.
cws login:root
```

2. Go to a temporary directory by typing:

cd /tmp

3. Make a 'working collective' file containing a list of the relevant nodes that you want to perform the update on (in preparation for the dsh command). Type the following, for example, and pressing **Enter** after each line:

```
cat > group1
nodename1
nodename2
nodename3
...
<CTRL-D>
export WCOLL=/tmp/group1
```

4. Test that the Working Collective is working by typing:

dsh date

The results should look similar to:

nodename1:	Wed	Apr	10	10:37:46	EDT	1996
nodename2: nodename3:	wed Wed	Apr Apr	10	10:37:46	EDT	1996 1996
nodename4:	Wed	Apr	10	10:37:48	EDT	1996

If you only need to do a few nodes, use the **dsh** -**w** *host1,host2,host3...* command format to explicitly exercise groups of nodes rather than using the working collective.

5. Determine if the AIX operating system on each relevant node is at the required level by typing:

dsh oslevel

-OR -

dsh -w <host1,host2> oslevel

at the prompt, then press **Enter**. *host1,host2* is a list of the hostnames for the nodes in which adapters will be installed.

6. The required AIX Level is: AIX 4.2.1 and higher.

If the nodes are NOT at a supported AIX level, upgrade the AIX level on the nodes. Contact the System Administrator for help.

 Determine if the *pssp_level* on each relevant node is at the required level by typing:

/usr/lpp/ssp/bin/splstdata -G -b

at the system prompt, then press **Enter**. The results should be similar to the following:

pssp level can be found under the heading **pssp_ver** (PSSP-2.4)

8. The required PSSP Level (pssp_ver) is: PSSP 2.4 and higher.

If the nodes are NOT at a supported PSSP Level, then upgrade the PSSP Level on the nodes. Contact the System Administrator for help.

9. Record the name that appears below *lppsource_name* for each node that the adapters will be installed in; you will use this later:

Ippsource_name can be found under the heading **Ippsource_name**(AIX421) in the example above.

- 10. The media supplied with your adapter contains all the software updates necessary for proper operation of the adapter. Unless you know for sure that this or a later maintenance or fix level has been installed, now is the time to install it.
 - Note: If your system is "partitioned" i.e. there are more than one operating systems among the nodes, you may **only** install this adapter in nodes whose operating system is **AIX 4.2.1** and higher.
- 11. Select one of the three CD-ROMs that are supplied with the adapter. The three CD-ROMs are:
 - For AIX 4.2.1
 - For AIX 4.3.2
 - For AIX 4.3.3

Each CD-ROM contains the device-driver software, the SSA-disk-drive microcode, the SSA-adapter microcode, the controller code for the 7133 Models D40 and T40, and any AIX PTFs that you need.

- 12. Insert the media into the Control Workstation's drive.
- 13. Transfer the files to the Control Workstation's lppsource, by:
 - a. Type

smit bffcreate

then press Enter.

d. Move the cursor down to "DIRECTORY for storing software package" and enter the appropriate lppsource destination directory:

/spdata/sys1/install//ppsource_name/lppsource

using the *lppsource_name* you recorded earlier.

- e. Press Enter to begin copying the files.
 - **Note:** This step may take several minutes as the directory table of contents is updated.

- 14. Update the SPOT (Shared Product Object Tree) by:
 - a. Type

at the system prompt. The **Resource Name** panel will display with the first line highlighted.

h. Move the cursor until the appropriate **Ippsource** is displayed. For example:

lppsource_AIX432 resources lpp_source

i. Press **Enter** to start the SPOT update. This operation can take up to 15 minutes.

- 15. If boot/install server nodes are being used, it will be necessary to login to each of them and repeat this SPOT customization procedure.
- 16. Proceed to section "Install Device Drivers on the SP nodes"

Install Device Drivers on the SP nodes

1. Make sure that the lppsource directory is exported to the nodes by typing:

```
showmount -e
```

at the system prompt. The result should be something of the form:

/spdata/sys1/install/AIX432/lppsource (everyone)

2. If the directory is not exported, you may temporarily export the directory by typing:

exportfs -i /spdata/sys1/install/lppsource_name/lppsource

3. NFS Mount the lppsource directory by typing:

dsh mount cws:/spdata/sys1/install/lppsource_name/lppsource /mnt

at the system prompt. *controlwks* is the name of the Control Workstation known to the nodes. *Ippsource_name* is the name you recorded earlier in section "Prepare for installation and check system pre-requisites" on page 9.

4. Perform a preview of the filesets to be installed on the nodes by typing:

dsh "installp -pacqXd /mnt filesets 2>&1" | dshbak -c |tee -a logfile

Alternatively, you may create a list first that contains all the files to be installed, for example, *listfile*. Then...

```
cat listfile | xargs dsh "installp -pacqXd /mnt" 2>&1 |
dshbak -c | tee logfile
```

Then review the *logfile* to make sure everything passed the installation preview successfully.

The *required* filesets are highlighted. The list includes:

- AIX 4.2
 - a. devices.mca.8f97
 - b. devices.pci.14109100
 - c. devices.pci.14104500
 - d. devices.ssa.disk
 - e. devices.ssa.IBM_raid.rte
 - f. devices.ssa.tm
 - g. ssamcode
 - h. ssadiskmcode

Following is a brief description of the files about to be installed.

devices.mca.8f97

This fileset MUST be installed, even on a PCI system. It contains most of the fundamental parts of the SSA software, including the SSA adapter device driver.

devices.pci.14109100

This contains the ODM extensions for PCI based SerialRAID adapters.

devices.pci.14104500

Required for PCI SSA multi-initiator RAID/EL adapters.

devices.ssa.disk

This contains the device drivers, disk configuration methods and various command line tools. MUST be installed to use SSA disks.

devices.ssa.IBM_raid.rte

This contains the SSA RAID configuration software. This is needed for all the RAID-capable adapters. This also contains the fast-write software, therefore must be installed to use fast write, even if not using RAID arrays.

devices.ssa.tm

This is the SSA target mode support device driver and configuration methods. Target mode is available only on SSA cards 6215, 6219, 6225, and 6230. The tmssa device driver provides cluster node to cluster node communication via the SSA interface.

ssamcode

This is the adapter firmware. Once this is installed, any adapter at a previous level will automatically be updated when the system is booted. The firmware is stored in nonvolatile RAM on the adapter.

ssadiskmcode

This is the disk firmware. Once installed, it becomes *available* to the system to update disk microcode. The disk microcode will not be updated until you use either the diagnostics SSA service aids or the **ssadload** command. The disk firmware supplied is **required** for proper operation of the disks with this adapter.

- AIX 4.3
 - a. devices.common.IBM.ssa
 - b. devices.mca.8f97
 - c. devices.pci.14109100
 - d. devices.pci.14104500
 - e. devices.ssa.disk
 - f. devices.ssa.IBM_raid.rte
 - g. devices.ssa.tm
 - h. ssamcode
 - i. ssadiskmcode

Following is a brief description of the files about to be installed.

devices.common.IBM.ssa

This fileset MUST be installed. It contains most of the fundamental parts of the SSA software, including the SSA adapter device driver.

devices.mca.8f97

This contains the specific ODM extensions to enable MCA based SSA adapters.

devices.pci.14109100

This contains the ODM extensions for PCI based SSA adapters.

devices.pci.14104500

This is required if you have PCI SSA multi-initiator RAID/EL adapters.

devices.ssa.disk

This contains the device drivers, disk configuration methods and various command line tools. MUST be installed to use SSA disks.

devices.ssa.IBM_raid.rte

This contains the SSA RAID configuration software. This is needed for all the RAID-capable adapters. This also contains the fast-write software, therefore must be installed to use fast write, even if not using RAID arrays.

devices.ssa.tm

This is the SSA target mode support device driver and configuration methods. Target mode is available only on SSA cards 6215, 6219, 6225, and 6230. The tmssa device driver provides cluster node to cluster node communication via the SSA interface.

ssamcode

This is the adapter firmware. Once this is installed, any adapter at a previous level will automatically be updated when the system is booted. The firmware is stored in nonvolatile RAM on the adapter.

ssadiskmcode

This is the disk firmware. Once installed, it becomes *available* to the system to update disk microcode. It is a conscious decision to update disk microcode and is performed through either the diagnostics SSA service aids or by using the **ssadload** command. The disk firmware supplied is **required** for proper operation of the disks with this adapter.

5. Then perform the device driver installation by typing:

dsh "installp -acqXd /mnt fileset 2>&1" | tee -a logfile

Alternatively, use the list generated in step 2 that contains all the filesets to be installed, for example, *listfile*. Then...

cat listfile | xargs dsh "installp -qacXd /mnt" 2>&1 | dshbak -c | tee logfile

Then review the *logfile* to make sure everything installed successfully.

6. Contact your service representative to have the adapter hardware installed into your system unit.

Adapter and Disk Microcode

The adapter microcode in the adapter may not be at the latest level. The latest level of the adapter microcode should be obtained from:

http://www.storage.ibm.com/hardsoft/products/SSA

This package includes the latest levels of the device driver and support software that may also be required.

The adapter microcode may need to be installed to other nodes if adapters are being added to your system or if you have adapters that have been previously installed. This is especially important if you have adapters that will become part of SSA loops connected to your new adapters.

Note: Error logs indicating a mismatch of adapter microcode or "degraded performance" may result if mixed adapter microcode levels exist in SSA loops.

The microcode was made available on the nodes when you installed "ssamcode" and "ssadiskmcode" in the previous steps. In order for the adapter or adapters to be updated, the node must either be rebooted or you must run "cfgmgr" or "mkdev -I ssan". The adapter is automatically updated with the latest microcode when the system is booted if the appropriate files (ssamcode) have been installed on the system.

The disk microcode needs to be updated once the adapter software and the adapter have been installed and the disk subsystem connected. Use the SSA Service Aids **ssadload -u** command to update the disk microcode.

Note: The disk microcode MUST be updated for proper operation of this adapter. If other subsystems are added to the configuration later, then the microcode level of those disks must also be checked, and if necessary, updated.

Attention: Wait until the installation is complete before updating the disk microcode. It is possible to render the disks unusable if an attempt is made to update the disk microcode from more than one source at the same time, as with a multi-initiator SSA loop. Special care must be taken to ensure that only one host or node is updating the disk microcode at any one time.

Chapter 5. Installing Hardware

Now that you have installed the array-configuration utility program, service aids, and the latest adapter and disk microcode, you must install the adapter hardware. This section provides instructions for installing the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter or the Advanced SerialRAID Plus Adapter and connecting your SSA disk drives to it. (Be sure to save this guide for future reference and use.) Before you begin, be sure you have read "Handling the Adapter" on page vii.

Attention: Do not remove the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter from its anti-static package at this time.

Installing the Adapter

- 1. Be sure that you have read "Chapter 2. Preparing for Installation" on page 5.
- 2. Refer to the User's Guide that shipped with your system unit to perform the following:
 - a. Ensure that your system unit is shut down.
 - b. Remove the cover from your system unit.
 - c. If you are installing a new adapter, remove it from its anti-static package.
 - If you are installing a 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card on this adapter at the same time, remove this from its anti-static package and install it using the instructions defined in "Installing the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card" on page 22.
 - If you are replacing an existing 64 MB SDRAM card with a new 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card on an already installed adapter, remove the adapter from its slot, remove the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card from its anti-static package and install it using the instructions defined in "Installing the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card" on page 22.
 - d. If required, install the SSA Fast-Write Cache Option Card card onto the adapter. Refer to the SSA Fast Write Cache Installation Instructions if you are installing this feature.
 - e. In some systems, you must remove the blue handle on the adapter before installing it. The *PCI Adapter Placement Reference* describes when this is necessary. To remove the handle, remove the two screws that fasten it to the adapter. If the card also has a plastic stiffener along its top edge, remove it at this time by removing and discarding its screws.
 - f. Install the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter into the correct PCI slot. The slots in each system into which you can install an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter are defined in the *PCI Adapter Placement Reference*.
 - g. Reinstall the cover to your system unit.

Installing the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card

This section tells you how to replace the existing 64 MB SDRAM card on the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter with the 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card that you will have received if you ordered Feature 6231.

Removing the existing 64 MB SDRAM module of an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter

Attention: The adapter assembly contains parts that are electrostatic-discharge (ESD) sensitive. Use the tools and procedures defined by your organisation to protect such parts.



Figure 2. Removing the SDRAM Card

- 1. Remove the adapter from the using system if already installed (see the *Installation and Service guide* for the using system).
- 2. Refer to Figure 2.
- Holding your thumbs against the connector 3, open the clips 1 by pressing them in the directions shown by the arrows in the diagram. This action pulls the SDRAM card 2 out of the connector.
- 4. Remove the SDRAM card. This card may be retained for future reuse..

Installing a 128 MByte SDRAM Option Card on an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter Attention:

- The adapter assembly contains parts that are electrostatic-discharge (ESD) sensitive. Use the tools and procedures defined by your organisation to protect such parts
- The new SDRAM is labelled with its size. Ensure that you do not accidentally replace the card you have just removed back onto the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter

- 1. Refer to Figure 3.
- 2. Ensure that the clips **1** are fully open.
- 3. Hold the SDRAM card so that its slots **2** align with the guides **3** of the connector.

- 4. Refer to Figure 4.
- 5. Carefully insert the SDRAM card into the connector.
- 6. Press strongly on the card until it is fully home.
- 7. Close the clips 1 by pivoting them in the directions shown by the arrows in the diagram. You hear a click when the clips are fully closed. if you cannot close the clips, the card is not fully home. Press the card fully home, then close the clips.

Connecting SSA Disk Drives

After you install the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter and reinstall the cover of your system unit, you can connect the SSA disk drives.

To connect the disk drives:

- Refer to the configuration plan that was created at the time that your SSA subsystem was ordered. If this plan is not available to you, use the sample configuration information that is provided in the documentation for the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed. ("Appendix A. Connecting SSA Devices to the Adapter" on page 31 provides some general information on SSA configurations.)
- 2. Using this information connect the SSA cables to the unit in which the disk drives are installed.
 - **Note:** If you are adding SSA disk drives under the covers of your system unit, refer to the installation instructions in the *User's Guide* of your system unit for a description of how to route and connect the SSA cables from the adapter to the disk drives.
- 3. Connect the SSA cables to the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter.
- 4. If not already connected, connect power to the unit in which the SSA disk drives are installed and to your system unit. The installation instructions for each unit describe how to do this.

Notes:

- 1. No terminators are needed in SSA configurations.
- 2. You do not need to set device-address switches or jumpers in SSA configurations.

Verifying the Installation

To verify your newly installed Advanced SerialRAID Adapter is available for use:

- 1. Restart your system unit. If you are running AIX, this automatically configures your system.
- 2. At the system prompt, log in as root.
- 3. Type:

lsdev -Cs pci

at the prompt and press Enter. A list of PCI devices displays. **Available** status should appear; this indicates that the IBM SSA 160 SerialRAID Adapter (14109100) (also known as an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter) is installed.

Problem Determination

If you encounter any problems with the adapter during installation or after you install it, refer to:

- 1. The Advanced SerialRAID Adapters: User's Guide and Maintenance Information manual, which is provided with the adapter
- 2. Your system unit documentation

for information about running diagnostics or other problem determination procedures.

Configuring Your System

You need to update your system configuration after you install the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, refer to your operating system documentation for the correct procedure to follow.

Chapter 6. Downloading the Latest Disk Microcode

Instructions for installing the latest disk microcode are given in "Chapter 3. Installing the Device Driver Software and Microcode" on page 7.

Attention: Do not download code to drives that are in use. Ensure that no I/O operations are in progress to the disk drive and that any disk drive that is a download target is not being used by any other system.

Since I/O operations may be performed by a RAID adapter without any host system involvement, for example, when rebuilding an array, you must also avoid downloading to disk drives that are members of an array that is in the rebuilding state.

Downloading the Microcode

To install the disk drive microcode:

- Install the microcode using the Display/Download Disk Drive Microcode Service Aid. To do this:
 - a. Start the system diagnostics. The *User's Guide* for your system unit describes how to do this.
 - b. Select Service Aids from the Function Selection menu.
 - c. Select SSA Service Aids from the Service Aids menu.

h. Select YES.

This reads the microcode from your system hard disk and automatically downloads the microcode only to those disk drives whose level of microcode is lower than that of the new microcode.

- **Note:** Different types of SSA disk drive might need different versions of the microcode. Microcode download files are provided for each type of disk drive. Where a system contains more than one type of SSA disk drive, this Service Aid selects the correct microcode file for each of those types.
- i. Exit from diagnostics.
- **Note:** After installing the Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, update your system configuration. Refer to your system documentation for instructions on how to do this.

Appendix A. Connecting SSA Devices to the Adapter

SSA devices can be connected to the adapter and to each other in many ways. Sample configurations are given in the documentation for the units (for example, the 7133) in which SSA devices can be installed. Marketing representatives have additional information on configuring for performance and availability.

The configuration must be planned at the time that the SSA subsystem is ordered. This must be done so that the correct cables are ordered. This plan should be made available to whoever installs the adapter and the devices.

Before connecting SSA devices to the adapter, ensure that the configuration will not violate any of the SSA configuration rules of other adapters that are already connected in the loop. The SSA configuration rules for the Advanced SerialRAID adapter are defined in 'Rules for SSA loops' on page 35; for other adapters, these rules are listed in the installation guides for those adapters.

This section provides general information on SSA configurations.

SSA Loops and Links

In the simplest SSA configuration, SSA devices are connected through SSA links to an SSA adapter that is located in a using system. The devices, SSA links, and SSA adapter are configured in loops. Each loop provides a data path that starts at one connector of the SSA adapter and passes through a link (SSA cable) to the devices. The loop continues through the devices, then returns through another link to a second connector on the SSA adapter. Two SSA loops can be connected to an adapter.

The maximum permitted length for an external copper cable that connects two SSA nodes (for example, disk drives) is 25 meters (82 feet).

The maximum permitted length for an external fiber optic cable that connects two SSA nodes (for example, disk drives) is 10 kilometers (32808 feet).

Details of the rules for configuring SSA loops are given for this SSA adapter in "Rules for SSA Loops" on page 35.

Loops and Data Paths

All devices that are attached to an SSA adapter **1** are connected through SSA links **2**. The SSA links are configured as loops. Data and commands to a particular device pass through all other devices on the link between the adapter and the target device.

Data can travel in either direction round a loop. The adapter can, therefore, get access to the devices **3** (disk drives in this example) through two data paths but always uses the path that has the fewest interconnecting devices between it and the destination device. The using system cannot detect which data path is being used.



If a disk drive fails, or is turned off, the loop is broken, and one of the data paths to a particular disk drive is no longer available. The disk drives on the remainder of the loop continue to work, but an error is reported to the system. The adapter may now use the alternate path to some of the devices.

In the diagram, disk drive number 3 has failed. Disk drives 1 and 2 can communicate with the using system only through connector A1 of the SSA adapter. Disk drives 4 through 8 can communicate only through connector A2 of the SSA adapter.



If two or more disk drives are turned off, fail, or are removed from the loop, some disk drives might become isolated from the SSA adapter

In the diagram, disk drives 3 and 7 have been removed. Disk drives 1 and 2 can communicate with the system only through connector A1 of the SSA adapter. Disk drive number 8 can communicate with the system only through connector A2 of the SSA adapter. Disk drives 4, 5, and 6 are isolated from the SSA adapter.



Rules for SSA Loops

For SSA loops that include an Advanced SerialRAID Adapter, the following rules apply:

- Each SSA loop must be connected to a valid pair of connectors on the SSA adapter (that is, either connectors A1 and A2, or connectors B1 and B2).
- A maximum of one pair of adapter connectors can be connected in a particular SSA loop.
- All member disks of an array must be on the same SSA loop.
- A maximum of 48 devices can be connected in a particular SSA loop.
- If an SSA adapter that is in a two-way configuration is connected to two SSA loops, and a second adapter is connected to each loop, both loops must be connected to the same second adapter.
- Each SSA loop can be connected to no more than two adapters on any one using system.
- The number of adapters that are supported in an SSA loop is determined by whether any disk drives are configured for RAID or fast-write operations, and by the type of adapter, (Table 1)

See the SSA Adapters: User's Guide and Maintenance Information manual, SA33-3272 (Version 01 or above) for more information about the level of code that is required in the Micro Channel SSA Multi-Initiator/RAID EL Adapter (type 4–M) or the PCI SSA Multi-Initiator/RAID EL Adapter (type 4–N).

Rules for the Physical Relationship between Disk Drives and Adapters

The physical relationship between the disk drives and the adapters in an SSA loop can affect the performance of the subsystem. The following sequence enables you to determine the best relationship between the disk drives and the adapter on an SSA loop that contains a Advanced SerialRAID Adapter.

- 1. Determine which data is accessed most frequently.
- 2. Assign that data to those disks drives that are farthest (round the loop) from the adapter connectors. By doing this, you prevent the activity of the busiest disk drive from obstructing the data path to the other disk drives.

For example, if a loop contains 16 disk drives, and the adapter connectors are between disk drives 1 and 16, the most-frequently-accessed data should be on disk drives 8 or 9 as shown in Figure 5.
